Trump's Policies

The 2016 Presidential Election is over. Trump has become the President-elect of the United States. Whether you agree with his ideas or not, it is critically important to understand his policies before passing judgement. There is definitely confusion about some of his key policies, such as his stance on immigration. This confusion has led to hysteria among US citizens and even among the rest of the world. The following information on immigration, abortion, gay marriage, and education will answer your questions on his policies as it is cited directly from his website and from his most recent interviews

Trump's most well known stance is his position on immigration. Many believe that he will deport Latinos or that he is against all Latinos. However, that is not true. Trump will deport illegal immigrants. He isn't against legal immigration of Latinos. In fact, all the deported immigrants are given a chance to come back through legal immigration. Criminals will, of course, stay in their home countries. How will he distinguish between criminals and those who are good-hearted? Immigrants will go through a process known as vetting, which is just a fancy word for investigation. Any Latino who isn't a criminal and is willing to work hard will be granted

the same opportunity as any other immigrant.

For students, education and college loans are important. What is Trump's stance on this issue? Regarding education, he believes that education should be regulated at the local/state level, mentioning, "We cannot have the bureaucrats in Washington telling you how to manage your child's education." He's also not okay with our college loans, saying, "These student loans are probably one of the only things our government shouldn't make money off of and yet it does." He believes that every child deserves an equally great opportunity to education no matter what their background is; hence, he will add \$20 billion towards school choice. States that heavily support school choice and privatization of education will be favored in this investment. School choice allows parents and students to select a school, public or private, that will best serve the students' needs/wants. School choice increases competition between schools, which then directly leads to the betterment of such schools. And more importantly, it gives access to greater educational opportunities to disadvantaged kids. Regarding abortion, gay marriage, and the LGBTQ+ community, Trump has a variety of positions.

On abortion, Trump used to be pro-choice, but now he is pro-life. However, he supports abortion in cases involving rape, incest, and where the life of the mother is concerned. Trump also wants to appoint judges that would repeal the Supreme Court decision that allowed women to have the right to have an abortion. While Trump supports some women's healthcare issues, he wants to defund Planned Parenthood because of its focus on abortions. Simply put, he believes that states should be the ones controlling issues pertaining to women's health. On gay marriage, he doesn't believe in interfering with the Supreme Court decision that protected the fundamental right to marry for same-sex couples nationwide. However, the LGBTQ+ community may be at a disadvantage because he may nominate judges and other officials who disagree with this ruling. Trump may have been one of the most polarizing candidates ever. Pushing a campaign to "drain the swamp" and make Americans stop singing to the "false song of globalism," Trump managed to secure 270 electoral votes and win the election.
