RHS: An "A" School Again!

Ruston High School Recognized as an "A" School Earns Top Gaines Honoree/ Earns Opportunity Honoree

As it has done several times over the years, Ruston High School (RHS) has once again been recognized by the Louisiana State Department of Education, in terms of School Performance Scores, as an "A" school. RHS is ranked in the top four among public, non open-enrollment 5A schools in Louisiana.

Performance Scores, as an "A" school. RHS is ranked in the top four among public, non open-enrollment 5A schools in Louisiana.

The Louisiana State Department of Education measures school performance scores based on 1) Assessment Index, 2) Growth Index, 3) Interest and Opportunities, 4)

Strength of Diploma, and 5) Cohort Graduation Rate. This year, RHS total score was 102, up 2.1 points from last year's "A" school rating.

RHS was also proudly named a Top Gains Honoree for progress index. The progress index is a measure that recognizes the growth made by all students. Adding to that, RHS was also recognized as an Opportunity Honoree. This recognition is earned for being in the top 10% for performance among students with disabilities, English Language Learners, or economically disadvantaged students.

RHS is known for the 3 R's: Respect, Responsibility, and Ready. The score shows that staff, faculty, and students collectively take those seriously. In the area of academic excellence, RHS offers 18 dual enrollment courses in which students can earn up to 52 hours of college credit in addition to the high school credit on transcripts. RHS also

offers students the chance to take eight Advanced Placement (AP) courses where students can earn up to 48 hours of college credit based on their test scores.

RHS provides students in many areas the chance to get certified in various fields. From Microsoft Office and Adobe to various agriculture certifications, certifications are also available in health care, to include Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA). RHS also features a variety of courses in the arts, foreign languages, sports training, radio broadcasting and media, robotics team, speech and debate program, and Eco Car. Many of these not only provide students with the opportunity to learn or certify, but to

compete against other schools and excel as well.

RHS Principal Dan Gressett says, "I am so proud of our students, faculty, staff, parents, and all stakeholders for Ruston High School being named an "A" school again. I realize the hard work it takes to be a successful school and our faculty and students work tirelessly to make that happen. While RHS is much more than a number or a rating, we do take pride in being recognized for all of the good things happening here.

Former Louisiana Teacher of the Year Emily Howell, who is very proactive in all RHS academics from teachers to students, states, "I am so proud of the continued excellence of Ruston High School. We outscore many of the magnet and selective admissions schools in the state. We teach every child, every day, making an effort to give all kids a quality education."

There is no doubt that RHS proudly represents our community and receives tremendous support from community leaders as well as local businesses. Parents and students benefit as well as the community when all work towards the best interest of the students in local schools. 
Family and Consumer Science News


FBLA Friendsgiving

The Ruston High School (RHS) Bearcats head into the playoffs ranked #1 in Class 5A after taking their first district title in 2-5A with their hard fought 35-17 victory of the West Monroe Rebels. At the conclusion of the regular season, it was truly evident that the team had worked well on both offense and defense. Looking behind the scenes and just the scoreboard, the statistics for this year's team in the regular season and in the playoffs was impressive.

The regular season ended with QB Jaden Osborne passing for over 1200 yards passing, 13 TD throws, and only 2 interceptions. He also has 246 yards rushing for 1 TD. On the ground, the 'Cats top rushers and scorers for the 'Cats were Dyson Fields with 10 TDS and 769 yards rushing; Jordan Hayes with 7 TDS and 793 yards rushing; Jayden Mayfield with 6 TDs and 150 yards rushing; Lajaveon Ellis with 4 TDS and 290 yards rushing; Dylon Brooks with 2 TDs and 116 yards rushing; Josh Brantley with 2 TDs and 75 yards rushing; and Lander Smith with 1 TD and 49 yards rushing. The top 3 receivers in the air attack were Aaron Jackson with 8 TDs on 715 yards receiving; Zhy Scott with 3 TDs on 208 yards receiving; and Logan Malone with 1 TD on 256 yards receiving. Christian Davis also caught a 4-yard TD pass. In the kicking game, Will Fendly has connected on a field goal and 26 point after attempts; RJ Brown connected on a field goal and 17 point after attempts; and Jack Elliot connected on 2 point after attempts.

The defensive side of the ball also had some outstanding numbers.
