#### When Is It Too Cold For School?

In Winterset we try to quantify just how cold is too cold for school.

Generally, if the National Weather Service Forecast for the morning is for a windchill warning, classes will be canceled. In most cases, the decision will be made the night before. However, we can't always predict what will happen in the morning with our buses. Sometimes in temperatures

warmer than a windchill warning, our buses struggle to start and stay running. In those cases, a decision to cancel or start late is made as soon as possible in the morning.

# When Is It Too Snowy For School?

Families should expect less notice when school is canceled for heavy snow. Road conditions are tested and several websites are viewed for information on weather and road conditions. Mr. Gross also consults with other Madison County and neighboring school districts.

Making the decision to start late, cancel or continue school as planned is a difficult decision that takes into account many factors.

Most importantly, we consider our students' safety first.

When WCSD makes a decision to change plans, we utilize our Infinite Campus Messenger System that calls, texts and e-mails parents and staff. We also post the change of plans on our district website and notify local media.

## **IMPORTANT JANUARY DATES**

JANUARY 4TH: CLASSES RESUME JAN. 15 END OF 2ND TERM: EARLY OUT AT 1

#### REQUIRED IMMUNIZATIONS & SCREENINGS

All Kindergarten students must be up to date on their preschool shots and have received their 4-year-old boosters of Dtap, Polio, MMR and Varicella.

All 7th grade (and above) students must show proof of having received a Tdap (Tetanus/Acellular Pertusis) vaccination booster AND a Meningococcal vaccination on or after 10 years of age.

All 12th grade students must show proof of receiving 2 DOSES of Meningococcal vaccine; or 1 dose if first dose was received at 16 years of age or older.

All Kindergarten students must have a dental screen performed between the ages of 3 and 6 years old with a dental certificate on file. All 9th grade students must have a current (within the past 12 months) dental certificate on file.

All Kindergarten and 3rd grade students must have a current (within the past 12 months) vision certificate on file.

-Kindergarten, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students must have their respected <u>immunizations</u> per state law.

-All Kindergarten and 9<sup>th</sup> grade students must have a current <u>Dental screening certificate</u> on file.

-All Kindergarten and 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students must have a current <u>Vision screening certificate</u> on file.

The following information was pulled from a Love and Logic article by Dr. Charles Fay and gives great examples of potential helpful and unhelpful responses to pre/teen's behaviors.

### **HELPFUL RESPONSES**

- Listen to their opinions—display respect and love even if you disagree.
- Trust that they will eventually become very much like you if you maintain a good relationship.
- Encourage them to take on more responsibilities, such as managing their own money, getting ready for school on their own, working things out with teachers/coaches, etc.
- Talk about your political and religious views when they can overhear you talking with others. Keep the tone positive and constructive, interwoven with love for others. Love them the same regardless of what they decide about these topics.
- Do your best to live according to your values. Admit when you fall short of doing so. Be real.
- Provide lots of supervision done with an attitude of love and concern. Try not to leave them alone at home. Require that they come with the family on almost all outings.
- Get to know their friends and build relationships with them.
  - Have regular meals together.
- Expect them to serve the family by completing their fair share of contributions.
- Allow them to drive when they are old enough, they have paid at least half of the cost, and they are good at following the rules of the home.
- Provide factual information about sex, including the risks. Do so with empathy and an attitude of high expectations for them. Point out that the people who wait until marriage usually have a lot fewer things to worry about as preteens, teens, and young adults.
- Have them set a reasonable curfew. "Reasonable" is the key. This can be different every night that they go out, but generally it shouldn't be any later than 10 p.m. If they refuse to be reasonable, set the time for them and make it early.
- Set significant limits over technology use. Do so by saying, "I allow the use of digital devices when it doesn't hurt our relationship. This includes causing me to worry about you."

### UNHELPFUL RESPONSES

- Argue with them and try to set them straight.
- · Worry constantly.
- Rescue and get overly involved in things that they can do for themselves.
- Lecture them in an effort to make them believe what you believe. Let them overhear you being uncaring and critical of others.
- Hold higher standards for them than for yourself.
- Make the mistake of thinking that they no longer need as much supervision as they used to
- Ignore their friends or treat them like "bad influences."
- Let them "do their own thing" and never expect them to spend time with the family.
  - · Allow them to avoid their chores.
  - · Allow them to drive with no restrictions.
- Give them no information about sex, or just resign yourself to the notion that "every teen is doing it." Allow coed sleepovers and let them go to houses where these are probably happening.
- Let them come home at night at whatever time they like. (Through this, you will demonstrate that you don't really care what's going on in their lives.)
- Let them spend most of their time on their devices without supervision. Allow them to bond more with their screens than with you. Spend more time watching your screen than watching and enjoying being with them.

