Bearcats Shine on the Miss Louisiana's Teen Stage



In the above, one rule would seem to be anti-student (it's more pro-education) and the other pro-student (again - it's actually pro-education). It comes down to what is best for the overall environment at RHS for education. To argue simply out of personal or selfish reasons is frugal, and doesn't serve the greater good. Agree or not, these are the rules and policies along with many others that we must abide by or change the right way.



FBLA Top in the State Yet Again!


RHS Captures 18 State Titles

RHS FBLA members were all recognized at the state conference for their success. Noted was that underclassmen Matthew Daulton and Melissa Le each were part of two state championship events. Several members earned their 2nd or 3rd state championships in FBLA, and four new members began their FBLA careers as state champions: Amarion Rushing, Austin Guillory, Melissa Le and MaLeeh Freeman.

All state champions this year received plaques and monetary awards from the state FBLA chapter. In addition, RHS FBLA awarded stipends towards nationals. With the Who's Who title, Atlis Brit won \$500 and will also receive another additional state stipend to attend nationals as she will automatically take the stage at the National Conference with all other state Who's Who winners.

Congratulations to the RHS FBLA members and winners for yet another great year so far. Students who qualified for nationals will continue their preparations for their events as well as begin fundraising activities to cover the cost of nationals. 
Emily Stutzman 5th. In the shot put, Jordan Tate placed 2nd, Joumi Douglas 3rd, and Zykera Sutton 5th.

RHS Baseball Marches into April

Bearcats Begin 1st Round in the State Playoffs STAFF REPORT

As of last press on March 23, 2023, the Ruston High School (RHS) baseball team had vastly improved their record and stood at 13-6 (1-1) as they prepared to hit the road for a district contest against Pineville after totally dominating at Glenbrook just two days prior. At Pineville, the 'Cats took care of business and took the shutout win 11-0, bringing their record to 14-6 (2-1).

Two days later on March 25, 2023, they returned home to face Pineville again. In the rematch, it was once again all 'Cats as the swept the series with a 12-3 win to move to

The 'Cats then took on Calvary Baptist in a non-district game. In this defensive game, the 'Cats would fall 3-5 to move to 15-7 (3-1). The 'Cats then closed out March with a March 30, 2023, district showdown at home against West Ouachita, where 'Cats pitcher Talan Billberry pitched a no-hitter as the 'Cats won the shutout 11-0, moving to 16-7 (4-1).

On April 1, 2023, the 'Cats travelled to West Ouachita for their 2nd contest against them, where they not only shutout the opponent, but for the 2nd straight game, a RHS pitcher (Nick Robinson) pitched a no-hitter as the 'Cats won 9-0 and moved to 17-7 (5-1). On April 4, 2023, the 'Cats remained on the road for a non-district showdown with Sterlington. Against Sterlington, the 'Cats dropped a close one in extra innings 3-4 to move to 17-8 (5-1).

The 'Cats returned to district play by hosting Ouachita on April 6, 2023, and then turn right back around and travel to Ouachita the next day. In these games, it was all 'Cats as they took both games with huge scores: 14-4 and 24-4, to win 7 straight district games and move to 19-8 (7-1). Afterward, it was back to a non-district opponent as the 'Cats hosted Oak Grove on April 8, 2023, winning the game in a short 6 innings, 13-3, moving to 20-8 (7-1).

The 'Cats then returned home for a non-district game again Ouachita Christian on April 11, 2023, where the 'Cats dropped a close one, 607, moving to 20-9 (7-1).

District title hopes loomed as the 'Cats took on last year's state champion West Monroe in a home and away series on April 13, 2023, and April 15, 2023. In these contests, both teams sported identical 7-1 district records, and both teams were winners of 7 straight district conference games. In game 1, the 'Cats played tough but fell 3-4, taking them to 20-10 (7-2). With the title on the line, and power points at play for the playoffs, game 2 would decide the district champions. In game 2, the 'Cats struggled at the plate and fell 1-8, dropping to 20-11 (7-3).

The 'Cats closed out the regular season against non-district Mangham, in a game in which they played solid defense to win 3-2, ending the regular season at 21-11 (7-3). On May 18, 2023, the LHSSA released the playoff brackets, and RHS baseball was seeded # 19. In the first round, the 'Cats will hit the road to face #14 seeded Destrehan,

with the winner headed to play #3 Sulphur. Game 1 will be on April 21, 2023, with a double header scheduled on April 22, 2023, in this best of 3 series. Bearcat baseball looks to make a strong run in the playoffs and encourages all of Bearcat Nation to come out and support them in their efforts as they continue to show how well RHS sports are this year as they pursue their own shot at a state title.



Qualified members of the Ruston High School (RHS) powerlifting team headed south to compete at the state meet held in the Cajun Dome at the University of Louisiana -Lafayette (ULL) on March 24-25, 2023. The girls' powerlifters included Taylor Durrett, Madison Jacks, and Syrianna Mack. The boys' powerlifters included Kameron Dobbins, Miguel Leon, Mason Skipper, and Chamerion Williams.

For the girls' team, Syriana performed well with a squat lift of 405 lbs and a 185 lb bench press. Placing in 7th place at state, Taylor Durrett's lifts were 335 lb squat, 165 lb bench press, and 290 lb deadlift, giving her a total lift score of 780 lbs. Leading the way for the girls' powerlifters was Madison Jacks, who medaled in 2nd place, becoming the first Lady Bearcat lifter to ever medal at state. Her lifts included 385 lb squat, 215 lb bench press, and a deadlift of 350 lbs, for a total of 950 lbs.

Medaling in 2nd place was Mason Skipper with a squat lift of 650 lbs, a bench press of 490 lbs, and a deadlift of 530 lbs for a total of 1670 lbs.


RHS Golf Team News
