
We will be EXCITED to welcome our students back on **Tuesday**, **January 5th!** Just like Thanksgiving, please give us a heads-up about any Covid situation prior to returning by either dropping a note to <u>covid@gunterisd.org</u> or filling out this close contact form or positive case form.

As you know, GISD decided to discontinue remote learning for the spring of 2021. Please know that this was a very difficult decision for us and our principals and counselors are ready to help you transition or answer any questions you have to help make the best decisions for your family. If you did not read our 12/10 letter about the rationale for this recommendation, it is included at the end of this newsletter.

We will still be offering remote learning to any student who is quarantined due to Covid (close contact or for a positive test). And we will still be offering our Voluntary Early Release Fridays so that our teachers can support our short-term remote learners. If we find that it is not needed later in the spring semester, we will reevaluate and discontinue. Please remember that the Friday program is a voluntary early release – our schools will remain open to all students. These weekly afternoon hours have been a game changer for our teachers so a huge thanks to your partnership with that program.

Thank you SO much for all of your patience and flexibility as we have led through this really challenging semester. I think the only thing that was constant was our continual process of evaluating and refining our processes! We appreciate you all so much!


Mrs. Clement's students were as busy as an Elf in Santa's PhotoShop (the new workshop).



different types of branches of the service and the requirements for each. He told them that starting in the 9th grade – grades count! He also informed them the USAF covers all educational expenses up to

a graduate degree and commissioned opportunities to underclassmen in high school. Students also learned about the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (AFVAB) test. The Air Force requires the highest score to enter their ranks. Students also learned about the many different types of jobs, training, and adventures the Air Force offers. Later in his presentation, MSgt Gosnell transitioned into his personal adventures in the Air Force and his many travels around the world (complete with pictures). He has visited many interesting places, including visiting one of the Reclining Buddhas! The only other person



in the room that knew about Reclining Buddhas was Mrs. Foster, but now the students know as well! It was an interesting trip around the world via MSgt Gosnell's presentation.



# Gunter Independent School District Board Briefs

Monday, December 14, 2020

### GISD F.I.R.S.T. HEARING 5:45pm

Public Hearing to discuss the 2019-2020 Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas "FIRST" was called to order by Jeff Banks, Board President. A quorum was established. Dr. Siler and Brittany Floyd presented the FIRST Report. Gunter ISD received a score of 76/100 on the Financial Integrity Rating Report. The reason for the three areas of point reduction was due to paying off one of our bonds early. While this saved the district significant money, it temporarily reduced our fund balance in our debt service account (the account now has a healthy fund balance). The score earned a Meets Standard rating. The Hearing adjourned at 5:50pm

### **GISD Regular Board Meeting 6:00pm**

The Regular meeting was called to order by Jeff Banks, Board President. A quorum was established.

Pledge of Allegiance was conducted by Jeff Banks, Board President

Gunter ISD is in excellent financial shape. The fund balance is a healthy \$1.8 million and Steve Davis reported a clean audit.

### **CONSENT AGENDA/ROUTINE BUSINESS:**

November 30, 2020 Minutes and November Bills were approved.

### **REGULAR BUSINES**

- The Board approved the Audit presented by Steve Davis of Morgan, Davis & Co., PC.
- The Board approved Resolution Regarding Extending FFCRA Leave Benefits through the Spring of 2021. The federal government has not extended FFCRA (Covid Leave) for the spring so the GISD Board locally approved to extend that through the spring semester.
- The Board approved to Discontinue Full-Time Remote Learning for Spring 2021. Dr. Siler had shared at the November Board Meeting and sent a letter home to all families on December 10<sup>th</sup> about the possibility of discontinuing full-time remote learning. Because our numbers of full-time remote learners have decreased to an average of 4 students per grade level, it is no longer sustainable to maintain stand-alone teachers at our elementary grade levels. In addition, there are multiple students at risk for not earning credit at our secondary level. Dr. Siler shared data from the past 4 months which showed the low occurrence of Covid at school and the data that notes that the mass majority of spread is occurring from prolonged exposure outside the school day. The Principals and Counselors will be working with families to help in these transitions.
- The Board approved the Tax Roll Values for 2020.
- The Board approved the Superintendent Evaluation Instrument as presented.

