## USDA Grant Will Improve Distance Learning Infrastructure

Seneca East Local School District is the recipient of a \$723,000 USDA grant that will help enhance the delivery of distance learning during the pandemic.

The funding will equip 57 classrooms with distance education enabled hardware, and software, upgrade networking and supply technological equipment to advance telecommunications opportunities. The district is placing additional emphasis on improving Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) related learning.

"It's no secret that COVID-19 hit schools across the country hard," said Laura Kagy, superintendent. "Seneca East was one of many districts left scrambling to continue providing a well-rounded education without the necessary infrastructure. This grant will help our staff and students be successful now and in the future."

The funds can be used for acquisition of broadband facilities, audio, video and interactive video equipment, computer hardware and software, instructional programming, and technical support for the use of the equipment. Staff are especially excited about the 75" interactive ViewBoards that will replace current technology. Additionally, grant monies will go toward professional training for all staff on the new technology and programming.

The grant will also allow Seneca East to expand key partnerships within the community, including those with educational service centers and local universities so that students have access to a variety of postsecondary education options. They also plan to further collaborate with healthcare organizations like Mercy Health and the Mental Health and Recovery Services Board to help address the social and emotional impact the pandemic has had on students.

Kagy said, "I'm thankful for the staff and community partners who supported the grant to secure these federal dollars for the district, and I am excited to see where the funding takes us."

## 2020-21: A Year of Challenges Eased by a Strong, Resilient Community

It's hard to believe spring is here and the school year is coming to an end. I don't know about you, but seeing the green grass, the trees budding, and the flowers beginning to bloom makes me think of new beginnings. I am so excited for what is in store for our district. However, you can never look forward without first looking back.

From the moment COVID-19 entered the U.S. last year, this community banded together to remain true to our mission of keeping staff and students healthy and safe and providing a well-rounded learning experience. I have never been prouder to be a Tiger.

Like so many other school districts across the state and nation, when schools shut down, we had to quickly adapt in order to continue providing the best education possible to students district-wide. Our board and staff have worked tirelessly ever since to answer the call. I am happy to report that the sudden transition to online learning brought some unexpected positive attributes.

For example, every student in grades 2-12 now has his/her own Chromebook. Pre-pandemic, only students in grades 7-12 were issued this technology. This gives students the opportunity to learn no matter their environment. Over the summer and leading up to the 2020-2021 school year, the district acquired new software, including Google Classroom, Kami, Gizmos, and Stella. These programs have allowed more communication between teachers, students, and their parents. In some cases, this software has greatly reduced the district's printing needs.

Since it is likely some form of online learning is here to stay, we are continuing to research and pilot new technologies to help improve our students' learning experience now and in the future. For example, we are adopting a single sign-on so that students will only need one username and password to access all of the programs that are pushed to their school-issued Chromebook. We are also acquiring more document cameras so that teachers can share documents or experiments with students learning in the classroom or virtually.

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# Relief Funding Fills Some Gaps During Pandemic

## Treasurer's Update

When the pandemic hit, many school districts across the country were left wondering how they would be able to continue providing a well-rounded education. The CARES Act helped Seneca East cover the gaps. The act was passed March 27, 2020, to help schools with expenses incurred as a result of COVID-19.

In fiscal year 2020, the district received \$80,872 in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funding and in fiscal year 2021, we have received \$52,945 in Rural and Small Town School Districts funding. Over the last year, we have used these funds to ensure students can continue their education in a safe environment.

For example, a portion of the monies have gone toward ensuring COVID-19 safety guidelines are met. We have purchased additional cleaning supplies for the transportation, food service, and maintenance departments. Additionally, the funding allowed us to purchase and install plexiglass barriers and social distancing signage around our buildings. We also hired a part-time bus driver to reduce the number of students riding each bus and a maintenance worker to help with the additional cleaning requirements.


Students who wished to continue learning remotely were directly impacted. The CARES Act helped Seneca East purchase these remote learning licenses. The school also provided hot spots around the district so students could have access to the internet both on and off campus.

Looking ahead, we are already slated to receive another \$274,032 for the 2021-2022 school year if COVID restrictions are still in place. As always, we will continue to be good stewards of your taxpayer dollars in addition to any additional CARES Act funding we receive. Thank you for your continued support.

This school year has been all about being innovative. Andrea Schimpf, library media specialist, put her creativity to use and not only made sure students had continued access to books, but also to the authors who wrote them!

Last fall, Seneca East's middle and high school book clubs Zoomed with best-selling author Jennifer Nielsen. Prior to the virtual visit, students read "The False Prince," the first book in the New York Times bestselling "Ascendance" series. During the Zoom, Nielsen answered questions and did a writing workshop with students.

On Feb. 24, third grade students Zoomed with author Heather Lang. In preparation for the Zoom, they read "Swimming with Sharks," "Anybody's Game," and "Fearless Flyer." Lang's books are based on true stories of women who persevered and accomplished great things in spite of challenges. She told students about her travels around the world interviewing the women she writes about. She also read her new book, "The Leaf Detective," a story about Meg Lowman, pioneer scientist of the rainforest.

Last but not least, on March 25, Ohio author Tricia Springstubb Zoomed with Seneca East

second grade students. In advance of her visit, students read her book, "Khalil and Mr. Hagerty and the Backyard Treasures" during library time. Students wrote down questions they had for Springstubb, who is from the Cleveland area and has written a range of books including her "Cody" series, "What Happened on Fox Street" and "Moonpenny Island" (a novel based on Kelley's Island).

