Guidance:

Over the last couple of weeks during guidance class we have been discussing making safe decisions and choices. At the younger grade levels (K-3) we have discussed eight "Never Never Rules". Ask your child to name them and talk about the reasoning behind them. They are experts!

At all grade levels (K-5) we have discussed the "3 Rs"-Recognize, Refuse, and Report.

I remind them to listen to their inner warning system to help them **Recognize** when something is unsafe or not a good choice. They are encouraged to stop and think before they do something.

If they determine that something is not a safe choice then they have practiced through role playing being assertive and **Refusing** to participate.

After they **Refuse**, they practice walking away and making a **Report** to a trusted adult. We have talked about the difference between tattling and **Reporting**. Please discuss this important distinction with your child, as sometimes they may not report something that is important out of fear of being labeled a "tattletale". We also have discussed the importance of **Reporting** to more than one adult if the first person you speak to doesn't give you the help you need. In class I have taught the students that it is an adult's job to keep them safe, however they have the important responsibility of listening to and following safety rules, and using their good decision making skills to make safe and smart choices.

Lastly, we have learned about the "Always Ask First Rule". Students have been taught that for their safety they should always ask a parent or the adult in charge before they go somewhere, eat or drink something that has been offered to them, or accept a gift. I tell them that practicing this rule with small things can make it a matter of habit as the stakes get higher as they get older.

The students are really enjoying this unit and I love teaching them assertiveness and self-advocacy. Your children are a great bunch of humans!

Reminder from the School Nurse:

We have recently seen an increase of ticks on students now that the weather is warmer. Ticks can transmit serious and potentially fatal diseases like Lyme disease. Frequent tick checks increase the likelihood of finding a tick

before it can transmit disease.

The CDC recommends conducting a full body check upon return from potentially tick-infested areas, including your own backyard. Check these parts of your body and your child's body for ticks:

- Under the arms
- In and around the ears
- Inside belly button
- Back of the knees
- In and around the hair
- Between the legs
- Around the waist

If you are feeling ill, or have developed a fever or rash following a potential tick bite, call your doctor immediately. Thank you for your help in keeping our school healthy! - Kristin Martin, RN, BSN