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Dr. Fay notes the importance of the quality of our relationships with our kids, as it is the most important factor in affecting the adjustment of our children. Despite actions that may lead you to believe your pre/teen doesn't want you in their life, remember that in every way, they truly do.

#### **Parenting Tip: Limit Your Minimizing Words**

It is not easy to sit with our kids when they're feeling big feelings. It's hard to listen to their fears, complaints, or frustrations without jumping in and offering a solution or trying to make them feel better.

But sometimes, in an attempt to help, we minimize their experience.

We use phrases like:

- Settle down.
- It's not that bad.
- It will be over soon.
- Don't worry about it.
- It didn't hurt that bad.
- You're fine.
- When I was your age... {story about how you had it way worse}.
- What's the big deal?

Instead of minimizing, try empathy.

Empathy means putting yourself in your child's shoes - even if you don't necessarily agree. Even if it seems like they are overreacting. Even if their behavior is confusing or inconvenient.

#### When you reply with empathy, your child feels heard, seen, and understood.

Empathetic phrases may sound like:

- It looks like you need to cry for a while.
- That sounds really difficult.
- I'm here for you.
- It sounds like you're really worried.
- That hurt, didn't it?
- Let's snuggle for a minute.
- Tell me more.
- This is really important to you.

Take some time over the next week to notice when you use minimizing phrases. Be curious, asking questions like: What was it about that situation that made it difficult to use empathy? What did that situation trigger inside you? How did your child react?

Then, see if you can swap some minimizing with empathy!

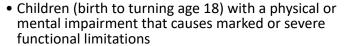


How can SSI for children help?



Who is eligible?

- Stabilizing income for your family and child(ren)
- Income that can be used for supportive services (i.e. therapies, childcare)
- Enhanced health insurance coverage (Medicaid)



- Children and families with low income and resources
- Note: If a child is unmarried, lives with their parents, and their parents do not receive SSI, a portion of the parents' income and resources may be considered



- Find a SOAR provider in your community and talk to them about your child's needs
- Provide information about your child's functioning while at school, at home, at the doctor's office, etc.
- Help identify additional sources of medical or educational documentation
- Connect with family peer networks in your area

# **During Covid19 Pandemic**

The coronavirus pandemic has affected millions of Americans who have suffered hardships over the past several months. Some have lost their jobs and others are working from home while balancing their children's virtual education. As the quarantine has progressed, many are missing the normalcy of social gatherings and other activities outside the home. Though it can be hard to accurately pinpoint the latest trends in drug and alcohol use, there's evidence that the pandemic could be incubating unhealthy coping mechanisms.

A survey conducted by The Recovery Village asked 1,000 lowa adults (ages 18 and older) about their use of drugs/ and alcohol in the past month. Some questions asked respondents to select each option that applied, so in a few instances, the total percentage will be greater than one hundred.

The survey respondents most commonly used:

- Alcohol (75%)
- Marijuana (44%)
- Prescription opioids (31%)
- Benzodiazepines, such as Xanax (6%)
- Methamphetamine (19%)
- Heroin/Fentanyl (6%)
- Cocaine (6%)

Additionally, the participants were asked why they were prompted to use substances within the last month. Of the respondents:

- 50% were trying to cope with stress
- 25% were trying to relieve boredom
- 44% were trying to cope with mental health symptoms, such as anxiety or depression

The results of the survey are concerning. Once people turn to drugs and alcohol, there is concern that it can turn into a substance use disorder, which can sometimes come with co-occurring mental health disorders.

Here are some tips to help reduce stress brought on by the pandemic:

- Setting limits, for example, setting strict time constraints for work or school, and not allowing those activities to blend into family time.
- Limiting exposure to social media and news reporting. If you must watch the news, then set a specific time and only a specific channel. Don't overwhelm yourself as it will only add to the stress.
- 30 minutes a day of walking to get the heart rate up slightly is all we need, three to four times a week.
- Staying hydrated can help with appetite and snacking, remembering to maintain healthy family goals.
- Set dinner time every night for the family. Include rules such as no devices or reading materials at the dinner table. Talk about what is worrying everyone. Including children is an important part as they too are likely feeling stressed.
- Start a new hobby or revive an old one. This is a great time for creativity. This will help with stress relief and positive thinking. Having a hobby can help you to feel part of a social group and will help you to feel much less isolated. Knitting, crochet, painting, ceramics, maybe a DIY home renovation project.

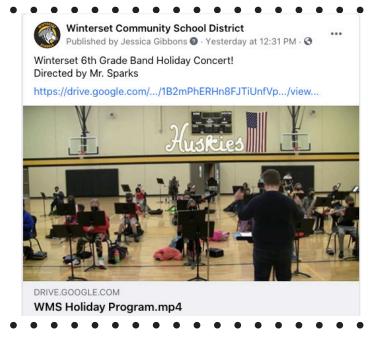
