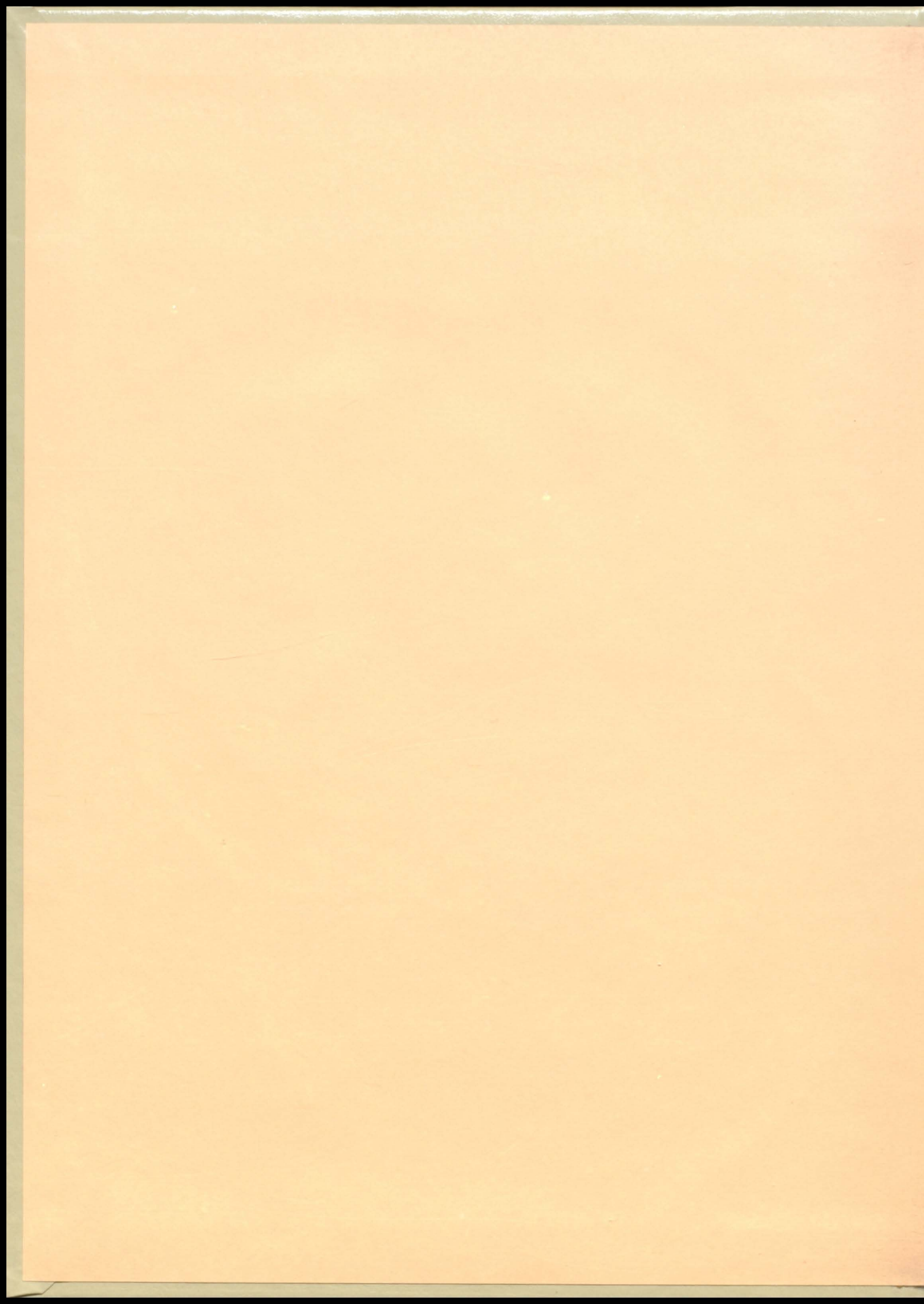
