Mountain Home High School Career Academies

- Approximately 900 students in grades 10-12
- 3 Wall-to-Wall Career Academies established in 2003
 - ACME: Agriculture, Construction,
 Manufacturing, and Engineering
 - CAB: Communications, Arts, and Business
 - HHS: Health and Human Services
 Each of these has an academy leader and one
 TOSA (teacher on special assignment) leads the whole academy program
- Block Scheduling
- Concurrent and dual credit with ASUMH
- 20 student pathway options that span from K-14



Community Engagement for Real-World Learning

- Academy Business Advisory Board:
 Approximately 25 community and business partners who meet quarterly to advise Academy leadership
- CTE Business Advisory Board: Business members and CTE teachers collaborate quarterly on career-related educational issues
- Mentoring: Community members are paired with advisory (homeroom) classes for monthly visits/lessons
- Internships/Apprenticeships/Service Learning
