2019-2020 Cafeteria Information

Cafeteria prices for the 2019-2020 school year are as follows:

Optional Breakfast, Grades K-12	\$1.75
Grades K-6 Lunch	\$2.50

Ala Carte Plate Lunch	\$3.35
Reduced Price Meals, Grades K-12	\$.40
Reduced Price Breakfast, Grades K-12	\$.30

Free and Reduced Lunch Applications have been sent home with students and are available in the school offices. If you have been notified that you were approved through direct certification, you do not need to complete this application.



Parents are asked to send cafeteria money in an envelope with your children's names, and cafeteria lunch numbers. You may send one check for multiple children as long as you note the amounts going to each child's account.

If you want to use the online payment option, you will need to use your child's student ID#. <u>This is not the same</u> <u>number as their cafeteria number</u>. Your child's student ID# (the number assigned to them in ProgressBook) is the number that you will use for online cafeteria payments. If you do not know this number, please contact the office or cafeteria manager and they will be glad to give it to you.

In an effort to keep lunch accounts up to date, students who have a negative balance will not be permitted to purchase "extras". Students having a negative balance of \$15.00 will not be allowed additional charges and will instead receive a "sack lunch". All lunch accounts can be accessed online, where parents can monitor their child's purchases and balances.

We are fortunate to have a great cafeteria staff who prepare daily meals for your children that meet the requirements set by the USDA. Home Maintenance and Woods Classes Visit Van Ham Dairy Farm



FUN FACT: The first concrete highway was built in 1909.

The first concrete road was built in 1909 on Woodward Avenue between Six and Seven Mile Roads in Greenfield Township, which is now part of northwest Detroit. The mile-long road cost \$13, 492.83 and was built by the Wayne County Road Commission, whose membership included Henry Ford.

Up until that point, non-dirt roads had been built using bricks or cobblestones, or a mix of tar and stones called macadam – all of which made for a bumpy ride!



Students in Mr. Stegbauer's Home Maintenance and Woods Classes recently took a field trip to the Van Ham Dairy to witness a large concrete pour for silo bunkers. Students in these classes have learned or will learn about residential concrete foundations and other concrete technologies.

This was a unique opportunity to watch a very large pour right in our own backyard. The purpose of this bunker is to house 420,000 ton of silage to feed the 2500 head of cattle on site. This bunker will span a space of 750' x 350' and is 8" thick. Attached to the bunker is a large water runoff pond to insure that no polluted water makes it into the fresh water table.

The project will happen in three large pours with the first and largest pour being 1300 cubic yards of concrete. Students were able to witness multiple trucks pouring into a conveyor/pump truck that stretched approximately 100 feet, 40 yd power screed, dozens of concrete workers in action, and an empty large water pond.

This trip not only opened the eyes of students about the immense size of the project but also allowed the students to see the many, much needed career opportunities available in our area. **Thank you to Van Ham Dairy for this awesome experience!**

From the Desk of Mrs. Potts, Elementary Principal...

Welcome to the 2019-2020 school year! The elementary staff and I are looking forward to embarking on another year filled with positive educational opportunities for all students. To help provide an environment that allows students to achieve their academic goals the elementary staff are implementing Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). PBIS is a positive behavior management system of clear school-wide expectations. The three main Pirate Core Values (expectations) the students are practicing include: Be Respectful, Be Responsible and Be Ready.

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All students in grades K-6 have been divided into one of five houses (red, purple, green, gray and orange). As students learn to be responsible, respectful and ready in all school settings they can earn crew cards for their house. Students place their crew cards inside their assigned house displayed in the lobby showcase. The cards are counted every two weeks and the students in the house with the most crew cards are able to pick a coupon from a choice board. The winning house at the end of the month will receive ice cream at lunch. Whereas, the house with the most crew cards at the end of the guarter will have a house party.

Students can also earn a quarterly drawing.
