The onset of the traditional homecoming festivities began Thursday evening, September 17, with a snake dance, pep rally and car bash. The initial events were followed by the coronation program. "Stranger In The Night"

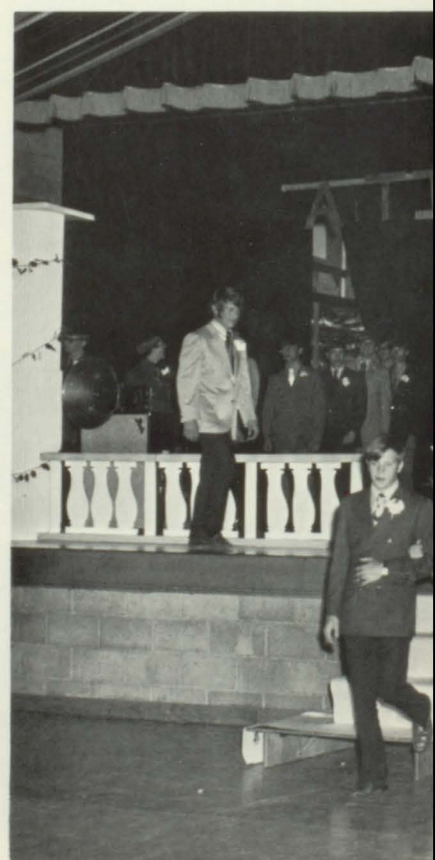
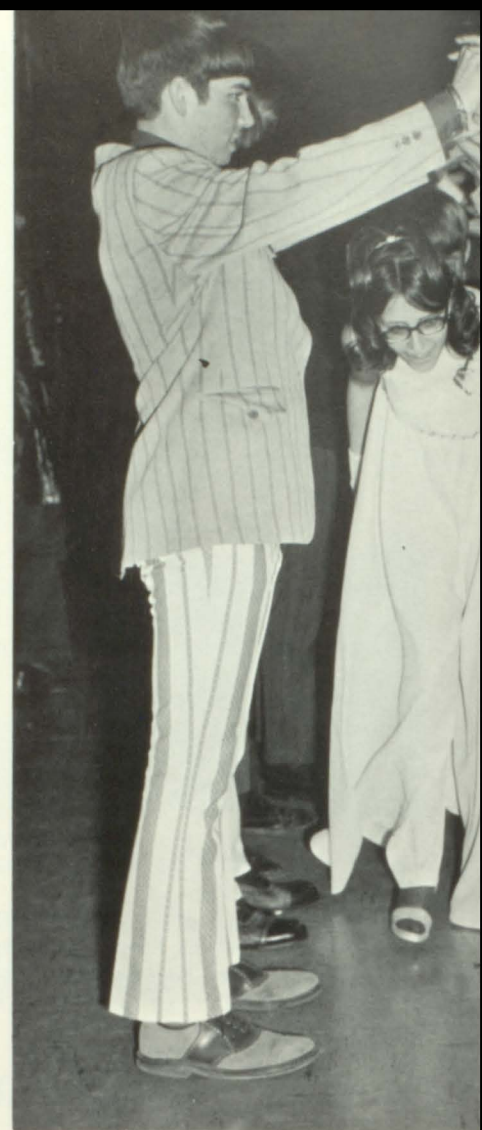

