## REFLEX MATH - Jom amombk

You may have heard your child talking about "green lights" and using the word "reflex" and wondered just what was going on at Midkota Elementary School.

Since the beginning of October, students in grades 2-4 have been working hard to become fluent in their math facts using an app called Reflex. As they work through specially designed lessons and games students are building automaticity in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. When a student does not have to stop to think about a math fact, their brain is free to focus on the new concept being taught (finding the common denominator, or multiplying decimals, for example). Hopefully they are also making the
 connection that in math, effort results in achievement. Reflex is designed to recognize and reward both student effort and achievement to help them come to this conclusion.

Midkota Elementary was awarded access to Reflex for just one year through a grant application. We want to make the most of this opportunity and help as many students as possible to become fluent in their math facts. We have seen great gains in every class involved! I'm especially excited for the 4th graders who will enter 5th grade fluent in their facts and ready for Mrs. Topp's math class.

## Summer Reading, Had Me a Blast! b; Ms. Docker

Well the summer is almost here. I promise! With our extended winter weather this year, it was sometimes kind of hard to believe we would ever see the green grass again (between piles of snow still I grant you) let alone feel temperatures above freezing.
With only 3 weeks remaining of this school year, students of all ages are getting ready to push pause on their formal education. Although our students have worked hard and have definitely earned a break, allow me to offer a small suggestion: Keep students reading! Studies have shown that summer reading is essential to student success. A study done in Knoxville, TN found that students, who do not read during the summer, lose an average of 2 months of reading development. This summer slide consequently slows student growth down when they come back to school in the fall. Reading is like exercise for your brain. If you don't exercise your muscles, you lose strength and muscle tone.
I hear those questions running around in your mind. "But my student doesn't like to read. How can I make them read during the summer when it is a battle I fight all school year?" "We are so busy in the summer! How am I ever going to fit in reading time for my student?" Yes these are valid questions and concerns. If you happen to not have avid book worms in your house, convincing them of the importance of summer reading can be a bit of a stretch. So, with that in mind, I offer these suggestions:

- Keep it strictly fun. When I say reading during the summer, I am not advocating that your student read textbooks. (Unless that's their thing!) Find out what interests your student(s) and find books that pique that curiosity. Maybe your student has a deep and abiding interest in the Titanic. Get your hands on some Titanic books. Perhaps they can't get enough of books written about the pioneer days. Swap with a friend and grab a new series for your student to read.
- Try audio books. Students can still benefit from hearing a book read to them. Audio books can encourage struggling readers by opening up a world of adventure to them without the difficulty of written language. Vocabulary will still increase because students are exposed to new words they may not use in their every day life. If it is possible to locate a print book that is the same as the audio book, it is twice as nice for students to be able to follow along. Audio books are also handy for busy families on the go. Put on a book in the vehicle that everyone can enjoy and you will not only give everyone's brains a nice work out, but also allow for some good family book discussions.
- Check out your local library for a Summer Reading program. This is a fun way for students to earn prizes or challenge themselves with new books from a suggested library list. Both Foster County and Griggs County run summer youth reading programs. Check them out for some summertime fun! Also, utilizing the library to find books that interest your child (see suggestion \#1) can keep the cost of finding the "right" book to a minimum. County libraries often belong to a inter-library loan program and can request books from other libraries in the state at no cost to you.
- Create a Book Challenge. Many lists are already available online, but help your student(s) choose a group of friends to do a book challenge with this summer. Maybe it's a family book challenge? Maybe it's a t-ball book challenge? The sky's the limit.
So whatever else you do this summer, get out there and get reading. I challenge you!

Be humble enough to be coachable. But be confident enough to dominate your

Board Members Present: President Joel Utke, Veronica Vollmer, Preston Hoffman, Shian Hoyt, Bobbi Hoffman, Louis Halvorson, Justin Spickler. Others Present: Superintendent/HS Principal Ryan Baron, Charla Hoyt, Austin Monson, Kevin Veile<br>Present Via Zoom: Elementary Principal Linn Dockter, Carrie Braaten<br>President Utke called the meeting to order, and a quorum was established. Motion by Vollmer to approve the agenda as presented with Faculty Surveys added to New Business, seconded by Halvorson. On roll call vote, motion passed.

