Strengths:

Moss School has done remarkable work in developing a comprehensive character initiative. All stakeholders (administration, teachers, and families) were involved in selecting and implementing the core values of Community, Honesty, Perseverance, Empathy and Respect. The strategies of self-questioning and problem-solving are a national example of a Promising Practice of Performance values for younger students. Training is provided for all teachers and paraprofessionals; and since the initial SSOC designation in 2018, the Moss staff is now turn-keying their approach for staff at other schools. In fact, their work has been published in Mr. Rick Cohen's book *The Metacognitive Student*. The school's character team has incorporated suggestions made from their NSOC Site Evalution feedback to address extrinsic vs. intrinsic motivation and service learning. The Moss staff's expertise in understanding and adapting the 11 Principles Framework to the developmental level of three, four and five year old children is exemplary. The Problem-Solving approach is embedded in all areas of the half day program and simply but beautifully meets all of the criteria for a State School of Character.

Areas of Growth/Suggestions:

While we are certain that character is infused in all aspects of the students' half day program (P3.3), the evaluators would love to see and hear more about how the students use problem-solving at playtime, in the bus line, and other settings during the day. It is evident that reflection takes place during Morning Meeting and at other times of the day in written form, we would like to see in writing or through pictures more documentation of the students' reflection (P 2, 5.3). Service learning is an area that challenges many schools; you have learned to tie it to the curriculum, allow student choice in projects, and to reflect on what the students learn at a young age. Other schools could benefit from your knowledge and specific examples. (P5) Another area to explore is how to bring in community organizations to enhance your character initiative and to provide ties to community activities and events (P10.3). These can include, but are not limited to 4-H, Miracle League, local businesses and community leaders. Moss School has, no doubt, been affected by the pandemic over the last 3 years. Schools have operated in survival mode for much of that time, and have been limited in their ability to provide time to reflect on their character initiatives and make desired changes. This is not the case at Moss School as it is evident that this character initiative has thrived. Consider adding a written action plan for improvement to show the progress made in the character initiative. (P11)