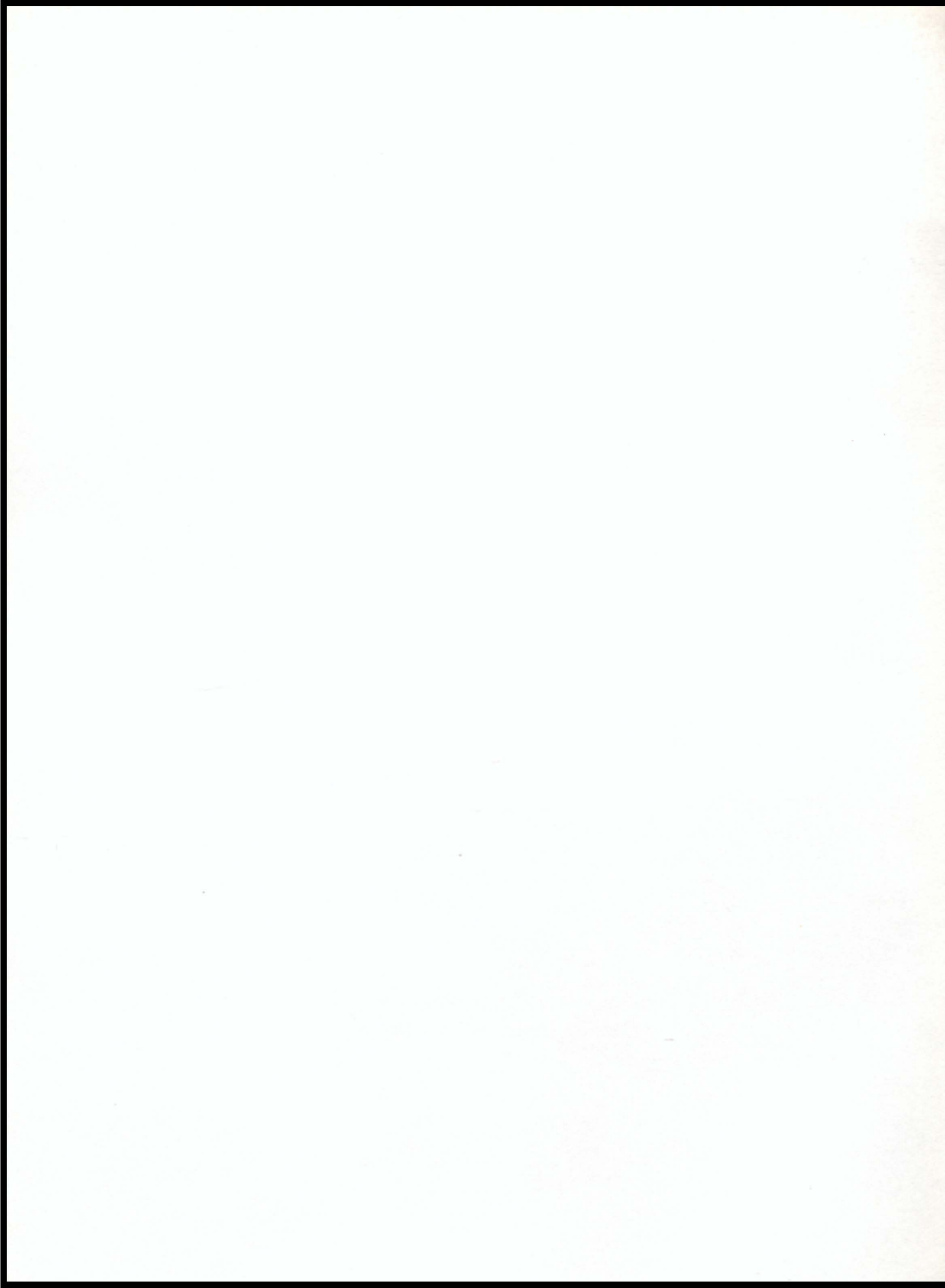

