PRE-K & KINDERGARTEN ROUNDUP

Pre-K & Kindergarten registration for the 2018-2019 school year will be held on Tuesday, April 10 from 3:45-7:00 pm in the elementary school cafeteria.

Parents should bring the child's birth certificate, Social Security Card, immunization record, photo id of enroller & income verification (please see enclosed sheets).

All kindergarten students must be 5 years of age on or before September 1, 2018 and all Pre-K students must be 3 or 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2018. If space is available, non-qualifying students and transfer students may be accepted.

PRE KINDERGARTEN QUALIFICATIONS: Free/Reduced Lunch Qualifier, English Second Language, Active or Disabled Military Dependent, Homeless, Ever Been in Foster Care.

For Pre-K you may qualify based on meeting one of the eligibility criteria or you may attend as a tuition based student if space is available.

Students will not be reserved a place in Pre-K until all shot records are current and the school has all required documents completed.

Only students who did not attend Pre-K this year in GISD must enroll for Kindergarten. Please call the office at 903-433-5315 if you are unable to register your child on this date to insure his/her name is on the list.

Forms for Pre-K and Kindergarten registration can be printed off the Gunter Elementary School website (www.gunterisd.org). Choose Gunter Elementary from the dropdown select a school menu. Forms can be found under the Printable Forms section on the right.




The 2nd graders enjoyed visiting with their San Vicente ISD Skype buddies again. Earlier in the year, they participated in a mystery Skype where they asked each other questions about their location to try and figure out where the other school was. Since then, they have become pen pals! They have enjoyed exchanging letters and learning more about each other's school.

Third grade has been studying landforms as well as changes to our Earth. We skyped with Park Ranger Jim Hill of the Niagara Parks Commission located in Ontario, Canada, and learned how erosion has changed the falls as well as many amazing facts about the water falls. The Canadian Falls are called the Horseshoe Falls because of their distinctive horseshoe shape.

- Between the base of the Horseshoe Falls and the Whirlpool the water elevation drops approximately 71 feet
- By International Agreement, the Canadians draw 56,500 cubic feet of water per second and the Americans draw 32,500 cubic feet of water per second
- 400 pounds of water flow over the falls every minute
- The falls produce a large amount of mist as the water crashes to the bottom of the falls producing a spectacular rainbow.
- The falls are approximately 2,200 feet wide and 13 stories tall
- The water is about 10 feet deep at the crest of the falls.
- 20% of the world's freshwater comes from Niagara Falls

Thank you to Corkey Westman for speaking to the students and Denise Willard for bringing her baby chicks to





The students at GMS are talented in many areas as has been shown throughout the school year. Not only are they amazing athletes, musicians, artists, and leaders, they are also academically brilliant! It takes everything you have to make it at GMS.

60 talented students, sixth thru eighth grade, represented Gunter in more than 30 events at the district Academic UIL competition held on March 6th in Pilot Point. These students 'set the bar higher' at GMS as they prepared for their contests. The UIL participants competed in events including core subjects like science, math, and social studies. Also high on the UIL priority list were speaking contests in which 13 students represented GMS in oral reading, modern oratory, impromptu speaking, and listening skills. There were also the creative competitions like art appreciation, chess puzzle, calculator applications, and maps, graphs, and charts.

GMS had 4 teams medal this year: 3rd place — Bronze medal art: Nicole Leach, Hope Caperton, Abby Green, Grace King, 2nd place Silver medal science: Greyson Toney, Cole Lemons, Audrey Curtis. Also medaling for 2nd place silver medal dictionary skills: Nick Bullard, Dylan Marsh, Kamber Puebla and 2nd place silver medal listening skills Kendall Jolly, Keeli Sweet, Kai Altun

Individually, GMS did better than last year as well. Sixth grader Jackson Rue earned 1st place gold for Chess Puzzle, and 6th place in both mathematics and number sense; Kendall Jolly earned 1st place in listening skills. Seventh graders Kamber Puebla earned 2nd place silver for Dictionary Skills; Dylan Marsh earned 3rd place bronze in dictionary skills; Nick Bullard earned 3rd place bronze in science; Grace Fortune earned 4th place in mathematics; and Collier Stovall earned 5th place in impromptu speaking. Eight graders Audrey Curtis earned 5th place in number sense, and last but not least, Greyson Toney earned 1st place gold in science – making it two years in a row!

We are so proud of these students that placed, but even more proud of the students that stepped up and represented their school. They worked long hours and gained valuable experience. Academic UIL students will be taking a field trip in April in recognition of their participation.

