# GIFT receives $\$ 125,000$ donation from Carmen \& Donald E. Godwin 



The Gunter ISD Foundation Trust (GIFT) held their annual banquet on April 7th to honor 15 Gunter High School seniors who would be receiving $\$ 25,000$ in GIFT Scholarships. The keynote speaker was nationally renowned trial lawyer and Gunter resident, Don Godwin, whose own personal story of hard work, determination and the support of several scholarships have been an inspiration to many. Growing up in a poor community in North Carolina, Don worked his way through high school at the local Winn Dixie. A leader in that organization saw Don's potential and gave him a scholarship to attend college. This started him on a journey in which multiple individuals stepped up and provided scholarships that ultimately allowed him to earn a J.D. from Southern Methodist University Dedman School of Law.

Mr. Godwin shared this story with the Gunter High School graduates and then listened to the impressive accomplishments and aspirations of the GHS seniors during the awards portion of the event. When the evening concluded, Carmen and Donald Godwin took the stage for an impromptu closing, committing to support the Gunter High School seniors with an additional $\$ 25,000$ in scholarships through a donation to GIFT. In toll, the Godwin's committed to a 5 -year, $\$ 25,000$ annual donation to the organization in order to increase scholarship opportunities for the Gunter High School graduates.
During his keynote address, Mr. Godwin challenged our seniors to make the most of every opportunity, including this gift of college funds and also encouraged them to give thanks and give back along their journeys. "To watch this real life example of giving back was a powerful lesson for our seniors," shared Dr. Jill Siler, Gunter ISD Superintendent. "This gift of \$125,000 will profoundly impact the futures of the Gunter High School graduates for years to come."

Donald E. Godwin is considered one of the most respected and tenacious trial lawyers in Texas. For nearly 40 years Don has tried significant jury cases in courts throughout Texas and across the United States. He is the Lead Trial Lawyer for Halliburton in connection with all civil litigation and investigations concerning BP's Macondo well blowout in the Gulf of Mexico. Don is also a well-renowned real estate investor who has invested heavily in the corridor from Dallas to the Red River including nearly 5,000 acres in Grayson County. In 2012, Mr. \& Mrs. Godwin purchased over 1,000 acres next to the Bridges in Gunter and recently built a gorgeous home on the property.
GIFT is a public non-profit volunteer organization whose funds are directed toward educational programs. Funding priorities include both need and merit-based scholarships, innovative campus teaching grants and a permanent endowment fund. GIFT provides grants to teachers and campuses in the district and educational scholarships to deserving students and teachers. Since its creation, GIFT has distributed over $\$ 430,000$ in scholarships to area students and over $\$ 140,000$ in grants to GISD teachers and schools. In addition, GIFT has donated over \$50,000 to the Kerfoot Trust. In toll, nearly $\$ 650,000$ has been raised in the last 12 years.

## GISD cafeteria staff earns "Perfect Peach Award"

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) and Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller honored the Gunter ISD child nutrition department with a Perfect Peach Award for its achievement in TDA's 2015 Local Products Challenge. Participating schools that accepted Commissioner Miller's challenge and incorporated local ingredients from Texas in at least three meal components - dairy, protein, fruits, vegetables or grains - earned the Perfect Peach Award.
"Teaching children about healthy lifestyles by introducing them to nutritious foods grown in Texas is a top priority at TDA," Commissioner Miller said. "When our school nutrition partners participate in the Local Products Challenge, they strengthen Texas agriculture and demonstrate their commitment to developing good nutritional habits for the young Texans they serve and their entire communities."

Participation in TDA's Local Products Challenge continues to grow year after year. More than 90 school districts participated in the 2015 Local Products Challenge, and only 65 of those earned a Perfect Peach Award.

GISD Partners with Schneider Electric to Kick-off District-wide Energy Efficiency Project

On Monday, April 18th, Gunter Independent School District and Schneider Electric joined together to recognize the start of construction for a district-wide energy efficiency project. The school district pursued the project as part of a long-term economic growth and sustainability plan after recognizing a long list of deferred maintenance due to tight budgets and rising utility costs. Upgrading the district's facilities through a conventional design/bid/build process would have created a tremendous burden on the existing budget and would not address energy waste within the district that is adding unnecessary expenses. Schneider Electric worked with the Gunter Independent School District to develop a turnkey energy efficiency solution. The project will generate over $\$ 2,251,293$ in savings to the district.

## Technology in the Classroom

Sixth grade science teacher, Steve Fletcher, loves to integrate technology into his lessons. During the unit he was covering on the solar system, he invited friend, Joshua Newport, to bring his Oculus Rift to the classroom. What is that? Rift is probably something the students have never experienced before; it is a virtual reality system that allows you to jump into the reality of another destination -- in this case, the students jumped into the solar system. Students sat down one by one and slid into another galaxy. Once the Rift was placed on their head, they could look up, down, side to side, and feel like they were actually floating through space. The planets all came to life, each one proportionate to the one next to it, so the students could actually identify with the different sizes of the planets. This was such a huge opportunity for our students, and we thank Mr. Newton for sharing this piece of technology with our students for the day.

