Letter from Mrs. Walk

Hello Parents,

I've been reading lately about perceptions surrounding public education and it seems that parents are getting somewhat of a "bad rap" for being overly protective of their children's feelings and for not supporting the school when issues arise. I would like to shout from the rooftops that this is definitely NOT the case at Trebein. Overwhelmingly, Trebein parents seem to take a common sense approach to parenting. While our families give plenty of love to their children and take an active role in their lives, they also balance this with high expectations for appropriate behavior and effort. When I reach out to parents to communicate about an issue at school, I am always so pleased to be met with concern for what happened and support for finding a way to correct the issue at hand. The fact that we are able to work together and that you support high expectations are part of what makes Trebein such a special place.

This is the time when many parents begin thinking about next school year. Placing children in homerooms is one of the greatest challenges an elementary principal faces. I take this responsibility very seriously and spend a great deal of time making sure each classroom has a balance of ability levels, personalities, boys/girls, etc. Your child's current teacher provides insight as well. If you have some insight you would like to share about your child and his/her needs, I welcome input. However, please understand that Beavercreek Schools does not accept teacher requests by name. Believe me, we want your child to be successful and happy school and will do our very best to make this happen.

As we complete our book study of *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, we come to Habit 7: Sharpen the Saw. To be effective, we must devote the time to renewing ourselves physically, spiritually, mentally, and socially. This habit surrounds all of the other habits and makes each one possible by preserving and enhancing your greatest asset - yourself!

There are four dimensions of our nature, and each must be exercised regularly and in balanced ways:

Physical Dimension:

- * Eat well
- * Get sufficient rest and relaxation
- * Exercise on a regular basis to build endurance, flexibility, and strength

Spiritual Dimension:

- * Practice daily meditation
- * Communicate with nature
- * Immerse yourself in great literature or music

Mental Dimension:

- * Read good literature
- * Keep a journal of your thoughts, experiences, and insights
- * Limit television watching to only those programs that enrich your life and mind

Social/Emotional Dimension:

- * Seek to deeply understand other people
- * Make contributions to meaningful projects that improve the lives of others
- * Maintain an Abundance Mentality, and see to help others find success

As we focus on renewing ourselves along these four dimensions, we must also seek to be a positive scripter for other people. We must look to inspire others to a higher path by showing them we believe in them by listening to them empathically and by encouraging them to be proactive.

Medication Pickup

With the end of the school year fast approaching, parents of students with medications in the nurse's office should remember to pick up the remaining medications before the last day of school. All unclaimed medications will be properly disposed of by the end of June. We will additionally provide paperwork, if needed, for those students requiring medications next year and/or an action plan for asthma, diabetes, or seizures. These forms need to be filled out every SCHOOL year, not calendar year.

Kindergarten Assessments

If you have a new kindergartener that will be starting at Trebein next year, feel free to stop by the clinic and drop off any medical paperwork that is required (physical forms, immunizations records, health checklists, etc.) We will also be available to discuss any medical diagnoses/conditions or use of medications if needed.

Tips for Preventing the SUMMER Slide



Studies show that children who do not read or have access to books during the summer lose up to 2 months of reading performance. Those losses accumulate during the elementary school years so that by the time a child enters middle school he/she may be 2 1/2 years behind! All children, whether from low, middle or upper income families, may fall victim to the "summer slide" if not provided with summer reading opportunities. So how do we prevent the summer slide-or even accelerate reading growth? Here are a few ideas:

- Visit your local library! Help your child find "right fit" books. Right fit books are books that are of high interest to your child and are not beyond their reading level. You can use the five finger test to determine if the book is too difficult for your child. Open the book to a page with many words. Have your child begin reading the text. Hold up a finger for each word he/she does not know. If you have 4 or 5 fingers up, the text may be too difficult for your child to read independently. Feel free to still check out the book! It just may be a book you want to read with your child.
- Be sure your child reads at least 20 minutes a day. According to research, a child who reads only 1 minute a day outside of school will learn 8,000 words by the end of sixth grade where a student who reads 20 minutes outside of school will learn 1,800,000 words! That's huge! If reading isn't one of your child's top priorities, you may need to set up an incentive program.
- Set a good example. When your child sees you reading and enjoying a book or a newspaper article, you are sending a message that reading is important and valuable.
- Read to your child. When you read to your child, he/she hears the rhythm of language. Be sure to read with expression! Changing your voice for different characters and increasing your volume during exciting parts are only a few ways to keep children engaged.
- Read with your child —explore different types of reading such as poetry. For our little ones, poetry is a great way to improve phonemic awareness skills as poetry often incorporates rhyme. For our older children, poetry is a means of improving fluency.
- Read for different purposes. Reading directions for a recipe or directions for assembling a toy are fun ways of incorporating reading into everyday activities.
- Play games with words. Commercial games such as Apples to Apples improves vocabulary. You can easily turn a game of hopscotch or 4 square into a game that incorporates learning letters or sight words. Be sure to check out the "8 Super Summer Sight Word Activities" on the Make, Take & Teach blog.
- If you have access to an iPad, there are tons of interactive books and apps that address phonics and early reading skills. There are also many websites that offer free reading related games.

Have a happy and healthy summer! Be sure to read, read and read some more! Not only can we prevent the summer slide, we can accelerate reading growth.