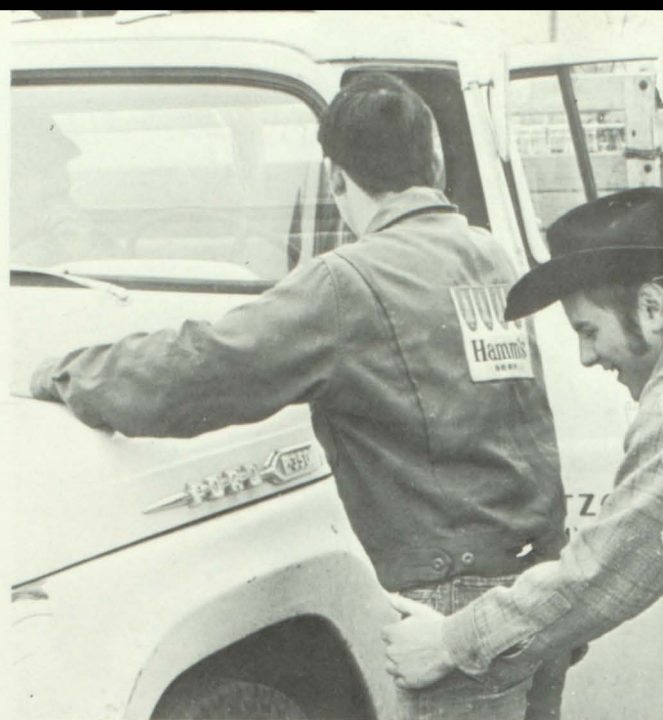
The University of North Dakota, Ellendale Branch, Stage Band provided the music for the Grand March and the dance which followed.

Campaign managers were: Yvonne Fuchs and Carey Lapp for the Federalist Party, and Mark Mettler for the Nationalist Party.