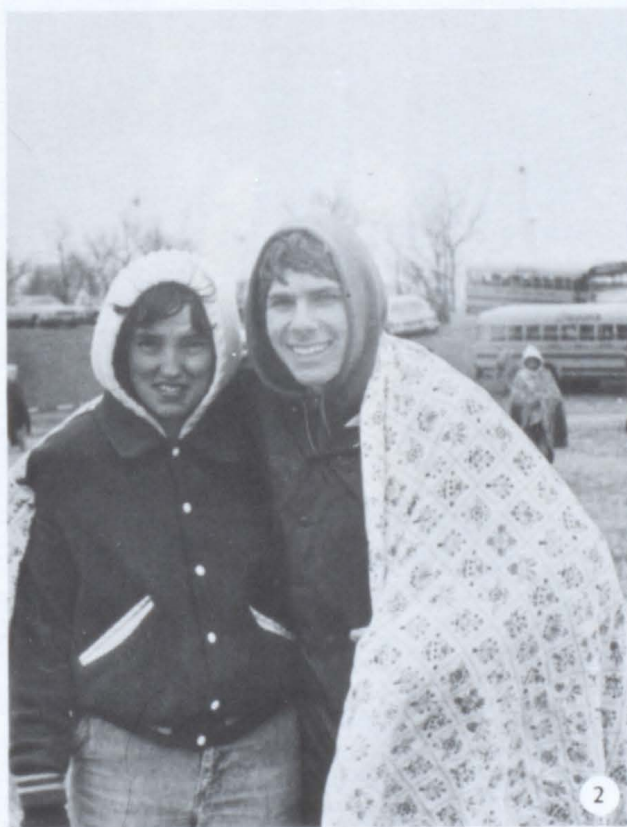

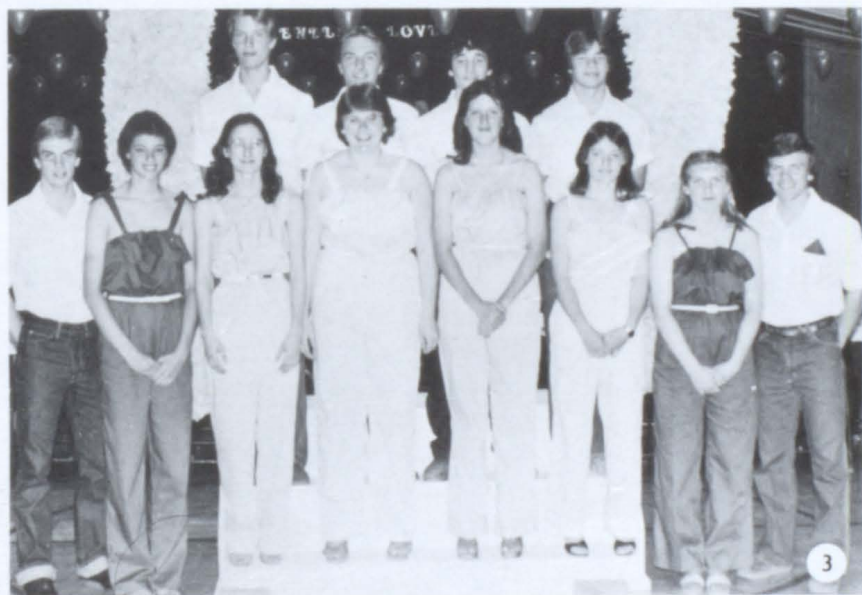
An Evening Of Delight

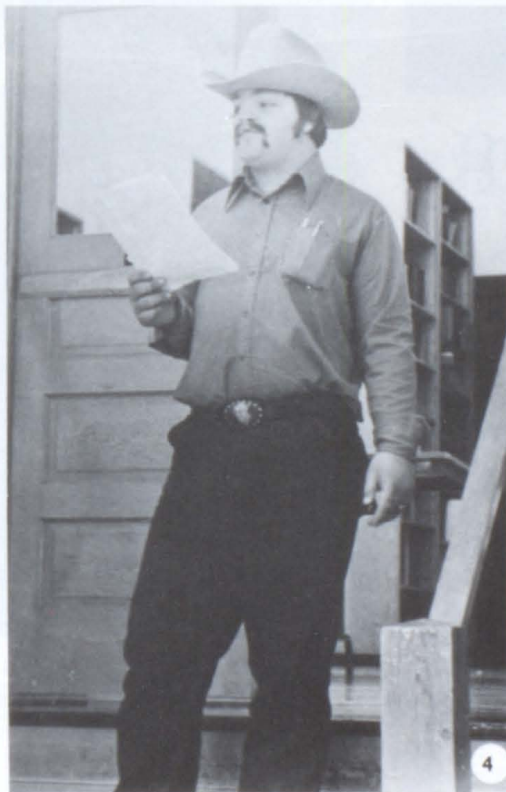

Students Continue Studies

- 4: Literature is a main part of any high school English course.