## REPORTS:

ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL REPORT: Elementary had a great turn out for Parent Teacher conferences last week. Reading Month is underway; the students are enjoying the activities and dress up days that it brings. Blinds for the new windows have been delivered and installation has begun. Kindergarten screening letters have been sent out and will be held on March $30^{\text {th }}$. Parent breakfast is scheduled for Wednesday, March $29^{\text {th }}$ along with the $5^{\text {th }} \& 6^{\text {th }}$ grade musical.

ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR REPORT: March $20^{\text {th }}$ will be the first day of baseball and softball practice. There is only one $7^{\text {th }}$ grade girl participating in softball this season. Discussion was had about transportation for her. Discussion was also had about possibly using the indoor baseball facility available at the old Grace City School for some baseball practices. Elementary volleyball is underway. The two interested high school students were hired for head coach(es). A parent has volunteered to help out when the students are unable to be at a practice or game. Mr. Monson also reported to the board of the topics that were discussed at the last coop meeting. Next coop meeting will be March 28, 2023. Basketball schedules are finished for next year with the new three class system in place. May 4 is a tentative date for the elementary spring concert.

SUPERINTENDENT/HS PRINCPIAL REPORT: Prom has been set for April 21, 2023; Mr. Baron will be attending. Mr. Baron also gave updates on spring sports and activities.
State Assessments for grades 7-11 will start March 21. These tests will cover math, reading, writing, and science.
Building updates were also presented; the Ag portable will be wired into the fire alarm system, Building Trades portable will need new devices and then wired into the system. We are waiting to hear from Kolenda on the boilers for both buildings.
Charla Hoyt has stepped down from the Business Manager position. She will continue with the duties of Assistant Business Manager as she had before, and Lisa Jorde will continue with

Payroll duties. An ad will be placed for a Business Manager with flexibility in hours, 3-5 days per week.
Drivers Ed will be held at Midkota Elementary School June 12-16, 2023, and taught by Mr.
Brenden Parsley. GCC asked if their students could attend also. It was agreed that they could attend but everything they need will run through their district including fees and technology. A negotiations request has been made by the Midkota Education Association. A Zoom meeting will be held with their reps on March $16^{\text {th }}$ at 7:30am.
Mr. Baron \& Mrs. Brandt will be attending the Cognia workshop this Thursday. Cognia is the continuous improvement platform.
Discussion was had about sick days and there not being a sick bank for ancillary staff. It was decided that it would be added to the staff handbook and the teacher portion will be reworded for better understanding.
Mr. Baron also updated the board on current enrollment, what we are doing for continuous improvement, and legislative updates.

## CONSENT AGENDA:

Motion by Hoyt to approve the minutes of the February 14 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Regular School Board Meeting, February bills and the March budget, seconded by Spickler. On roll call vote, motion passed.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

HIGH SCHOOL GYM \& BINFORD ADDITION: Zerr -Berg's were contacted, and they sent us plans and a contract to look at. Building committee will meet to discuss plans and contract.

BUILDING TRADES PROJECT: Mr. Veile reported that the weather has put building behind schedule. Hoping to have the cabin's roof on and completely enclosed by the end of the school year. Bids will be taken when the cabin is enclosed. Insurance company will be called to get insurance for the cabin.

## NEW BUSINESS:

2023-24 CALENDAR: Five options were given to teachers and staff to vote on. Options 1 \& 5 being the most popular. Option 1 had an early start date in Mid-August with graduation being the weekend before Memorial Day and Option 5 had a start date of August 23 with graduation being Memorial Day weekend. Discussion was had and Hoyt made a motion to go with Option 5 for the 2023-24 School Year Calendar, seconded by Halvorson. On roll call vote, motion passed.

CONTINUITY OF LEARNING: Motion to approve made by Hoyt, seconded by B. Hoffman. On roll call vote, motion passed.

AMERICAN BOARD OF TEACHERS CERTIFICATION REQUEST: Mr. Hoyt will be taking his teacher certification test and put in a request if the district would pay the fee for this test. Discussion was had and Hoyt made a motion that the district will pay for Mr. Hoyt to take his certification test, seconded by Spickler. On roll call vote, motion passed.

OPEN ENROLLMENT: Hoys made a motion to accept the open enrollment request for next school year, seconded by Spickler.
