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Before we jump into 2017-18, I'd like to reflect on the absolutely incredible year our students and staff had last year. The entire year was filled with so many "firsts": This fall, Gunter ISD celebrated its first two National Merit Commended Scholars and won our first Football State Championship! Our Gunter Cheerleaders were UIL State Spirit Contest Finalists and we had a State Academic UIL Finalist. We had four musicians advance to AllState Band \& Choir and our Band was a Top 5 Finisher at TMEA State Honor Band. For the first time in Gunter history, we had three Judging Teams make it to State in FFA, we sent two students to the Bass Fishing State Tournament and landed in the Baseball State Quarterfinals. Gunter Elementary School was nominated for the first time ever as a National


Dr. Jill Siler Gunter ISD Superintendent Blue Ribbon Nominee. A GHS student set 2 State Records in track and was the first-ever recipient of the AllTexomaland Deckard-Woodlee-Pelton Courage Award. Our high school students earned over 700 college hours in one year, received over \$ $\mathbf{2 . 3}$ million in college scholarships and awards and finished in the Top $\mathbf{2 5}$ in the Lone Star Cup of best high schools in Texas. Wow! Talk about a BANNER YEAR!

But I have NO DOUBT that even greater things lie ahead... Gunter is slated to welcome 76 new students in $1^{\text {st }}$ through $12^{\text {th }}$ grade (about 25 students per campus) along with 120 students in PreK and Kindergarten. That is a LOT of new families to our district. Last year we started with 810 students and ended at 840, a number our district hadn't seen since 2012, the last year Tioga ISD students came to GHS. The largest enrollment in Gunter ISD history was in 2006-2007 when the district topped 885 students. As I type these words of welcome, there are over 900 students on our lists for August $21^{\text {st }}$ - an increase of nearly $\mathbf{1 3 \%}$ from the start of last year!

Whether that excites you with thoughts of the amazing opportunities coming to our community or worries you because you love our small-town feel (or both), I can promise you this - we will continue to do what we've always done, which is to know and love our students, to teach them to work hard and to prepare them for an incredible future. This spring we launched our first community-wide Strategic Planning Initiative that has involved over 300 people to thoughtfully plan for what is to come in our awesome district! I'd encourage you to partner with us as we make 2017-2018 the BEST YEAR YET! We are GROWING CHAMPIONS!

This summer, I received the honor of being able to participate in the High School Aerospace Scholars (HAS) onsite experience down at the Johnson Space Center in Houston. The process leading up to this week-long trip began back in October, when I applied to participate in the HAS program. After completion and review of my application, I was able to complete weekly coursework and tasks to be submitted and graded by my HAS counselors for a 16 week period. If I kept my course grades up and presented exemplary work then I would have a chance to be chosen for the summer onsite experience at the space center, and I was. The overall experience of the HAS program was great, but the onsite portion was irreplaceable.

My week began with a quick flight into Houston and finding my NASA representative to take me and the other fliers to the hotel. As soon as we set down our bags, we were tossed into the intense week ahead. That first Sunday evening consisted of introductions and a preliminary overview of what was in store for the willing participants. We were broken into four groups of about 11 students to work on subsections of a main goal; plan and design a mission to Mars. We had a voting session to figure out the specifications of our mission, ultimately deciding on a long duration trip- which consists of 400 days travel and 600 days on the red planet with a crew size of six going on a straight shot mission (no machinery practice on the moon first) to leave in 2034. My sub-group, the Delta team, was in charge of one of the final phases of the mission; working there. We did research in three areas: the search for life, tools and laboratory, and spacesuit requirements. I was in charge of the research for the spacesuit requirements and had to design a suit that could withstand the harsh Martian environment. With this, we were required to design a helmet and glove for our time on Mars.
Aside from our team specific tasks, each team needed to design and test rockets, a lander, and a rover. The
team with the most successful product in each of these subjects would receive a bonus of prices ranging from 50 million dollars to 200 million -- of imaginary money. We began the week 500 million dollars (of theoretical cash) to spend on our products. Certain materials had certain prices for some things and others were based on weight. Our team focused on getting the job done as cheap as we possibly could, and that paid off in the end. We placed first in both the lander and the rockets and second in the rover competition. At the end of the week, the team who completed all tasks with the lowest cost would win the HAS competition.

At the end of the week, we were to present everything to a board of judges in a 15 minute long presentation. This presentation was to account for $15 \%$ of our team's grade, so it was much like our final. On the final day we went to an closing ceremony in which parents and friends were invited. Here we received our certificate of completion and the winners of the competition were announced. Because of our quality and efficient products, the Delta team won, and we received an official Johnson Space Center commemorative badge.

