Gunter ISD Board Named a 2015 Texas Honor School Board

Gunter ISD was one of only five school boards from across Texas to be named a Texas Honor School Board as part of the 2015 Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA) School Board Awards.

Earlier this year, the Gunter ISD Board earned one of 16 regional nominations for Outstanding School Board. The Gunter ISD Board of Trustees is now a finalist for the program's highest honor: 2015 Outstanding School Board. The winner will be announced Oct. 2 at the TASA/TASB convention.






All About Me

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Learning the Scientific Method

capsized boat. They can only use paper clips to get a life saver on Fred before he drowns. We are happy to report that Fred was saved!



GHS STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

Each month I will take the opportunity to highlight a student on our campus that is making an impact beyond the boundaries of our campus.

For this issue I want to introduce you to Ryan McHone.

Ryan is a Senior at Gunter High School.

On a recent evening trip to Sherman with is mother, Ryan encountered a situation that most could not predict how they would respond. But Ryan displayed extraordinary courage and decision making that most likely saved a life.

Ryan was on the service road that intersects



Highway 82 and 75 near the Sherman Walmart. A four-door sedan driving at a high rate of speed struck the guardrail flipping on to the passenger side. Ryan noticed that the engine bay quickly ignited causing him and another motorist to leap in to action. The other young man broke out the sun-roof while Ryan climbed up on the vehicle to check the passenger who was hanging by the seat belt unable to free himself. Ryan sprinted back to his truck shouting instructions to onlookers to contact emergency personnel and secure the area. Ryan located a pocketknife and went back to the vehicle which was now noticeably on fire. He cut the straps of the seat belt and with the help of another young man pulled the adult male to safety. "He had major injuries to his abdomen," Ryan recounted. "I tried to simply talk to him to keep him alert and focused on staying alive." Ambulance and Fire units were slow to arrive and Ryan said that within one to two minutes from reaching safety the entire vehicle burst in to flames. "It was pretty scary," he admitted. "I didn't really think...I just did what needed to be done."

Responding under pressure is something that is most likely in Ryan's DNA. His father Gary is a member of the Prosper Police Department. Ryan is already set to join the Air Force upon graduation with the immediate goal of training to become an MP (Military Police). Long term, Ryan has no hesitation in following his father's footsteps (Gary was also an MP) by serving in a municipal police department or becoming a State Trooper.

I was able to dig deeper when talking with Ryan on this subject. Mike Dodd, my father, was a decorated Marine that served two tours in Vietnam. Dad would come home and eventually serve thirty years as a member of the Fort Worth Police Department. Early in his career he would work deep cover as a narcotics agent. My mother, Cathy, urged him to find a "safer" role when I was born and Dad would spend the rest of his career in uniform before retiring shortly after I finished up college.

I asked Ryan what it is like to be the son of "cop" as public perception of Law Enforcement Officials has drastically changed in recent times. "They are just doing their jobs," he reasoned. "Five-hundred thousand in uniform in the United States and there are going to be some bad ones." "There is a much lower incident of poor conduct among Police then in any other profession if you look at statistics." I probed Ryan about his "future" and asked if the current trends of officer support caused him to question his decision. "I know this is what I am supposed to do. Someone has to do it."

We have many students like Ryan with a vision and purpose. It was awesome to listen to this brave young man share his goals and reflect back to the days when I admired my "hero" for wearing that blue uniform.

Gunter ISD is pleased to announce that we will begin using the **Raptor Visitor Management System** on each campus to build on the district's program of campus safety for students and faculty. This system is used to help track visitors, students, staff, vendors, contractors and volunteers at our schools, thus providing a more secure and closely monitored environment for our students.

Beginning this month, please be sure to have your ID with you when you enter each campus. When a visitor, vendor, volunteer or contractor checks in, or when a parent comes into a school, we will ask them to present a valid ID which will be scanned into the system (any license, stateissued ID, military ID or most IDs from other countries will work in the system). Once entry is approved, Raptor will issue a badge that identifies the visitor, the date, and the purpose of his/her visit. You must wear the badge while you are in the building, and return to the office to check out. If you are coming onto the campus to pick up a child, you will also be asked to have your ID scanned.

The ID will be scanned into the system and will be checked against a national sex offender* database. This will provide an added layer of protection to ensure our schools remain secure environments for students, staff and approved visitors.

Each campus has its own database so you will need to scan your ID at each campus. Once you've scanned your ID the first time on a campus, you will be in our system and will only have to create a name badge the next time you come in.



Thank you in advance for your cooperation in presenting your valid ID when checking in at any of our campuses. We appreciate your patience and support as we implement this new system to increase security. Please know we will work with our staff to help with this new procedure and to ensure the process goes as smoothly as possible. If you have any questions about our updated procedures, please contact your campus principal.

6:00pm – The Regular Meeting was called to order by Mr. Jeff Banks, Board President

A quorum was established. Invocation and Pledge were conducted by Mrs. Candy Leonard, Board Vice President.

ATTENDANCE

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

- Gunter City Mayor Tim Slattery shared information about upcoming developments and road conditions. This included an update on the Elm Creek development (1,000+ acres), a potential development off of Wall Street (900 acres / 750 homes) and an expansion of the Bridges to include an age-limited gated community. Several businesses have opened included 289 Snoballs, Preston Trails Farms and an Urgent Care is coming.
- Tax Attorney Charles Brady presented the Delinquent Tax Report and discussed Resale Property. Delinquent tax collections are very strong and a minimal amount it still owed.
- Schneider Electric Group shared some Capital Improvements and a Reinvestment Program. This group offers a way to do long-range capital projects (HVAC, Lighting, Energy Management) up-front and to utilize the energy savings realized from the improvements to pay for the financing of the improvements. The company guarantees the savings over a 20 year period or will reimburse the district the difference. The board will meet again in Oct. to make a decision on whether to move forward.
- A full <u>Financial Report</u> was given including account updates from Landmark Bank, Lone Star Investments, a General Operating Report, I&S Report, Grayson County Coop Report a report from Workers Comp and a Quarterly Investment Report.