No Closed Session

**ADJOURNMENT:** Regular meeting was adjourned at approximately 7:27pm

### **Covid "Close Contact" Quarantine Rule Changes:**

The CDC has adjusted its guidance related to COVID-19 quarantines due to close contact and GISD will be adopting those changes immediately. The stay-at-home period for individuals who have had "close contact" with someone who has tested positive can end for individuals experiencing no symptoms:

- On day 10 without testing (instead of 14 days)
- On day 7 after receiving a negative test result (test must occur on day 5 or later)
- \*\*\*GISD will now offer our free, rapid tests for students or staff to use to end their "close contact" quarantine period on Day 7 for those who request it. These changes are effective now and we will be contacting any students / staff currently quarantined to discuss next steps.

After stopping guarantine, the CDC recommends that individuals:

- Watch for symptoms until 14 days after exposure.
- If you have symptoms, immediately self-isolate and contact your healthcare provider.
- Wear a mask, stay at least 6 feet from others, wash their hands, avoid crowds, and take other steps to prevent the spread of COVID-19.



Re: Proposed Changes to Remote Learning

As we have worked through this incredibly challenging year with COVID-19, we have strived to meet the needs of all of our students – both academically and from a health and safety standpoint. The Texas Education Agency allowed us to offer a multitude of learning options to meet the instructional needs of students remotely whose parents chose to keep them at home or for when students were quarantined at home due to close contact from Covid.

During the past four months, we have learned a lot about the spread of Covid, but there are two major takeaways as it pertains to the impact of school:

1. The rate of occurrence of Covid at school <u>has been extremely low</u>. The average number of cases that we report every Friday has ranged from 0.8 to 2.4 by campus (0.8 cases at GES; 1.3 cases at GMS; and 2.4 cases at GHS) with the average case count of 4.4 for the entire district. To put it another way, the range of active cases as we look back on every Friday's report has been from 0 active cases to 11 active cases back on September 25<sup>th</sup>. Even in that highest week, less than 1% of our school population was impacted.



2. The mass majority of spread of Covid has been a result of activity outside of school. We have tracked every case reported to us and have actively contact traced and quarantined students who met the definition of close contact. This process has resulted in sending home nearly 300 of our 1,000 students since the start of school. As we look at the students who have been quarantined, less than 10 students actually tested positive, and in each of those cases it was due to prolonged exposure outside of the normal school day. In all of our cases, we are not seeing students test positive from a casual interaction in class or at lunch where both students were masked. Where we see the spread is from prolonged exposure from sleepovers, car trips, meals and get togethers outside of school.

In the same way that we've learned a lot about Covid, we have also learned a lot about our full-time Remote Learning program.

- 1. As the number of students transitioning back to in-person learning has increased, our current full-time remote learning model, particularly at elementary is <u>unsustainable</u>. At the beginning of the year, over 15% of our students were learning from home yet as the year has progressed, more and more students are coming back into the classroom to the point where only 7% of our students are learning full-time at home. As this decrease has occurred, it has made our remote learning model unsustainable moving forward. As an example, we now have just 4 kindergarten students learning in a full-time remote learning environment leaving the other kindergarten classes at the maximum class size of 22 students. The situation is similar in 1<sup>st</sup> through 4<sup>th</sup> grade with the number of full-time remote learners ranging from 3 to 9 per grade level.
- 2. At all levels, we have found that <u>full-time remote learning has been challenging</u>. At middle school and high school, the struggle has been in both attendance and performance causing many students to be in jeopardy of losing credits or not moving on to the next grade level. While we have worked really hard at the secondary level to find an online curriculum program and add in teacher support, we also know that the platform has been challenging as the singular learning environment for students. At elementary, while our teachers and parents are doing an extraordinary job, there are still limitations in terms of how we can fully serve and support our students.

I wanted to let you know that we will be bringing a recommendation to the School Board at our December 14<sup>th</sup> meeting to discontinue the full-time remote learning program. If this is approved, the transition would occur at the start of the spring semester (January 5<sup>th</sup>). As a parent or guardian, you would have the following options:

- Return to in-person instruction at your campus
- Complete the paperwork to withdraw to homeschool
- Enroll in a private or public school that offers remote learning
- Transfer students can return to their home district

We would still retain short-term remote learning for those students who test positive for Covid or who are quarantined due to close contact.

We understand that ending full-time remote learning would be a major change. Please know that we are making these decisions in the best interest of all of the students in Gunter ISD based on their academic, social & emotional needs. We are more than willing to work with you to address any safety concerns that you have so that your students feel safe at school. Thank you for your patience and flexibility as we make tentative plans to make this transition for the spring of 2021.

We will keep you posted about final decisions that are made the week of December 14<sup>th</sup>.