Although the many tours and lectures we were able to participate in were wildly interesting, I'd say my favorite part of the entire experience was getting to work with people with similar interests as my own that were willing to work hard towards this common goal, as well as working with actual NASA employees in a workspace such as the Johnson Space Center. The first few days of the trip were kind of strange, as I didn't know anybody on my team, but in working together I came to be really close with them. I met so many unique people that I will keep in touch with. In my time at NASA, I definitely made friendships that will last a lifetime. I highly recommend this program to any current junior. HAS helped me in leading me into what I want to pursue and provided me with momentum and a renewed excitement to learn right before my final year of high school. It's a magnificent opportunity and I had an absolute blast - I wish I could go back!

MY VIKING is where all of your student information is located for the college. This is where you can see your schedule, see and pay tuition, and even view your final grades. HINT--When you view your schedule in MY VIKING, make sure you choose (top left) FALL SEMESTER; it defaults to SUMMER right now. CANVAS is located inside MY VIKING. CANVAS is the virtual classroom. If you are taking internet courses, that's where you will find the course. If you are taking face to face classes, you may be required to log into CANVAS and submit assignments. You should see the CANVAS icon when you log into My VIKING. Important: Your courses may not show in CANVAS until Sunday night before classes begin on Monday but you can verify you are enrolled by viewing your schedule in My VIKING.

You can locate the books/supplies needed by going to the Grayson Book Store in person or online. I have also provided a list at the bottom of this email of common course textbooks for your convenience. To locate the books online, go to the books and select your course. All of sections use the same book so you can just select any section number. For example, GOVT 2305.A01 and A01NT and A33 all use the same textbook. View your schedule in MY VIKING for the correct names of courses.

## GISD Regular Board Meeting 6:00pm

The Regular meeting was called to order by Dr. Gary Harris, Board President. A quorum was established. Invocation and Pledge was conducted by Mr. John Jonas, Board Member.

## SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

- Staff Recognition - Superintendent and Board recognized Ann Tolbert for her 15 years of service and Kelly Teems for his 10 years of service.
- A full Financial Report and Quarterly Investment Report was given.
- Communications
- Update on Architect / Construction Planning: Corgan was chosen as our architect on June 1 along with Gallagher \& Associates as Construction Manager Agent. They have met with both our athletics personnel and ag science personnel to look into the construction of a strength \& conditioning center as well as an expansion / renovation of our ag facility. Planning will continue for these projects throughout the summer.
- Strategic Planning: Dr. Siler shared the 5 objectives and 10 strategies developed by the Strategic Planning Team during the May retreat. Over 100 people have signed up to take part in an Action Team which will kick off in August.
- The board discussed possible adjustments to the Student Handbook.
- Dr. Siler gave an overview of the budget projections for 2017-2018. Gunter ISD is anticipating an increase in revenue due to increased enrollment and an increase in property values. There are several staff members that have been added due to growth (kindergarten, $4^{\text {th }}$ grade and some aide positions). The board also looked at compensation plans and increases to the TRS Insurance program. Further information will be shared at the July board meeting with a final budget approval coming in August.
- 2017-2018 DAEP Setting: Dr. Siler proposed using the Anna ISD Disciplinary Alternative Education Placement center for DAEP in the future. Transportation will be provided during this first transitional year for students placed in DAEP.
- Usage of Texoma Exposition Center: Dr. Siler shared a need from the TELS Board on renovating the Texoma Exposition Center. o Update on the Construction and Renovation of Ag Facility. GISD is preparing an RFP for metal building manufacturers to build a new hog barn and renovate the existing ag barn.
o Capital Projects Update: Dr. Siler shared an overview of other projects being considered with the $\$ 4$ million in bond funds. Beyond the strength \& conditioning center, and the Ag barns, the board is looking at redoing the track due to the potholes, cracks, drainage issues, and failing base/foundation/leveling issues. Multiple bids have been collected. In addition, improvements to the districts technology infrastructure are underway and bids are being collected for additional student devices (these may also come out of operating instead of bond). Finally, the board is also analyzing land prices for future school sites.
o Strategic Planning Update: Action Teams will be kicking off in August to work on plans to put the Strategic Planning goals and objectives into action. In addition, Campus and District Improvement Plans will be shifted to reflect the goals of the Strategic Plan.
o STAAR Scores: Dr. Siler shared the 2017 STAAR Scores. GISD continues to be a leader in overall performance in North Texas.
o Safety and Security Audit Report: Mr. Teems shared on the 2016-17 Safety \& Security Audits including the commendations and recommendations for each campus. Multiple improvements have been made to increase security on our campuses including adding secure vestibules to each entrance; security cameras and electronic access at main entry doors; an anonymous tipline app; security cameras in all buses; additional security cameras on campuses and more.
