- 1. List various communication strategies used in your school to provide additional information to parents and to increase parent and family engagement in supporting classroom instruction.
 - The school will create a Web site to house classroom Web sites for each teacher. Homework assignments and pertinent classroom information will be available on classroom Web sites. Also, parents and families can access their child's grades using a PIN number they received at the beginning of the school year. Parents may use email to communicate with members of the school staff.
 - The school will provide to parents reports/report cards every four weeks with information regarding their child's academic progress and upcoming classroom and school events.
 - Invite parents and families to special programs, such as internet safety, living wax museum, math and literacy nights.
 - The school will distribute a monthly newsletter (Blimey Notes) to parents and families that is developed with
 participation of the PTO, principal, staff and parent volunteers. It includes school news, a calendar of school
 activities, and parenting tips related to school achievement such as homework tips, organizational skills, and
 study skills.
 - The school will send parents a parent-friendly letter with the ACT Aspire scores that explains their child's test results and suggestions for continuing their child's learning.

• Teachers will hold conferences individually with parents/families of children in their classrooms. Parents/families will be given a summary of the student's test scores and Measures for Academic Progress (MAP) scores. Student's individual goals will be discussed along with an explanation of the interventions and/or enrichment activities teachers are using to assist the child in reaching achievement goals. Parents/families will be asked to engage in discussion of how they can support these efforts. Parents/families will also be given suggestions for coordinating school-parent efforts and explanations of homework and grading procedures.

3. How will your school provide information to parents about volunteer opportunities (must include state mandated parent training)?

- The school will work with Cedarville Elementary School and Cedarville Middle School to help provide a smooth transition from one school to the next by raising parent awareness of procedures and related activities. The school will host special orientation programs for parents and students to help with the transition. Parents/families will have the opportunity to meet the new teachers at the beginning of the school year.
- Provide instruction to a parent on how to incorporate developmentally appropriate learning activities in the home environment, including without limitation: role play and demonstration by trained volunteer, the use of and access to the Department of Education website tools for parents/families, assistance with nutritional meal planning and preparation and other strategies or curricula developed or acquired by the school district for athome parental instruction approved by the Department of Education.
- The State Board of Education's Standards for Accreditation of Arkansas Public Schools and School Districts shall require no fewer than two (2) hours of professional development for teachers designed to enhance the understand of effective parental engagement strategies. No fewer that three (3) hours of professional development for administrators designed to enhance understanding of effective parent engagement strategies and the importance of administrative leadership in setting expectations and creating a climate conducive to parental participation.
- The 8th grade students attend an orientation in the spring that allows parents/families and students time to learn about smart core and graduation requirements, class schedule and high school expectations.
- The school website has volunteer forms that are easily accessible to all parents and families.

4. How will your school work with parents to create a School-Parent-Compact?

- School staff, parents, families, and students have developed a school-parent-student compact. This compact will outline how families, school staff, and students share the responsibility for improving student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the state's high academic standards. The Title I committee, made up of teachers, parents, family members and school staff, will determine the effectiveness of the parental and family engagement plan and make changes if warranted. While collecting evidence about satisfaction with the program and the school's efforts to increase parental engagement will be a part of the evaluation, the survey will also collect specific information on the (1) growth in number of parents participating in workshops and meetings; (2) specific needs of parents; (3) effectiveness of specific strategies; and (4) engagement of parents/families in activities to support student academic growth.
