The regular meeting of the Board of Education, White Salmon Valley School District, Klickitat and Skamania Counties, White Salmon, WA was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Thursday, May 27, 2021, at the Columbia High School Library, located at 1455 NW Bruin Country Rd., White Salmon WA 98672, and via a ZOOM public meeting per Senate Concurrent Resolution 8402 (2021), extending the Governor's emergency proclamations, including 20-28 "until the termination of the state emergency pursuant to RCW 43.06.210 or until rescinded by gubernatorial or legislative action, whichever occurs first." Present: Chairman Paul Mosbrucker, Alan Reitz, Andrea VanSickle, William Gross, Laurie Stanton, Supt. Jerry Lewis, and guests.

Student Presentation: Brenda Hope, Haley Harkema, and Kelly Hume presented to the board, sharing what services have been offered throughout the year for ELL students. There was also discussion of the barriers that students, staff, and families faced in providing and accessing services, as well as potential future supports that could be offered.

A video was shared with the board highlighting both ELL and A-list Adventure students.

Rachel Suits presented to the board about the services A-list has been able to provide to students and families throughout the year. Rachel discussed academic engagement, family engagement, barriers, and successes the program has seen.

Columbia High School students, led by Jack Perrin, presented their experience as part of Project Invent, and their first-place award in their recent competition. The group shared a video that highlighted their device design to help a student with communication needs. The board congratulated the students on their design and success.

Andrea VanSickle moved to adopt the agenda. Seconded by Laurie Stanton. Carried.

Laurie Stanton moved to accept the Consent Agenda; April 2021 board minutes and general fund bills including checks 52345 through 52411, totaling \$126,478.23. ASB fund checks 52488 through 52458, totaling \$3,964.93. Capital Project checks 52459 through 52464, totaling \$147,340.30. Electronic deposits to the Department of Revenue of \$485.12 and \$114.73. Payroll checks 52412 through 52447 including electronic deposits and payroll tax in the amount of \$1,112,491.75 Seconded by Andrea VanSickle. Carried.

- a) Enrollment Report: Dr. Lewis reported that the district enrollment decreased by 1.58 FTE equaling a yearly average decline of approximately 102 FTE below the budgeted projection.
- b) District Instruction and Learning: Dr. Lewis shared that the administrators worked with an ESD facilitator, to complete the 2021-2022 OSPI Academic and Student Well-Being Plan. The plan was shared with the board. Dr. Lewis stated that this will be an ongoing plan that will be updated throughout the 21-22 school year, as state and federal guidance and requirements change. The plan will be submitted Tuesday pending board approval. The board also discussed the potential funding changes and how they can work with WSSDA to represent the district.

At 8:48 p.m. Chairman Mosbrucker announced the board would adjourn to exempt session, closed to the public, for 25 minutes to discuss Bargaining per RCW 42.30.140(4)(b), and that action will be taken upon their return. The board reconvened to open session at 9:10 p.m.

Laurie Stanton moved to approve the Classified Union contract for the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 school years. Seconded by William Gross. Carried.

At 9:12 p.m. Chairman Mosbrucker announced that the board would adjourn to executive session, closed to the public, for 15 minutes to discuss Personnel per RCW 42:30.110(g), and that action will be taken upon their return. The board reconvened to open session at 9:26 p.m.

William Gross moved to approve the leave request of Haley Ortega, Henkle Middle School Principal, Leo Ortega, Whitson Elementary Paraeducator, Brian Morris, Columbia High School Vice Principal, and Kelly Hume, Columbia High School Teacher. Seconded by Laurie Stanton. Carried.

Andrea VanSickle moved to approve the leave replacement of Brian Morris, Henkle Middle School Principal, and Kelly Hume, Columbia High School Dean of Students. Seconded by Alan Reitz. Carried.

At 9:28 p.m. Chairman Mosbrucker adjourned the meeting with a motion by Andrea VanSickle. Seconded by William Gross. Carried.

#### Wrapping up the year...

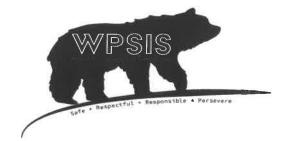
In all honesty, this year has provided me hope that our district will bend and flex to meet the needs of our students and community. With a whirlwind of expectations that were constantly changing and in motion from OSPI and the Health Department, our middle school staff continued to unite and conquer the ongoing challenges one step at a time. Through ongoing collaboration, providing space for sharing and honoring the reality of our "new" way of teaching and learning, as well as continuing to keep students at the center of our conversations, we persevered. I am extremely proud of all of our staff, students, and families.

**New Systems:** Many new systems came out of this year that will be implemented in the future: google classroom platform (which I created one for my staff too!), essential learning standards (this has been ongoing work aligned to standards based grading), weekly family communication, student voice in decision making, intentional SEL lessons, and more.

In the future: I would have loved to see the calendar be centered around best practices for students - later start time (all staff have prep before students arrive, allowing for smaller class sizes so we are not relying on specialists for prep time), shaving off 2-3 weeks of summer and adding in the breaks during the year so there is less learning recovery taking place every year and moving PLC's to the morning vs. afternoon so all staff (including coaches) can be apart of the PD, SIP implementation, and school culture.

Report to the School Board, May 2021 Wallace and Priscilla Stevenson Intermediate School

What a year. We made it through safely and continued to make academic progress the best we could in all models of learning. I want to commend all our staff here at WPSIS for the effort they put in to care for our kids and the flexibility and innovation they showed. We are all ready for a well-deserved break.

We are now turning first to recovery services, then to planning ahead for next year. School ended on June 10<sup>th</sup>, and the next Monday we had some English Learning students back in for two weeks of enrichment. Thanks to Geri Dennis, Megan Sheffels, and Karynn Campbell for leading these classes, and to Brenda Hope for her help coordinating. We currently have about 15 students in grades 4-6 participating. In July we will have A-List adventures supporting our kids and community, and we are planning for another two weeks of Summer recovery classes from August 2<sup>th</sup> to August 12<sup>th</sup>.

As promised in my last report, a quick recap of our local data on student performance: it came out as expected. Students made similar progress in reading to a 'normal' year as measured by the F&P test. That includes students who participated in intervention services through Title 1, which is great as they are targeted for services due to slower progress compared to their peers, so average growth is accelerated for those students. There were many who did not participate fully in the interventions and therefore made less progress.

In our ELA and Math curriculums we targeted a smaller number of standards and skills. When compared to prepandemic years we are 'behind', but we knew when OSPI asked us to identify target standards and leave some out that this would be the case. We made expected progress towards targeted standards and we know what has and has not been covered systematically so we will be able to teach 'unlearned skills' as we move towards having more time in the classroom.

We ended the year with our typical field day, though a COVID safe version this year, and did our best to help kids be excited to come back next year. Class announcements will go home with report cards along with supply list so kids will know who their homeroom teacher will be next year and have time to prepare.

Thank you for all of your support for our students and staff through this challenging year. I am looking forward to more normalcy next year, and also leveraging new skills we have learned this year to come out of the pandemic with a stronger system of education than we had before.

On a personal note, my wife and I are expecting our second child in November! We plan to take two short trips this summer but mostly will enjoy time as a family at home and hopefully get Elliott pedaling on his new bike. He's really excited about it, but he's also 2 and even a small bike is big when you're 2.
