# From the Desk of Mr. Kissell, Superintendent...

Hello, and welcome to your spring newsletter. As we have turned the page to March, it is time to finish this school year strong and begin planning for the next school year. This is a unique time of year for schools as we work hard in the present while thinking and planning for the future.

**Testing** - As you will see in this newsletter, testing season is here. Although the state tests are important for many reasons, please know that Continental focuses on educating your child for their future, not a test. By focusing on educating your child, we believe they will do well on the test. It is about kids and learning, not tests.

**Kindergarten Screening** - We are looking for **ALL** five-year-olds who are not in school yet, kindergarten screening is April 12. If you know of anyone with a five or soon to be five-year-old, please make sure they know about our screening. See more on page four or call the elementary for more information, 419-596-3860.

**Closing school** - The decision to close school at Continental rests solely with the superintendent. In my absence, one of the principals is charged with this decision. What goes into a decision:

### **State Testing is Coming!**

As we head into the spring testing window, I want to take a few moments and explain why the upcoming state testing is so important to both your student and our school.

While state testing can sometimes be viewed negatively, this is the yardstick that the State of Ohio uses to measure school and student performance. Our school and district report card data comes in large part from the state testing that takes place every year. These tests evaluate how well our school teaches and our students learn the curriculum that is prescribed by the State Board of Education, the State Legislature, and our Local Board of Education.

We want all students to take the testing seriously every year so that we can get a true and accurate assessment of how we are doing. Two of the simplest things that can be done to help make sure your student is ready for their state test is to make sure that they get a good night's sleep the night before the test and to make sure they've had a nutritious breakfast the morning of the test. It's amazing how much of an effect these two simple things can have on a student's performance!

For high school students, the state testing is especially important because it could be one of the state-mandated "Graduation Pathways" that are required to earn a high school diploma. On top of earning all 21 credits (earned by passing classes), students must also show that they are "college or career ready." The spring End-of-Course tests are one such pathway that students can use. To satisfy the requirement of the testing pathway, students must earn at least 18 points on the seven End-of-Course tests (English 1, English 2, Algebra I, Geometry, American History, American Government, and Biology) that are given each year. In addition to earning a total of 18 points, students must earn at least 4 points in English, 4 points in Math, and 6 points in Science and Social Studies. (To be clear, each test is worth up to 5 points and is scored anywhere from 1 to 5, depending on student performance.)

Our testing schedule is posted on our high school calendar on the school website. We have scheduled to do all of our testing in English the week of April 15th and our Math, Science, and Social Studies testing will be done the week of April 22nd. For the specific day and time of each of your student's tests, please check the high school calendar on the lower left side of the school's homepage.

#### **Kindergarten Registration**

It's that time of year to register your child for kindergarten. If your child will be five on or before September 30, 2019 we would love to have your child attend kindergarten at our elementary building. Kindergarten registration forms can be downloaded from the school website or picked up at the elementary office. Kindergarten screening is Friday, April 12, 2019.



#### Kinderstart

The Continental Elementary Kinderstart program has been in place since the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year. Kinderstart students attend school all day, every day and they are taught kindergarten skills at an appropriate pace to meet student needs. The program consists of a smaller class size (13 students) and is designed for students whom teachers and parents feel are not academically and/or socially ready for kindergarten. Many of the students enrolled also fall in the young birthdays category. To be eligible for Kinderstart a child must be five on or before September 30, 2019 and participate in the spring screening for kindergarten.

Parents who are interested in sending their child to Kinderstart must complete a kindergarten registration form. Forms can be downloaded from the school website or picked up at the elementary office.



Fellow Pirates,



We would like to thank you for the feedback from the survey that was sent out a few months ago and truly appreciate all the comments that were written on the letters. We want the students to eat the food at the school, but more importantly, we want them to *enjoy* the food. Before taking this position, I was truly surprised on the amount of government controls that are in place regarding what students are allowed to eat on school grounds. Some of the suggestions and comments I received were wonderful, unfortunately, I am not able to fulfill due to these rules and regulations. I would like to explain to you what must be incorporated into student meals, so you have a better understanding on why you may see the same kind of food weekly.

Weekly, we have to make sure we do not go over a certain amount of calories, fats, sodium, and sugars in the meals provided to students. We must also provide daily a certain amount of protein, whole grain, fruits, and vegetables. The vegetable is the most difficult and you may wonder why you see broccoli for instance, almost weekly, on the calendar. A vegetable must be offered that comes from the dark green, red and orange, beans and peas, starchy, and "other" group. This is not easy! If you were to look up those subgroups (www. choosemyplate.gov/food-groups/vegetables.html) and see the types of vegetables offered, there is not a good selection to choose from that most kids will eat. We have found that giving options to the students has helped on the amount of leftovers and less peanut butter and jelly going out the door. On the March menu, you will see that we have added two vegetables daily and we will have up to three or four different kinds of pizza offered on Fridays. We have seen a positive difference when the students are offered options.

The snacks offered to the students for purchase, must also follow the evidence-based nutrition standards that are put in place by the United States Department of Agriculture for snacks and beverages sold at school. Every snack served is put into a USDA "smart snacks calculator" to make sure that these standards are being followed. Cookies and chips, for instance, must be whole grain, and low in fats and sugars. Ice cream must be fat free with guidelines followed in order to offer it to the students for purchase. With these rules, it is not always easy to find food that is compliant, and more importantly tastes good to our students.

### Positive Behavior Intervention System



The junior high students have started a new positive behavior program. This program, PBIS, divided students into five houses (red, blue, white, yellow, and black) as a way to be rewarded for their positive behaviors throughout the school day. Students in each house are rewarded in multiple different ways such as, A/B honor roll, attendance, having homework completed, coming to class prepared, having a clean locker, or being respectful of other students.

At the end of each week, the house that is in the lead gets to be in the front of the lunch line if they are wearing their house color. Mid-term prize was a donut party and three homework passes. Another big prize will be awarded to the winning team at the end of the quarter.

We've already seen positive impact on the 7th and 8th grade students this quarter. I hope this will continue to impact our students' success and leadership throughout the school year.