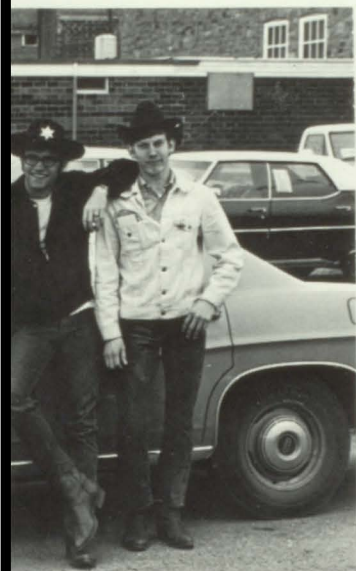

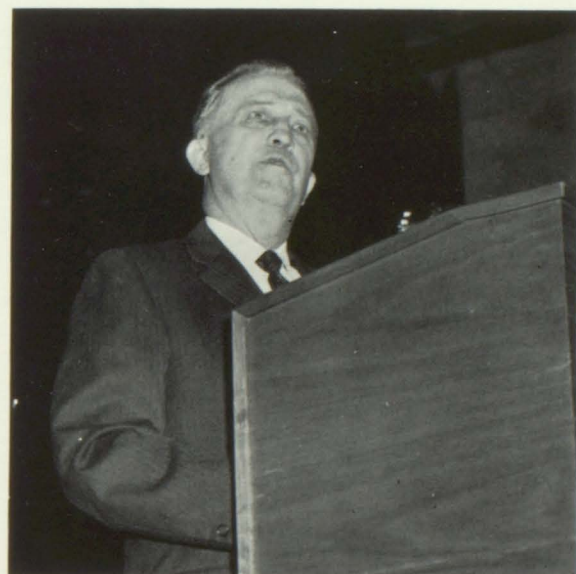

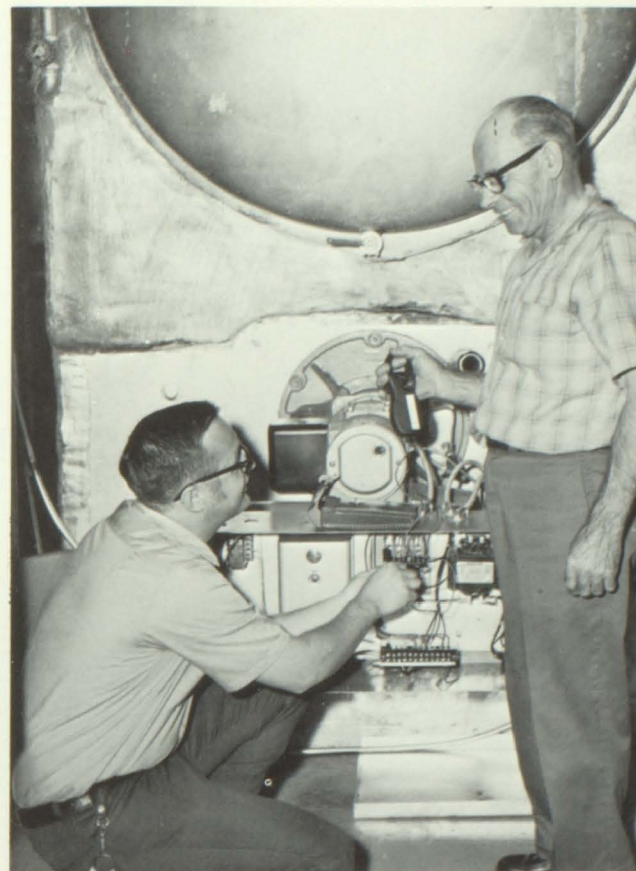

