SUPERINTENDENT MESSAGE

As I sit down to write this month's article, the temperature outside and the recent snowfall make it feel more like December or January than the last week in October. Hopefully, we will get a few more weeks of nice fall weather before winter sets in for good. I wanted to spend this month discussing the work we are engaged in this year that aligns to the district strategic direction of "Leveraging technology to support and extend the traditional classroom." While I am sure the district has been working on this strategic direction for several years, due to the pandemic and the need to educate our students virtually beginning last spring and this fall, this area has risen to the forefront and become our top priority this year. Those of you who have children attending virtually this fall and even those of you whose children are attending onsite have inevitably seen a change in how we are delivering instruction and how your children are accessing course content with

SeeSaw, Google Classroom, Google Hangouts, and Zoom meetings becoming a regular part of your son/daughter's school day. I am sure many of you in your own jobs have seen similar changes in how you engage with colleagues to complete your own work. Like you, I am looking forward to when we can meet in person and attend trainings in person; however, we are all learning and developing new skills that we can add to our tool box to make us more flexible and adaptable as learners and employees, which is what I hope our staff and students take away from these changes as well. In order to support our staff in learning how to better facilitate online learning Corey St John, Director of Teaching and Learning, worked with the AEA to develop a "Going Digital" online teaching and learning self-paced module for our staff to complete this year. The module takes our staff through a series of self-paced online modules teaching them how to become more effective with teaching online. Our staff are "learning by doing" this fall as they work to

navigate teaching students online and in person often simultaneously, which is no small task. I couldn't be prouder of our staff and how they have embraced this challenge. While the transition hasn't always been easy and our staff are working harder than they ever have, we are seeing great things emerge out of this process. Our teachers are learning how to engage students in new ways and are learning how to engage students in collaborating with their peers who are joining class virtually. Our virtual learners and families Out of challenges and in have shared feedback and worked with us to better serve their children. Our teachers are quickly learning and adapting to a new way of teaching that they had never been asked to do before and are constantly looking for ways comfort zones, which is to grow and improve. The blended learning platforms opportunity we are creating will be something our staff and students can build on and further develop each year, which would truly allow us to "leverage technology to support and extend the traditional classroom." Our

challenge is to look at the changes we were forced to make this year that have truly improved how we operate as a district and then continue to grow and expand on them moving forward.

Like all of you, I am ready for the pandemic to end and for the opportunity to get back to some sense of normalcy. However, not looking at this as an opportunity to evaluate what we were doing prior to pandemic and hanging onto what we have always done would be a mistake. times of adversity we get to choose how we will respond; let's all respond by coming away stronger and better prepared to navigate change in the future. All of us have been pushed out of our when we have the greatest for growth. Let's all continue to grow and learn from this pandemic as we strive to continuously improve ourselves and our district.

Nice work, Tim!!





REQUIRED IMMUNIZATIONS & SCREENINGS

All Kindergarten students must be up to date on their preschool shots and have received their 4-yearold boosters of Dtap, Polio, MMR and Varicella.

All 7th grade (and above) students must show proof of having received a Tdap (Tetanus/Acellular Pertusis) vaccination booster AND a Meningococcal vaccination on or after 10 years of age.

All 12th grade students must show proof of receiving 2 DOSES of Meningococcal vaccine; or 1 dose if first dose was received at 16 years of age or older.

All Kindergarten students must have a dental screen performed between the ages of 3 and 6 years old with a dental certificate on file. All 9th grade students must have a current (within the past 12 months) dental certificate on file.

All Kindergarten and 3rd grade students must have a current (within the past 12 months) vision certificate on file.

This is a great time to encourage your child to thank the essential workers where you live and remind your child that we all have a very important job of stopping the virus together -- which is why everyone is wearing masks.

Questions to Ask Your Child

Today, October 9/ 2020 the state allocated approximately \$14.5 million of federal CARES Act funds for utility assistance programs (the Small <u>Business Utility Disruption Prevention Program</u> launched in mid-July).