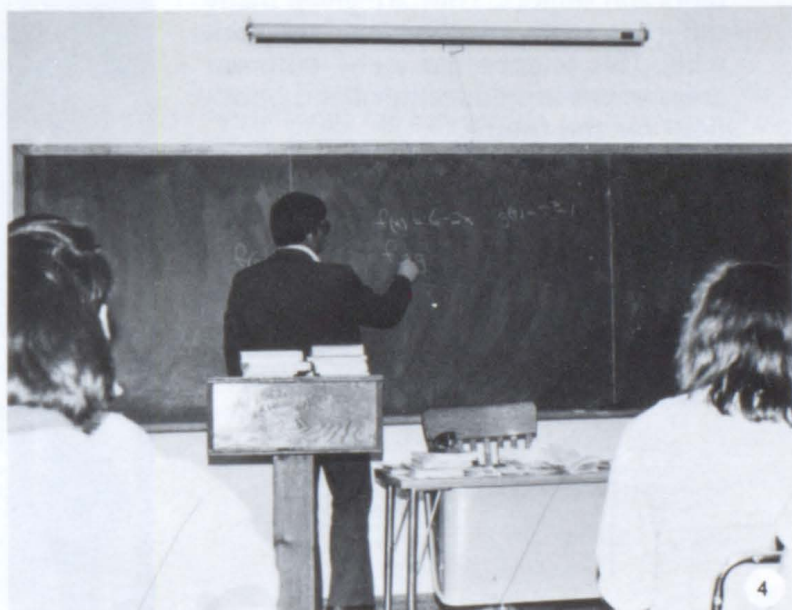




Business And Math Provide Needed Skills

Science Is The Study Of Life, Matter, And Motion

Science is a branch of study concerned with observation and classification of facts. The Eureka education department deals with four areas of science: general science, biology I and II, chemistry.

Biology I and II are all about the study of life. Biology I gains experience in dissecting various organisms. It is a required course for all sophomores. Biology II is offered to all juniors and seniors who are interested in life science. Biology II deals with blood typing and also the dissection of a fetal pig.

Chemistry, the study of composition and decomposition of matter, is taught by Mr. Cooper and is offered to all juniors and seniors. They are given many different types of chemicals to work with. This science has many different areas which are educational and beneficial for the future.

