KINDERGARTEN READINESS

One of the targets of the new vision of education in Kansas is Kindergarten Readiness. Research shows that student success in kindergarten and in later years depends largely upon experiences during the first five years of life. Early exposure to learning through strong home environments where educational skills are taught and reinforced, to pre-schools and other early learning programs that teach basic learning skills, allow most children to develop higher literacy and numeracy skills than peers who do not receive the enrichment. Kindergarten readiness is an essential element in the future success of a student.

The success gap between Kansas students entering kindergarten is large. Some students arrive at school reading significantly above their grade level while other students arrive without any knowledge of their ABC's. This gap is also true for social-emotional behaviors and self-help abilities. Kansas is implementing a statewide screening tool. This screening tool is NOT to keep young children from beginning kindergarten but rather to provide a snap-shot of where every child is at developmentally when they begin kindergarten. The ONLY requirement for entry into kindergarten is that a child must be 5 years old on or before August 31st.


Across the country, across the state, and across our communities you can see children spending countless hours developing skills in sports, watching t.v., playing electronic games, etc... but there is an epidemic happening across all of those areas too. Children are missing out on vital skills that will impact their education for their life-time. Yes, we believe students need to be kid, have fun, learn the lessons of practicing a sport or a hobby, however, unfortunately for many children there needs to be a focus on literacy and numeracy skills.

Early childhood experiences (Birth-Age 8) set the foundation for health, physical well-being, and development of cognitive, communication, and social-emotional skills necessary for school success. School readiness happens within many different areas: communities, educational environment, family, and the individual child. All of these areas are systems of support that are interdependent and influence each other. To enhance a child's ability to thrive in a learning environment and create a foundation for school readiness it is important that there are effective state and local policies in place that are targeted and funded appropriately.

The developmental snap-shot tool will examine a kindergartner's development in the areas of language and literacy, cognitive and problem solving, physical well-being and motor development, and social-emotional development. The snapshot will use observations of the child's skills and abilities as provided by families and the teachers. It is also aligned with Kansas standards and tools already used in kindergarten settings. Families, teachers, administrators and leaders can use data-informed decision making plan strategically in the home, classroom, district, and community to support early learners.

The Ages-Stages Questionnaire {ASQ-3} that USD 330 will be using will help to guide decision making on the best ways to continue to provide the best education to the youngest learners in the district.

THE SKILL CALLED SELF-REGULATION

All junior high and high school teachers received training in October on building the skill of self-regulation in students through school-wide implementation of teaching the skill set, modeling it to students, and implementing the skill at the classroom level. Starting in November and through December, we will begin training our students how to self-regulate and then integrate opportunities for them to use these skills in their classes.

What is self-regulation? Simply defined, it is; *Making a plan, monitoring that plan, making changes to stay on track, and reflecting on what worked.*

The ability to self-regulate ourselves helps each of us be successful in life. While no one is perfect at self-regulation, we all can reflect on things we wish we self-regulated better. Maybe it is going to bed on time, eating better to lose weight, saving more money for retirement, cleaning the house regularly, managing emotions and impulses, getting to work on time, spending more time with your children.

It is known that a student's physical and social environment can have a profound effect on how well they do in school, and plenty of evidence suggests the same is true of a student's ability to self-regulate. The self-regulation skills of preschoolers have actually been linked to their eventual SAT scores. Difficulty with self-regulation translates into poor work habits, trouble concentrating, low motivation, and behavioral problems, some so extreme that they lead to severe school consequences.

Some examples of what a student with good self-regulation skills demonstrates at school:

- Set classroom performance goals and make a plan to reach them
- Can manage assignments that last for multiple school days by making a step-by-step plan
- Take effective notes and use them to study
- Plans their time and busy schedule to be successful at school
- Arrive at school on time, which is the same as getting to a job on time
- Turns assignments in on time
- Complete their school work to the best of their ability
- Does not speak or act inappropriately or impulsively
- Reflects on their actions and makes a plan to improve
- Manages cell phone use appropriately
- Communicates appropriately in person and on social media
- Works well with others

A fundamental purpose of Mission Valley Junior/Senior High School is for each student to learn and achieve to their maximum potential. To that end, a student's inability to self-regulate their emotions and actions can have a significantly negative impact to their success at school. We ask that parents visit the website resources listed below to learn more about self-regulation and to partner with the school to support this effort. The impact we can make together can help your student reach their potential at school and also have a life-long impact in their academics now and in the future, working successfully in their future job employments, and managing their personal life.

