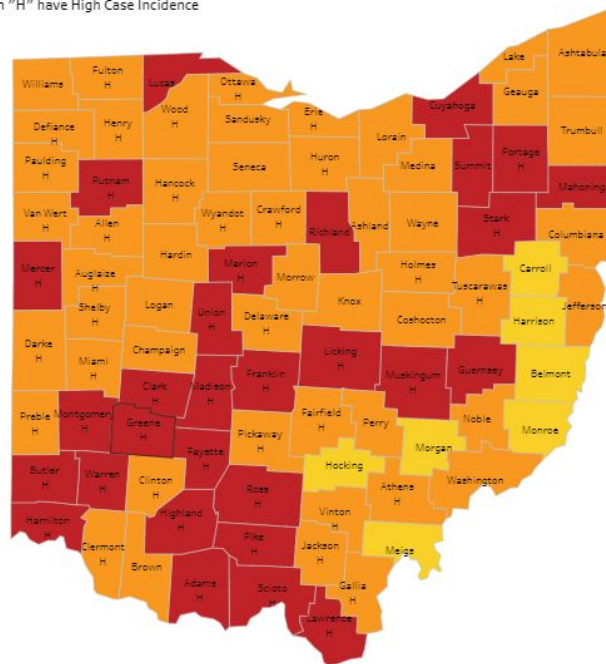
Current Plan

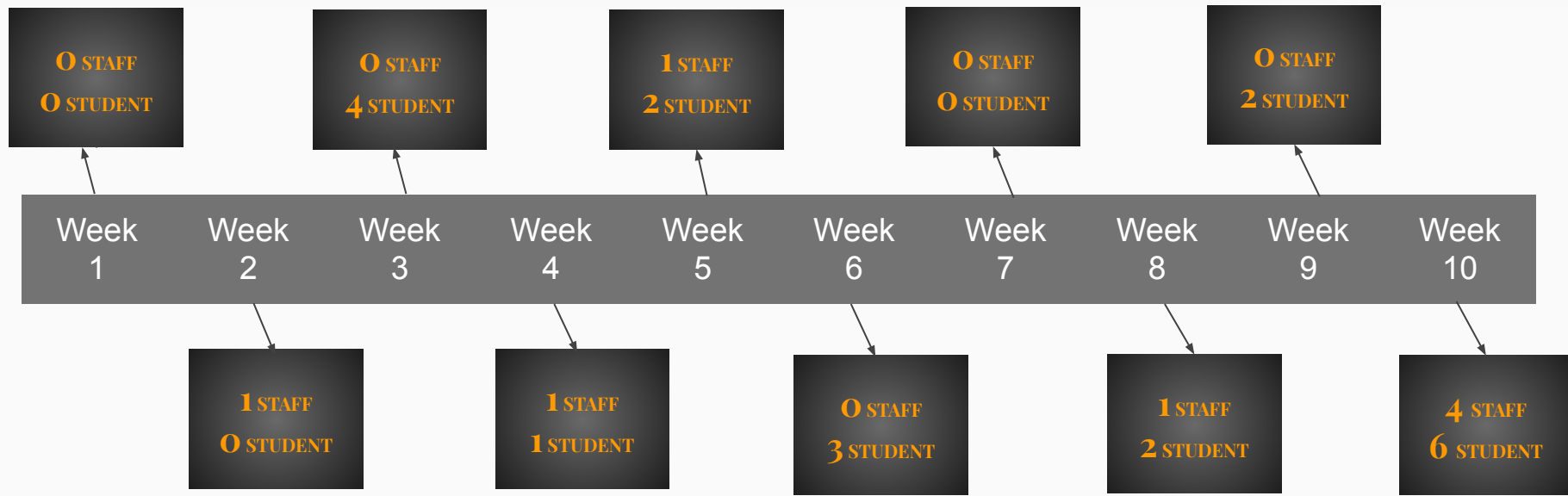


Governor Mike DeWine

Number of Positive Cases Reported for Student And Staff

How are the 20 Positive Student Cases “Connected”?

- 2 are an unknown relationship
- 5 Related to school/athletic exposure (4 on same team)
- 13 Related to exposure outside of school

Beavercreek High School: 14 Total

- 8 Related to exposure outside of school
- 5 Related to school/athletic exposure
- 1 Unknown relationship

Ankeney Middle School: 2 Total

- 2 Related to exposure outside of school

Fairbrook Elementary: 2 Total

- Both are related to exposure outside of school, and are from the same family

Shaw Elementary: 1 Total

- 1 Unknown relationship

Valley Elementary: 1 Total

- 1 Unknown relationship

How are the 8 Positive Staff Cases “Connected”?

- 0 are directly tied to student exposure
- 7 are of unknown relationship
- 1 related to a positive family member

Additional Valuable Criteria

Building Attendance Data

(Number Staff/Student Quarantines, COVID-19 related illness, percentage of students/staff absent)

Location of Spread

(Classroom, Bus, Building, etc)

School Activity Related Spread

(Sports, Extracurriculars, Instruction)

Recommendations

- Consult with Greene County Public Health Weekly to examine Pandemic Data
- Use local, building, and district data to drive decisions in order to determine the district delivery model for each school.
- The Ohio Public Health Advisory System will be used as a data source but will **NOT** determine the instructional delivery model for our schools.

Delivery Options

Traditional

- students report 5 day per week

Hybrid/Blended

- students report 2 days per week
and work remote 3 days per week

Remote

- students remain at home and
receive instruction by Beavercreek
teacher