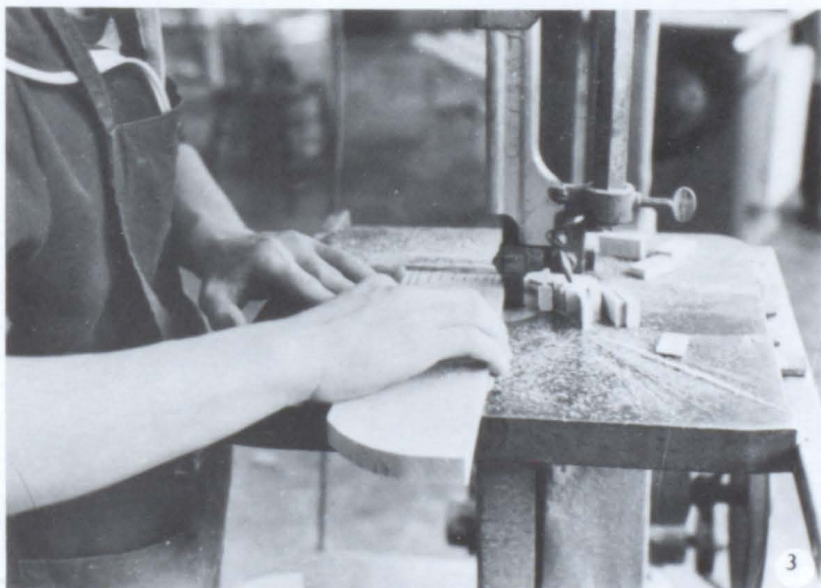
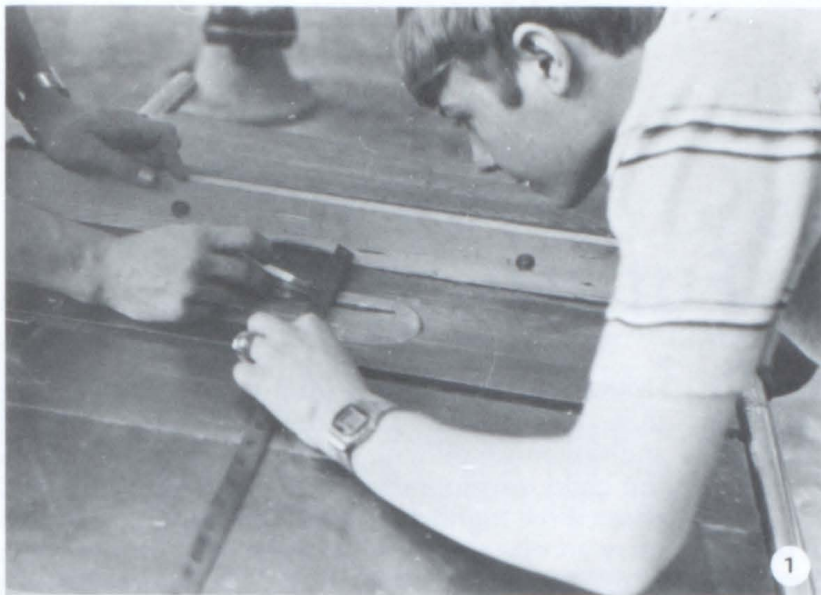
Wood, Tools, And Projects

Home ec III is just a continuation of the home ec program. They do the same things basically as the other two home ec programs.