REGULAR BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING – October 9, 2017

Clinton Lambotte called the regular meeting of the Board of Education of Mission Valley USD #330 to order at 7:00 p.m. in the board conference room in Eskridge, Kansas. Board members present were Tom Phillips, Rex Kraus, Jon Deters, Debbi Childers and Clipper Goodrich. Jim Rudeen was absent. The superintendent and board clerk also attended.

Tom Phillips moved, seconded by Rex Kraus, to adopt the agenda as presented. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Mistina Kraus addressed the board regarding teacher retention, salaries and the schools website.

Good News included; MV PTO president, Kim Sims; vice-president, Bailey Becker and PTO member Sherri Jacobson attended. The PTO was recognized and thanked for their \$5,000 donation for the outdoor pavilion, at the walk a thon this year they raised a little over \$4,700. Mission Valley was chosen to host sub-state volleyball on October 21st.

Rex Kraus moved, seconded by Tom Phillips, to approve the consent agenda as presented. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Items in the consent agenda that were approved include: approval of minutes of the September 11, 2017 regular board meeting; approval of clerk's report and treasurer's report as presented; approval of warrants in the amount of \$126,035.07; approval of extra duty pay in the amount of \$1,181.00; approval of transfers from the general fund to the at-risk fund in the amount of \$10,000.00 and from the general fund to the vocational education fund in the amount of \$25,000; approval of administrators written reports as presented; approval of the following appointments: hiring of Jamie Brammell as paraprofessional effective 9/25/17.

The board discussed the possibility of hiring a head maintenance position, this will be revisited at the November board meeting.

No After Prom sponsor attended to discuss their request for transportation.

Tom Phillips moved, seconded by Debbi Childers, to approve paying \$1,035.00 towards the FBLA fall leadership conference in St. Louis, MO. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Rex Kraus moved, seconded by Clipper Goodrich, to approve the Apptegy Website proposal in the amount of \$17,800 split into 4 yearly payments of \$4,450. Motion passed 6 to 0.

The board reviewed the bid list for a new 10 passenger van; bid opening is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, November 9, 2017.

The board reviewed the bid list for a new 59 passenger bus; bid opening is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, November 9, 2017. The board requested bids that included cameras and bids without cameras.

Rex Kraus moved, seconded by Debbi Childers, to approve a special board meeting for November 13th, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. for the purpose of the superintendent evaluation. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Tom Phillips moved, seconded by Rex Kraus, to approve the audit report from Clubine and Rettele. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Rex Kraus moved, seconded by Clipper Goodrich, to approve policy ING (Animals and Plants in the School). Motion passed 6 to 0.

Administrators gave building and program updates.

Jim Rudeen joined the meeting at 7:55 p.m.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tom Phillips, to go into executive session at 7:58 p.m. to discuss an individual employee's performance pursuant to non-elected personnel exception under KOMA, and that they return to open session in the same room at 8:03 p.m. Motion passed unanimously. The superintendent, David Cromer and Brett Fenton also attended.

The meeting reconvened in open session at 8:03 p.m.

Tom Phillips moved, seconded by Clipper Goodrich, to go into executive session at 8:05 p.m. to discuss the latest negotiations proposals pursuant to the exception for employer-employee negotiations under KOMA, and that they return to open session in the same room at 8:15 p.m. Motion passed unanimously. The superintendent and board clerk attended.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Tom Phillips, to go back into executive session at 9:28 p.m. to discuss confidential student information pursuant to the exception relating to actions adversely or favorably affecting a student under KOMA, and that they return to open session in the same room at 9:43 p.m. Motion passed unanimously.

Clinton Lambotte moved, seconded by Clipper Goodrich, to go back into executive session at 9:46 p.m. to discuss confidential student information pursuant to the exception relating to actions adversely or favorably affecting a student under KOMA, and that they return to open session in the same room at 9:56 p.m. Motion passed unanimously. The superintendent also attended.

The meeting reconvened in open session at 9:56 p.m.

Clipper Goodrich moved, seconded by Jim Rudeen, to adjourn the meeting. Motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 9:57 p.m.
