Mision

Give teens a voice in the world they will inherit.

Vision

Address the systemic issues that hinder progress in our society by providing teens with the skills they will need to become agents of change.

Values

Empower students to think critically, analyze information and lend their voice to social justice initiatives by connecting them to thought leaders, fact-based research, and college-level discourse.

Tuxedo UFSD's Summer Session

The Teen Think Tank Project is a socially conscious leadership program that fosters tomorrow's change agents by providing teens with the critical thinking, research, and problem-solving skills that empower them to tackle real-life social justice issues through fact-based discussion, academic research, and policy framework creation.

Methodology: Provide students with access to lessons, materials, instructors, and experts within a safe, cooperative learning environment that a) allows them to develop more effective communication, problem-solving and analytical skills, while b) highlighting diversity and belonging through guided academic exercises.

Tuxedo UFSD's Summer Session

Scope: Prepare students to actively engage in and lead a diverse, multicultural society by delivering twenty-four (24) learning modules, each lasting 90-minutes. Over the course of six (6) weeks, with instruction Monday - Thursday, students will be guided through:

1. Four (4) essential learning modules that provide the foundation for collaboration and inclusive engagement:
 - a. Leadership
 - b. Professional communication
 - c. Research
 - d. Decision-making
2. Twelve (12) subject-specific modules that examine literature, scholarly work, and/or presentations addressing multiple social justice issues and facilitate the creation of a policy framework that addresses the issue in the form of a group white paper, podcast or digital short.

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Upon completion of the program, in addition to advanced knowledge of societal issues confronting their generation, students will gain the following:

- A **certificate of completion** to include with college and job applications. The uniqueness of our program allows participants to stand out on college applications.
- **Publishing credentials** to strengthen academic resumes. Students' research is published on online platforms and available to be included with college applications.
- Highly sought after **academic & professional development skills**. Harvard's #1 criteria for admission is "growth & potential", an approach that's shared by many other universities. Our program, based upon National Honor Society standards for high academic performance, is created with the specific purpose of allowing students to identify AND activate their potential...both as students and members of society.

An Administrator's Perspective:

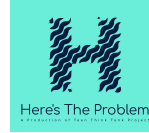

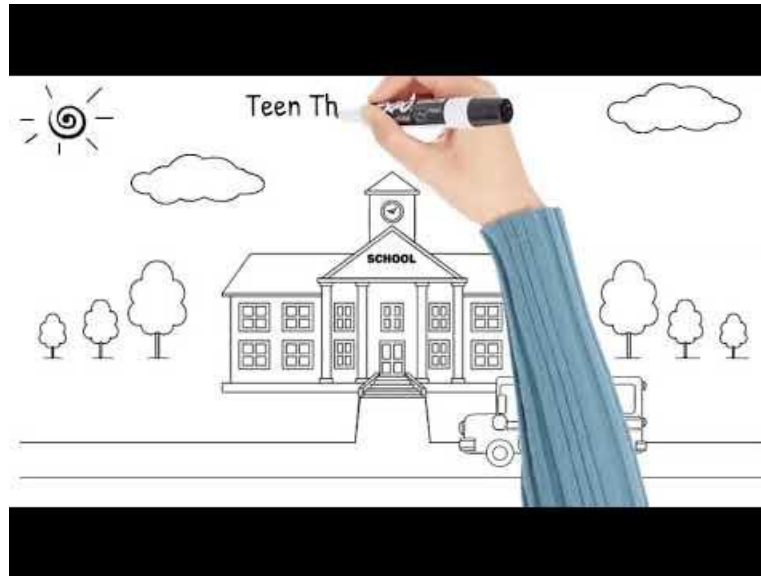