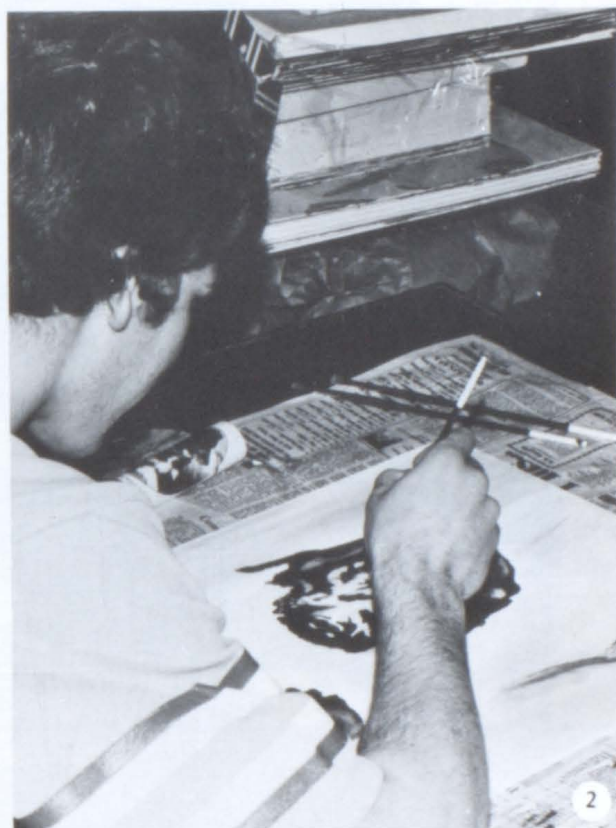

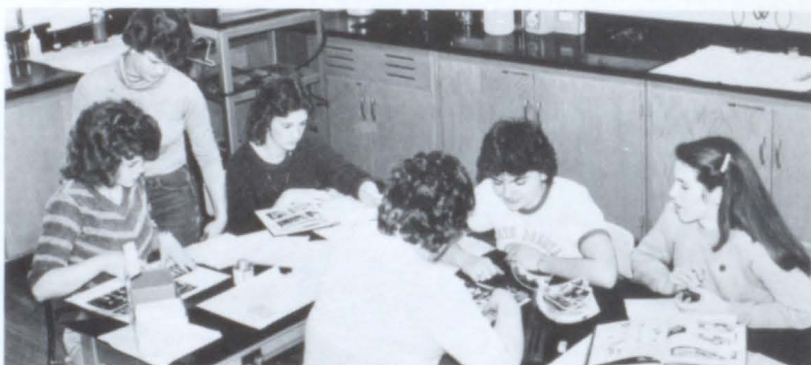

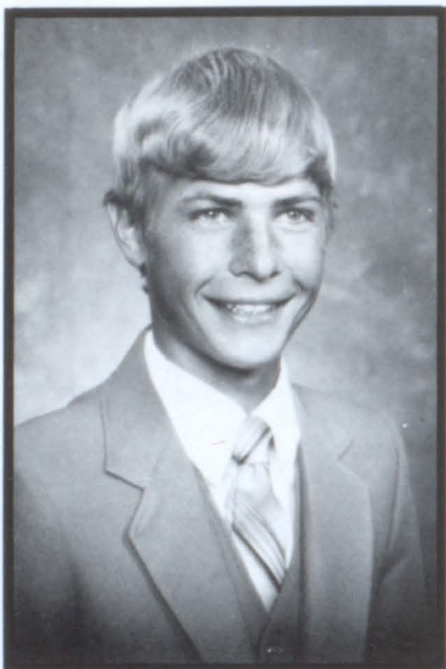


The End Is Here

Daydreaming is a favorite past time of juniors. Todd Heinle wonders what his future will bring for him.