The National Hispanic Recognition Program is only open to students who score in the top 2.5% of all Hispanic and Latino PSAT test-takers in the nation. Brian's outstanding performance on the PSAT back in October has opened this door for him. Every year around 250,000 Hispanic and Latino students take the PSAT. Only 5000 of those students will be selected to participate. He has a great shot so please congratulate him when you see him.

After you have finished congratulating Brian on his NHRP invitation, please congratulate him again on being accepted into NASA's Texas High

School Aerospace Scholars (HAS) Program. NASA's High School Aerospace Scholars program is an interactive, online learning experience that culminates in an all-expenses-paid, week long visit to NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston during the summer. Over the course of the year, Brian will train online for a mock mission by learning about the past, present and future of space exploration. Brian will be invited to put his training to use at NASA if he receives one of the highest scores on his training mission. Brian will also have the opportunity to receive guidance from NASA scientists and engineers to complete a hands-on design challenge and plan a mission to Mars. A selection panel chose Brian based on his outstanding application profile, essay composition, and letter of recommendation. The applicant pool was very competitive, and we are excited that Brian made the cut for both of these programs.

Matt Hunter experienced rarified air the first week of March in the district opening tilt with S&S. A chilly pre-spring night befitting of March was anything but the ideal environment for the boys of summer. Matt got his first grand slam of high school early in the game, opening the flood gates for a Tiger offensive onslaught. Less than thirty minutes later he took a pitch in the strike zone over the left field wall. Again the bases were loaded. "I would say that was an unusual night," the Senior admits

with a grin. With two swings Matt added eight RBIs and two dingers to his career, and cemented his place in the latest legacy of players scratching their name in the annals of Tiger Baseball.

Matt loves to talk about three things - his green truck, Fortnite, and Baseball.

Matt lives a stones throw from the country line on the east side of FM 289. The Hunter residence perches on a rise keeping watch over all who enter Grayson County. Matt is also flashing the glove and arm in left field this year after playing mostly right field during his career. His arm can be counted upon to give a few innings in relief along with an occasional start when needed. Matt is committed to play for Cisco JC next Fall with long term hopes of catching on at a Division I university after two years. His dream is to suit up for TCU who has reached Omaha three of the last four years.

Right now Matt is focused on team goals along with earning new skins and dance moves playing Fortnite. Matt makes no bones about it, he has joined the legions of kids addicted to playing a game he describes as "Hunger Games-like". "I'll bet I play two hours a day," he admits. "I take care of school and play baseball. In my spare time I chill at home

and play Fortnite," he laughs. Matt knows there is plenty of time for a social life. He is running out of innings in his high school career, and all athletes know at some point their time competing will come to a close. Until then he will use his time for more productive things.

Services for the last two graduating classes were held at Kidd-Key Auditorium in Sherman. Kidd-Key accommodated the necessary seating for our growing classes and the number of guests that attend the celebration. While Kidd-Key provided seating and an excellent staging area for pre-graduation, there were challenges that we needed to address going forward.

- We outgrew the stage at Kidd-Key. There is not enough room for podiums, diploma tables, screens, sixty
 plus graduates, and additional seats for dignitaries.
- We are on the cusp of outgrowing the seating at Kidd-Key. The auditorium seats 1300 but even with our small classes of 65 we have almost maxed out the auditorium seating area.
- Kidd-Key was constructed in the 1930s and while the facility is ADA compliant, it is difficult for our guests with ADA needs and movement during the ceremony from floor to stage is difficult.
- Parking is a challenge in the downtown area. There is available parking but it is spread out over a number of city blocks.
- We had to outsource all technical services which became costly due to set up and rehearsal time.
- Restroom and public spaces were limited.

Given that we will have classes ranging from 75-100 graduates in the next five years, and a facility with the above concerns and 1300 seats is not suitable. We began searching for alternate venues months ago. Negotiations and discussions have finally resulted in us entering an agreement with Prosper ISD.

The arena is 15 minutes from Gunter on the campus of Prosper High School. Set-up and seating can be arranged from 1500 to 2500. There is immense parking all around the building with multiple points of entry. The campus is relatively new and up to code in all facets of ADA compliance. Stairs and elevators are plentiful with large foyers and standing room areas looking down into the arena. The arena has access to multiple restrooms. This provides areas of relief for those with small children, strollers, or those using wheelchairs. All seating is "chairback", and a number of handicap seating areas are available. The arena also has a number of changing areas and staging for our graduates. Prosper ISD will provide all technical support and use of four wall digital displays in addition to the center scoreboard with screens on each side. Prosper ISD can also accommodate our needs for rehearsal. All set-up, tear-down, clean-up, security and facilitation will be handled by Prosper ISD. There are multiple exit points from the campus limiting any concerns of traffic. This venue is one that should accommodate our needs for the next five to ten years.