During the same day, while some were floating through space, the other students were looking at exoplanets on another device that had Leap Motion installed. This technology senses how you naturally move your hands, and allows you to interact with virtual objects. Exoplanet is an app that has catalogued all known exoplanets, or in other words, the stars beyond our own Solar System. The students would wave their hand over the touch pad on the laptop, and they would be moving through the galaxy. It was an exciting day for technology in Mr. Fletcher's room.

## Mousetrap Cars

## ~ designed \& built by GHS engineering students

A simple snap-back mousetrap is an ingenious machine. It is a simple machine. With just a few parts (a wooden base, a spring, a metal bar, and a trigger mechanism) it can do its job quickly and efficiently. The simple snap-back mousetrap is still selling strong more than a hundred years after it was patented in 1899. Not only can this machine get rid of mice, it can teach us a lot about physics, too!
When a mousetrap is set, the spring in the center is compressed, becoming a source full of potential energy. This energy is being stored, not used, but as soon as the trap is released, it is converted to kinetic energy (the energy of motion) that propels the snapper arm forward. With this knowledge, and the added knowledge of a simple lever, the engineering students were challenged to make a mousetrap car which is a self-starting vehicle powered by the spring of an ordinary mousetrap.

Student were given a mousetrap with the instructions that they must build a car, but cannot alter the base of the mousetrap or the spring; they were required to furnish the remainder of the items to build the car. The car must have a minimum of three wheels. There were other criteria, but these were the main ones.

Students were broken into teams of 2 and given two weeks to research and build their car. Students were required to have prototypes for testing, AutoCAD drawings of their final car, and their Engineering Notebook filled out.

## Thelsey Nelson

The story w rites better if the young lady comes to the plate with two on and a chance to tie it up with one big swing, extending the season and her career for at least another inning - one last chance to solidify a legacy. The reality is a teammate grounds out and a career ends in the on deck circle. Kelsey Nelson, full of grace and class, removes her helmet, drops it on the dugout steps with her bat, and heads to third base to congratulate the victors. The lone Senior for the Lady Tigers is "done", not just for the night, but forever on the softball field. A "foundation" season for the program that will return every player but one, ends full of future promise but in another too close, could have been, loss.

When you are the only Senior on a young team you know your role is to lead through service. "I was thinking playoffs at minimum," Kelsey reflects. "But I knew with us being a young team there would be challenges. I wanted to be someone they could look to to help them grow." No word better defines who Kelsey is "servant". The emotional night, in a game that matters in the standings only to the visiting Lady Wildcats, is full of laughs, smiles, but also choked back tears. Kelsey's teammates approach the plate in anticipation of the walk up anthem she personally picked for them in appreciation of their camaraderie during her final
shot at high school glory. The playlist ranges from show tunes to Barney to hip hop. Her attempt at humor was also a tribute to the bond forged between teammates. "I picked songs that captured the opposite of their character," she admits. They laugh and cry at the same time while trying to punch a flurry of change ups mixed with fastballs from the Callisburg pitcher. It's a difficult night where hits are few and the honored star of the evening only gets a couple decent pitches to look at. But through it all she makes it about others and trying to lead her team to an elusive win.

Putting others first is second nature to Kelsey. "I believe I have a heart for people," she says. Those around her agree. "Kelsey is a special person that makes all of those around her better," says Lady Tiger Softball Coach Reeca Huntsman. "Her work ethic, character, and love for life compare to few." Kelsey's goal is to wrap up the basic requirements for the RN program she started last fall with Grayson College and then move on to Texas Women's University in Denton to earn her Masters and become a Neo-natal Nurse Practitioner. The thought of a career facing trauma and tragedy on a daily basis isn't daunting to the eighteen year old. "I work well under pressure. I understand what people go through and I want to help them through it." She has experienced tough times but says she has left that behind. Her eyes are looking forward.
"The same thing 'honesty' - I tell people what they may not want to hear." These admissions sound like the right kind of stuff that a leader is made of. Listening to Kelsey reflect on her final season as a Lady Tiger reads like a lesson in patience. "I made some mistakes trying to lead early in the season and it taught me to be more patient - the younger girls needed to see someone that could handle frustration."
Kelsey's last look at a decent pitch came in the fifth inning. She wasn't given much to swing at and chased a high fastball with two strikes. Everyone in the park suffered through the at bat with her, hoping the senior could get one final big hit to remember and give the team a chance to win it late. The air literally left the park. "I knew that was it," Kelsey explains. "You hope and dream for more but at some point you realize it isn't about you." The game, a 5-2 loss, ends with Kelsey standing in the on deck circle.

Maybe that is the greatest lesson someone about to walk a graduation stage in a month should realize. There is more to life than moments of glory. It is about the journey with others and how you take them with you - your "impact". No doubt Kelsey Nelson has made an impact at Gunter High School and will do the same serving others as a career. For that reason she is our Tiger Times Student of the Month.

Ask Kelsey her greatest strength and you get the answer "honesty - I am not afraid to tell people the truth." Her greatest weakness?
