Save Me a Seat by Sarah Weeks and Gita Varadarajan

Joe and Ravi might be from very different places, but they're both stuck in the same place: SCHOOL. Joe's lived in the same town all his life, and was doing just fine until his best friends moved away and left him on his own. Ravi's family just moved to America from India, and he's finding it pretty hard to figure out where he fits in. Joe and Ravi don't think they have anything in common -- but soon enough they have a common enemy (the biggest bully in their class) and a common mission: to take control of their lives over the course of a single crazy week.

This tale of two students from different cultures explores the journey that they take while trying to find their place in the world. Told from both characters' perspective, this exploration of friendship and discovery is equally painful and heartwarming. This is a story to which many can relate. Added bonus- The authors included recipes that feature prominently in the text.

Maximum Ride: The Angel Experiment by James Patterson

Fourteen-year-old Maximum Ride, better known as Max, knows what it's like to soar above the world. She and all the members of the "Flock"-- Fang and Iggy, both 13, Nudge, 11, Gazzy, 8, and Angel, 6—were all created as experiments in a lab called the School. They are just like ordinary kids--only they have wings and can fly. Jeb, a sympathetic scientist, helped them escape and, since then, they've been living on their own. It may seem like a dream come true to some, but their lives can morph into a living nightmare at any time--like when Angel, the youngest member of the "Flock," is kidnapped and taken back to the "School" to live like a lab rat again. Her friends brave a journey to blazing hot Death Valley, CA, to save Angel, but soon enough, they find themselves in yet another nightmare--this one involves fighting off the half-human, half-wolf "Erasers" in New York City. Whether in the treetops of Central Park or in the depths of the Manhattan subway system, Max and her adopted family take the ride of their lives. Along the way Max discovers from her old friend Jeb--now her greatest enemy--that her purpose is to save the world--but can she?

A page-turning book filled with adventure and a little bit of science fiction. The first in a series, this book will surely not be the last you read this summer!

Masterminds by Gordon Korman

Eli Frieden lives in the most perfect town in the world: Serenity, New Mexico. Honesty and integrity are valued above all else. The thirty kids who live there never lie—they know it's a short leap from that to the awful problems of other, less fortunate places.

Eli has never left Serenity . . . why would he ever want to? Then one day, he bikes to the edge of the city limits and something so crazy and unexpected happens, it changes everything. Eli convinces his friends to help him investigate further, and soon it becomes clear that nothing is as it seems in Serenity. The clues mount to reveal a shocking discovery, connecting their ideal crime-free community to some of the greatest criminal masterminds ever known. The kids realize they can trust no one—least of all their own parents.

This is a unique and action-packed story that is filled with twists and turns. With characters that you can't help but root for, this first book in a series will take readers on a wild ride with terrific humor and a surprising mystery.

Ghost by Jason Reynolds

Running. That's all Ghost (real name Castle Cranshaw) has ever known. But Ghost has been running for the wrong reasons—it all started with running away from his father, who, when Ghost was a very little boy, chased him and his mother through their apartment, then down the street, with a gun. Since then, Ghost has been the one causing problems—and running away from them—until he meets Coach, an ex-Olympic Medalist who sees something in Ghost: crazy natural talent. If Ghost can stay on track, literally and figuratively, he could be the best sprinter in the city.

In this realistic fiction novel, the story of Ghost's evolving relationships with his anger, with his ever-worried mother, with Coach Brody and with running is a joy to read. Ghost is about kids who are, in both senses, running for their lives, and the generous souls who help them along the way.