## College Credit, Adjunct Profs Provide Continuing Education Opportunities for Seneca East Students

At Seneca East, we strive to offer the best education possible so that students are prepared for whatever path they choose after graduation. One component of this education experience is continuing education opportunities such as college credit, advanced placement courses, and vocational training.

During the 2020-21 school year, 77 students in grades 7-12 will earn approximately 756 semester hours from Ohio colleges and universities including Bowling Green State University, Cleveland State University, the University of Findlay, Heidelberg University, Marion Technical College, North Central State College, Owens Community College, Terra State Community College, Tiffin University, and The University of Toledo. Students are taking classes in-person, on college campuses, online, and at Seneca East.

Seneca East is also proud to have three adjunct professors on staff:

- Janine New is an adjunct professor from Bowling Green State

University teaching Academic Writing and Research Writing.

- John Darkow is an adjunct professor with Bowling Green State University and the University of Findlay, teaching Introduction to Biology and Introduction to Anatomy and Physiology and Lab.
- Jillian Baker is an adjunct professor with Terra State Community College, teaching Digital Literacy and Applications.

We also offer AP (advanced placement) classes. Our adjunct professors are currently preparing 11 students to take the AP Biology, AP Computer Science Principles and AP Calculus tests in May.

Additionally, two freshman, 11 sophomores, 29 juniors and 23 seniors participated in the Sentinel Career and Technology Center program this year.

# SE Students Participate in Virtual Advocacy Event on Drunk Driving and Substance Abuse

Additionally, Heiser spoke about his involvement in the CARSA (Community Action for Reducing Substance Abuse) Coalition, whose mission is to reduce substance abuse among youth and adults in Seneca County.

The students were supported throughout the event by SADD Advisor Jillian Baker, Seneca East Prevention Education Coordinator Charla VanOsdol, and Mental Health and Recovery Board member Nicole Williams. Four speakers, including keynote speaker Ty Sells, the director of training for Youth to Youth International in Columbus, Ohio, spoke to the more than 50 students and adults in attendance on the topics of Myths of Marijuana, Mindfulness, Gaming and Gambling, and Advocacy.

Students left the summit feeling encouraged and with new tools in their toolbox for engaging their peers and using their role as leaders for prevention efforts in their school and community.

# Food Service Team Takes COVID-19 in Stride

The Food Service team has arguably been impacted more than most by COVID-19. Not only do they have a small window of time to serve every student in the district – both breakfast and lunch – this year they have had to figure out how to maintain social distancing guidelines in the cafeteria and how to handle an exponential rise in meals requested and served. They have taken these changes in stride, however, even implementing innovative ideas to help students learn about food waste and ensure they have a nutritious meal before state testing.

To help our nation recover from COVID-19, the U.S. Department of Agriculture authorized free breakfast and lunch to students throughout the 2020-2021 school year. This means on average the Food Service team is serving 200 breakfasts and 600 lunches per day. This is more than 100 additional breakfasts and lunches served, respectively, than last year. They are also packing meals for students learning remotely. Families can order meals for the week and the meals are picked up each Wednesday.

New this year is an app where students in grades 3-12 can rate their meal. This allows the Food Service team to design the menu around the students' favorite and least favorite meals. The team also ran a Food Waste Challenge earlier this year to show students how much food is thrown away each day. They encouraged kids to take only what they will eat and by the end of the week they reported that significantly less food was being thrown away compared to the first day of the challenge.

Coming up, they will be delivering breakfast to the classroom on the days students are taking state tests.

Research shows that well-balanced meals contribute to a student's success inside and outside of school and that students that eat school meals consume fewer empty calories and take in more milk, fruits, vegetables, and fiber.

Last, but maybe most importantly, the district is celebrating the heroes of the cafeteria with School Lunch Hero Day on May 7. This past year has certainly highlighted how wonderful the team is, so be sure to celebrate them with an extra thank you on this day.

Updated as of March 15, 2021

Kindergarten Registration Packets are now available in the school office and on the district website ([www.se-tigers.com](http://www.se-tigers.com)). Parents may stop in the school office entryway for contactless pickup or call the school secretary to schedule a time to pick up a packet. Parents may also download and fill out the documents. All completed forms need to be completed and turned in to the school office before screening times are assigned. Please be sure to submit the information by May 1. Along with the completed registration paperwork, parents also need to provide Seneca East with the following:

- (1) An attested transcript of the Certificate of Birth or attested hospital record showing date and place of birth.
- (2) A copy of the child's Social Security Card.
- (3) An up-to-date Immunization Record.
- (4) Proof of residency.
- (5) Copy of any Custody Paperwork, if applicable, as provided by the court.

Note: A child must be five years old on or before August 1, 2021 to be eligible for entrance into kindergarten.

The district will conduct Kindergarten Screenings on Friday, May 21 in the auxiliary gym. Due to Ohio's restrictions on large-group meetings, there will not be a Kindergarten Registration Parent Meeting prior to the screening date. However, there will be a parent meeting in the computer lab next to the auxiliary gym while children are being screened. Important information will be shared and parents will also have access to a school computer to fill out Final Forms information. Many of the required school documents (Contact Information, Emergency Medical Authorization, etc.) are now completed online.
