Budget Hearing and BOE Election

Our annual Budget Hearing and BOE Election will take place on May 8, 2018 in the MMCS D Auditorium at 6 pm, followed by the regular Board of Education meeting.

Two (2) Board of Education seats will be vacant. Both seats will be for a term of three (3) years. District residents interested in serving on the Board of Education must file their nominating petitions by 4:00 pm, Monday, April 16, 2018. Petitions are to be delivered to the District Office and must have at least 25 signatures of qualified voters. Petition forms may be downloaded from our website or obtained from the District Office on business days between 9 am and 4 pm. This year's budget vote and election will be conducted between noon and 9 pm on Tuesday, May 15.

To qualify for membership on the School Board, an individual:

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age or older, and not adjudged to be incompetent.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same School Board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the School Board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

Dear Mount Morris Community,

The range and depth of emotions each of us feel when we learn of horrific and tragic events, such as what occurred at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, can be overwhelming. As parents, it can be difficult to know what to say to your child(ren) during a national tragedy like this. Recommendations from the National Association of School Psychologists are available on our website by going to our Main Menu →Parents →Information →Helpful Websites for Families.

Please remind your child(ren) that what they say, or the gestures they make, can have a profound impact on those around them and that threats and violence are not to be joked about or taken lightly. As a society, we are seeing an increase in individuals making inappropriate statements or gestures. Any statement or gesture that could be perceived as a threat must be treated as one. We must always be vigilant when it comes to matters involving the safety and security of our school community.

It is very important to us that our students receive assistance as they face challenges and changes in their lives. We have partnered with the Livingston County Mental Health Department which allows us to have one of their staff members come directly to our school each week to meet with students who need additional assistance and support. We have also expanded our counseling and student support department, and have added a School Resource Officer who is at the school on a full-time basis. A conversation with a trusted adult can go a long way in alleviating fear, doubt, or worry in a child.

At different times during your child's growth and development, you may encounter circumstances where you could use help and assistance with meeting your child's needs. While parents are always encouraged to share any questions or concerns regarding their child(ren) with our Principals or Counselors, you may consider calling the Pediatric Behavioral Health and Wellness Center at Golisano Children's Hospital. We are fortunate to have access to this renowned center. You can call them directly at 585-279-7800 to schedule a screening to see if their services are right for your family.

As a District, we continue to reflect and implement new safety and security measures and procedures. Over the last few years, we have constructed a state-of-the-art secure entrance that incorporates the latest in school security measures. The coverage of our security cameras has been expanded both inside and outside of the building. Members of our District Safety Team have attended several workshops on school safety that have been conducted by specialists from the FBI, Livingston County Sheriff's Department, and Homeland Security Management Institute. Our continued participation in these workshops, combined with our internal drills and exercises, allows us to gain insight to the latest safety and security practices, while we continue to refine our policies and procedures.

Mount Morris is a special community. My wife and I are proud that this is our home, where our children will grow up and forge lasting friendships. It is important that we all work together to ensure our community is safe and secure.



Alumni Luncheon



Career Exploration Opportunities



Career Exploration Day



As students progress through their junior high and high school years, it is important for them to research and explore different career options. MMCSD offers students multiple opportunities to do so throughout the year.

In January, 7th and 8th graders went to GCC in Dansville for a day filled with presentations from professionals in the various health career fields. Students were able to hear from individuals with experience in fields such as Occupational Therapy, Nursing, and Pharmacy.

Sophomores went to the May Center at BOCES in early February to listen to students and instructors from the various career and technical programs that are offered at BOCES. These career and technical programs are two-year programs that teach students the skills in the various trades and provide them with extensive training and hands-on opportunities. Just a few of these programs are Animal Science, Building Trades, Cosmetology, and Nursing.

In March, the sophomores will have an opportunity to hear from career professionals in a variety of fields such as Counseling, Teaching, and Video Game Design at the Sophomore Career Day at SUNY Geneseo.

In addition to these above mentioned presentations and opportunities, Mount Morris will be using programs like Naviance this year, which will allow students to take career and personality surveys to help them further explore the multitude of opportunities that are available that align with what they like to do.

Pleasure in the Job Puts Perfection in the Work

Not many people can say that they have known what their passion was since childhood. Mount Morris Senior Lauren Simmons has known since the age of 12 that she wanted to be a hairdresser.

Simmons, 17, spends the majority of her school day at the BOCES May Center studying Cosmetology. This is not the norm for most Mount Morris students that attend BOCES. Usually the day is split in half, but Simmons found herself spending a great deal of time in study halls and instead chose to attend BOCES for the majority of the day to work toward earning her state board license in cosmetology by graduation.

“I try my hardest at BOCES,” said Simmons. “I stand out more than others because you will never see me sitting around and I am at BOCES all day instead of just being there in the morning like everyone else.”

BOCES selects students from all across the region to be selected as Student of the Month and all of Simmons’ hard work was recognized by her peers and teachers as she was named BOCES’ Student of the Month in December.