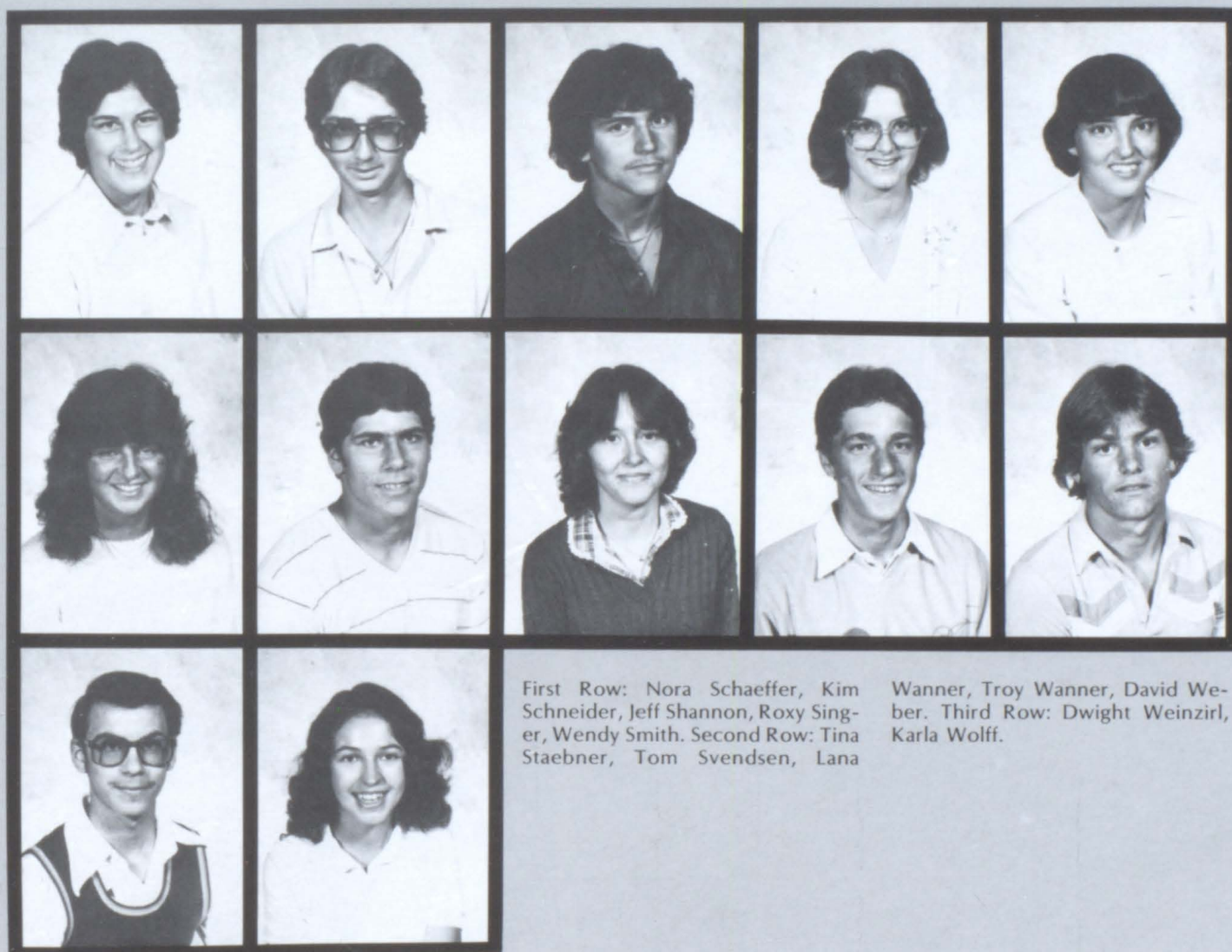

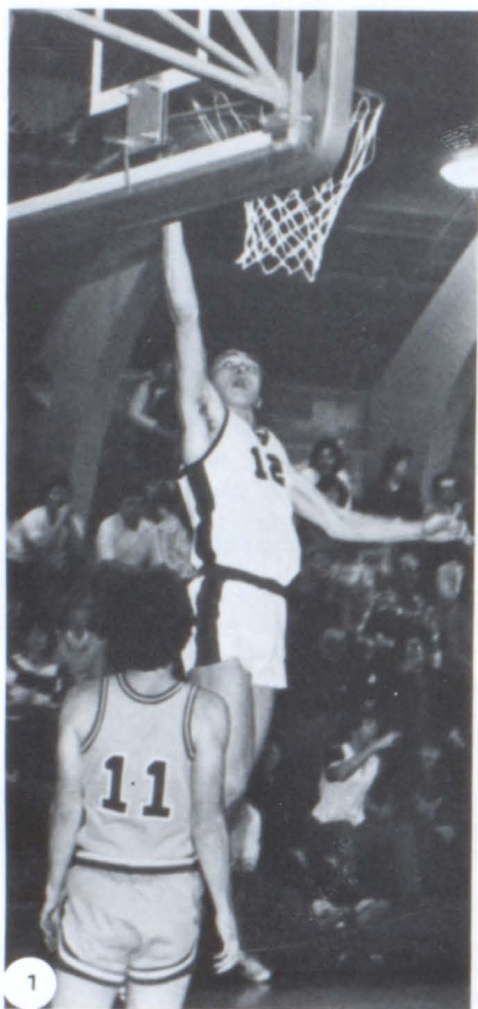

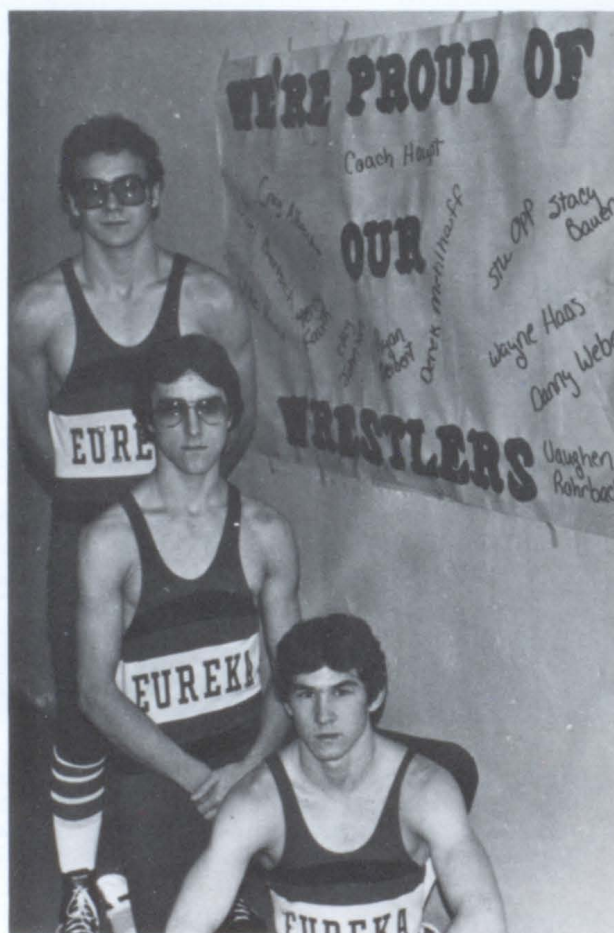