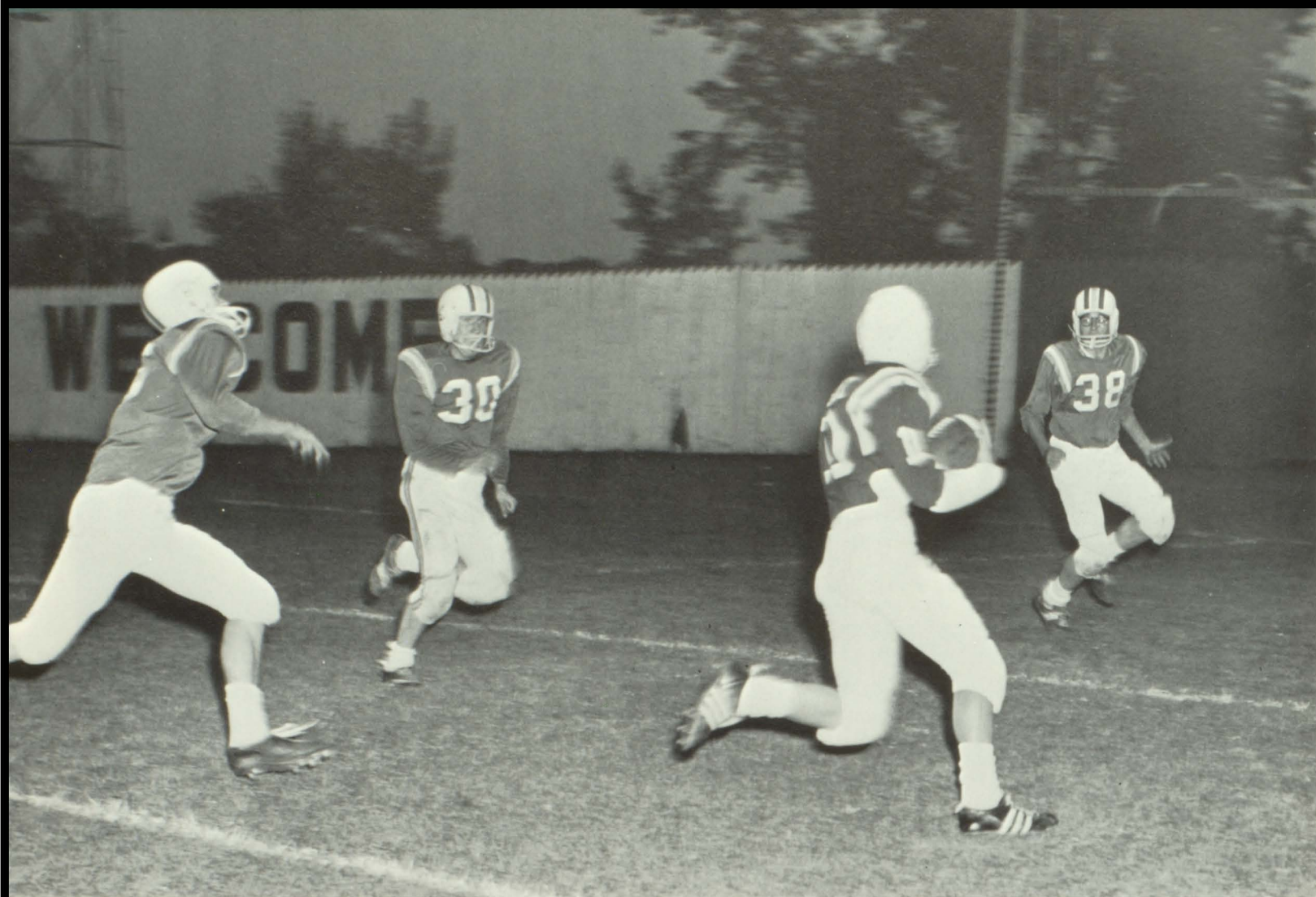

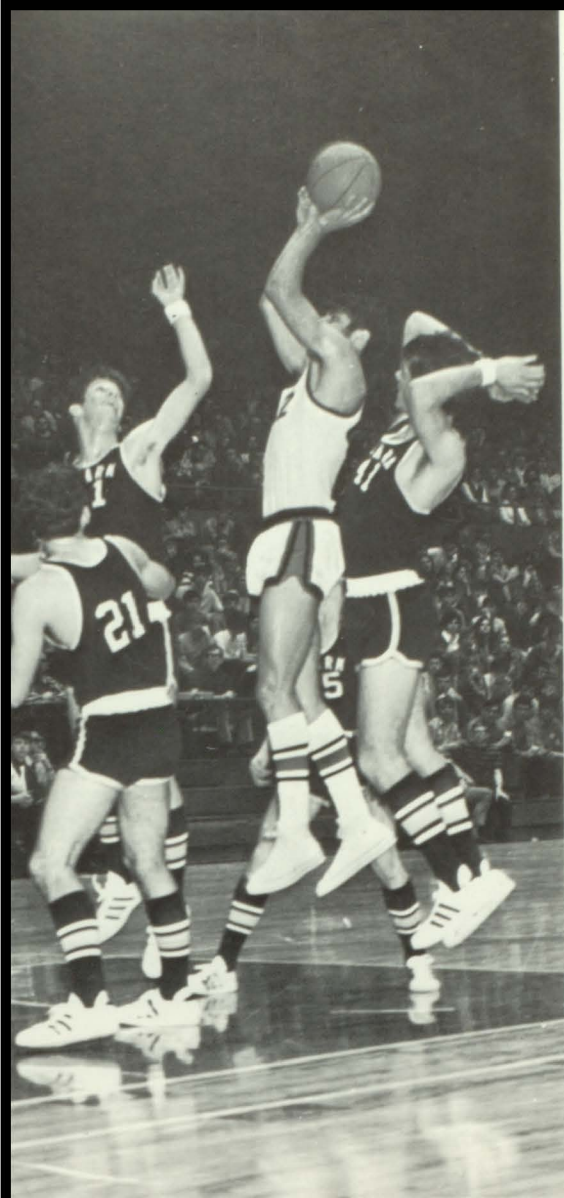