Simmons also competed in SkillsUSA, which improves the quality of the future skilled workforce through the development of framework skills that include personal, workplace and technical skills grounded in academics. Simmons is also a member of the National Technical Honor Society through BOCES.

Simmons is very involved in extracurricular activities at MMCSD, playing on the Varsity Basketball and Varsity Softball teams, being a peer mentor, class representative, and member of the Prom Committee, all while maintaining her position on the High Honor Roll.

Cosmetology is all encompassing for Simmons. It is what she does for school, as a hobby, and what she plans to do with her future.

With the goal in mind to have her state board license before she graduates, Simmons plans to shadow a professional hairdresser for a period of time and then become a professional hairdresser herself.

Student Spotlight – Spencer DiSalvo

“I am a people pleaser, a good listener, and a hard worker. “Football was such a great experience, it changed my perspective on how I look at the world,” said DiSalvo. “The coaches were some of the best coaches, I have ever had, they were very encouraging.”

Respect... DiSalvo claims that he never would have had the confidence to join the football team if it wasn’t for the time he spent in the BOCES program.

“With all the opportunities provided, BOCES helped me realize that I really could do all of the things that I never thought I could,” said DiSalvo. “BOCES helped me realize that I am good for something and that realization boosted my self-confidence.”

DiSalvo described himself as kind of a loner before he was introduced to the BOCES program.

DiSalvo has been accepted to a two-year program at Alfred State to major in Heavy Machinery Operations.



Due to the significant amount of money that has been raised, Mount Morris Central School has been recognized as a "signature school" for the Coaches vs. Cancer Foundation.


York has been Mount Morris' annual opponent and has contributed greatly to this important cause.

Mount Morris Elementary 100 Book Challenge

The 100 Book Challenge is an independent reading program designed to maximize the effectiveness of a school's reading curriculum. The goal is to develop avid, lifelong readers. Students who develop proficiency in reading flourish throughout their lives—in the classroom, on standardized tests, at the college of their choice, and in a life-enriching career—allowing all aspects of their experience to be enhanced by the information and perspectives gained from reading.

The 100 Book Challenge dramatically increases the amount of reading students typically do. The program's high standards require a minimum of 30 minutes of independent reading a day in school and an additional 30 minutes of reading at home. Each 15 minute increment is called a 'step.' Each student has a selection of hundreds of books matched to their reading level and allows them to choose the books they want to read. Students track the amount of reading they complete on log-sheets that are signed by parents and reviewed daily by their teacher. Teachers hold individual conferences with students to be sure they are engaged with their books, to assess the students' understanding of the material they've read, and to set goals for future reading.



Mount Morris Elementary students, parents, and teachers are working hard to keep students on track for both at-school and at-home reading. Students have read over 160,000 steps during the 2017-18 school year. That's 2.4 million minutes of reading!

"Reading has become such a big part of what makes Mount Morris Elementary special. The students and families work so hard to build good reading habits. I am so proud of this incredible accomplishment," said Rachael Greene, Elementary Principal.

March 12-29, 2018: Initial Registration

April 17, 2018: Kindergarten Orientation

This will be the time to turn in completed registration packets along with a copy of the child's birth certificate, immunization records, and any applicable documentation such as preschool records. You will also be able to sign your child up for a screening appointment.

Pre-K Registration 2018-19

It's time to register your child for a spot in next year's Prekindergarten classroom. Our Pre-K program is a full-day program for eligible students that meet the age requirement of being four years old by December 1, 2018. The school day is from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. during the 2018-2019 school year.

January 2, 2018 – April 10, 2018: Registration

You can stop in to our office to pick up a registration packet, or call (585) 658-5047 and we will mail the registration packet to you, or you can download our registration packet from our website. Students must be four years old by December 1, 2018 to be eligible for a Prekindergarten placement in the 2018-19 school year. All completed registration packets must be turned in to Mrs. Howe in the front office prior to April 10, 2018 at 3:00 p.m.

April 10, 2018: Lottery Selection

Be sure to complete a registration packet to be considered for the random lottery selection. There are spots open for 36 students. Because this is a random selection, all completed registration packets will be entered into the drawing. The random lottery selection will take place on April 10, 2018 at 4:00 p.m. in the High School Library.

2018-19 School Year New York State Immunization Requirements for School Entrance/Attendance¹

NOTES:

Children in a prekindergarten setting should be age-appropriately immunized. The number of doses depends on the schedule recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). For grades pre-k through 10, intervals between doses of vaccine should be in accordance with the ACIP-recommended immunization schedule for persons 0 through 18 years of age. (Exception: intervals between doses of polio vaccine DO NOT need to be reviewed for grades 5, 11 and 12.) Doses received before the minimum age or intervals are not valid and do not count toward the number of doses listed below. Intervals between doses of vaccine DO NOT need to be reviewed for grades 11 and 12. See footnotes for specific information for each vaccine. Children who are enrolling in grade-less classes should meet the immunization requirements of the grades for which they are age equivalent.