Grapplers Set Record

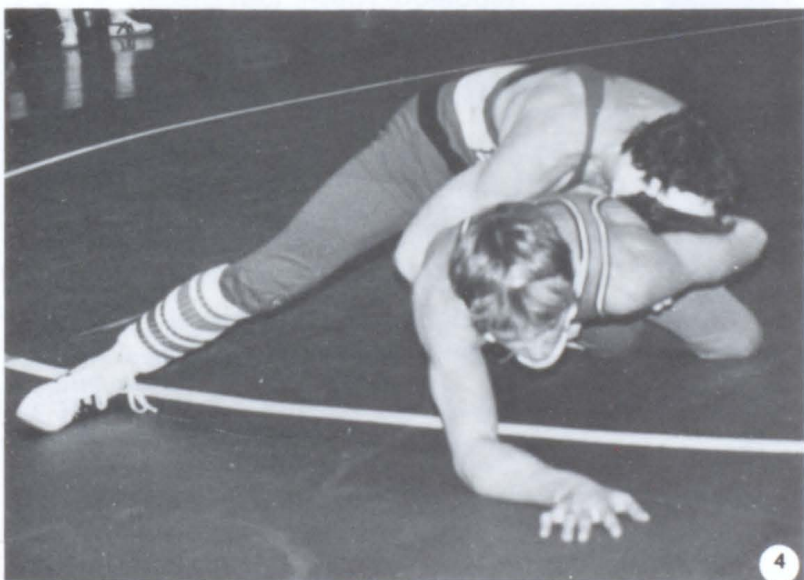
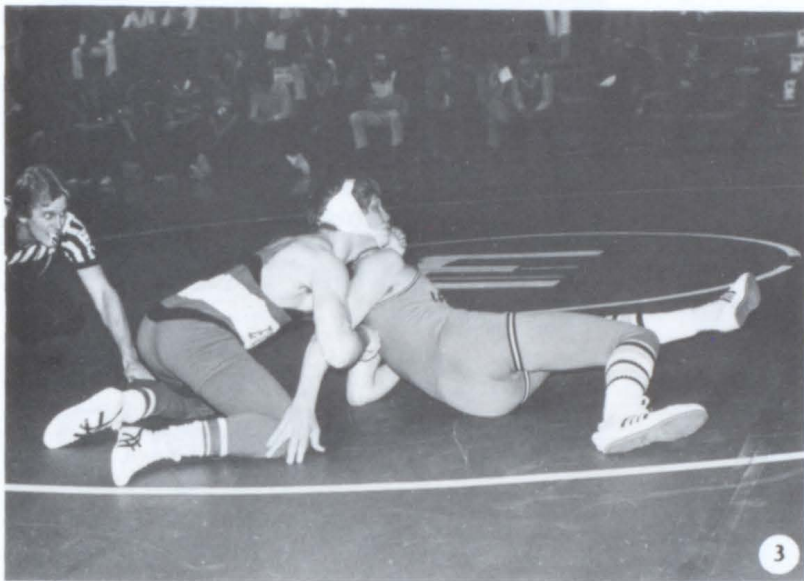