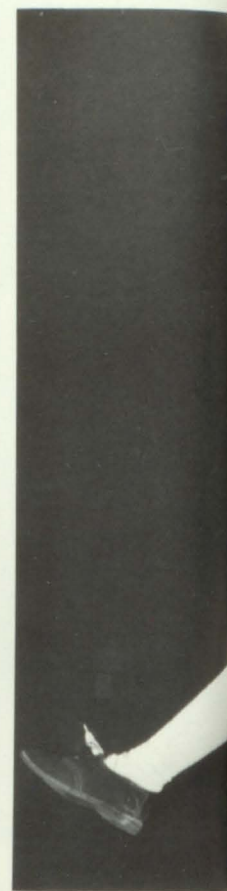

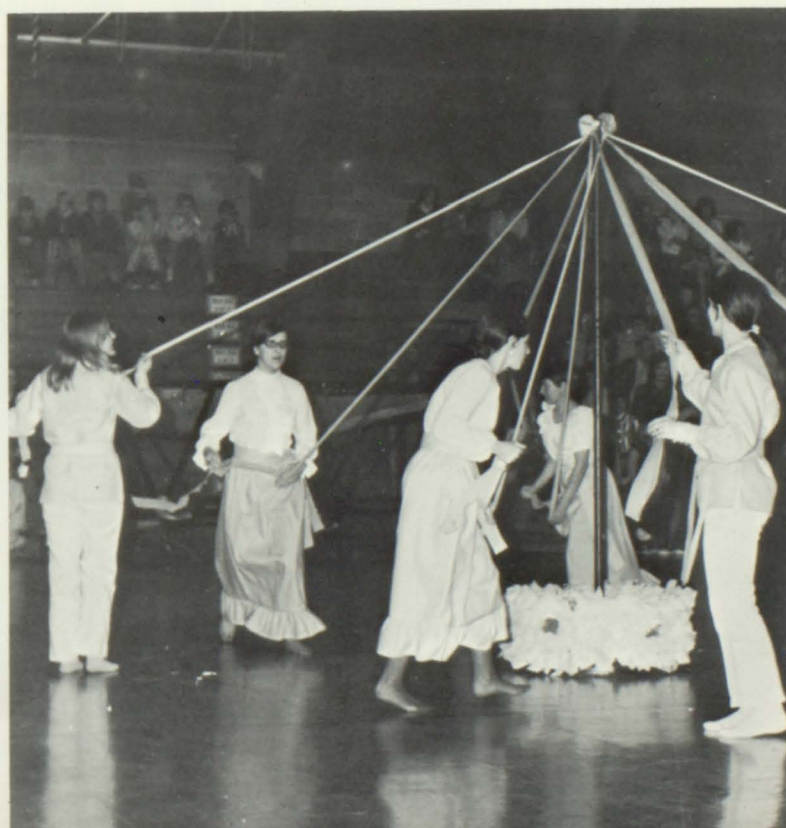

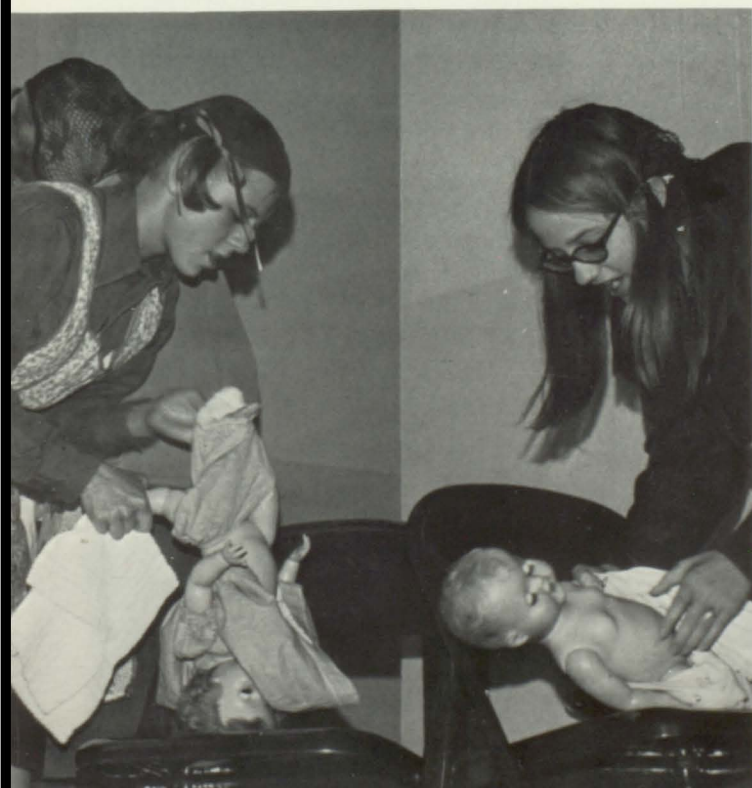
