RCS PBIS Teams Have Been Busy! TFI and TFI Action Plans

RCS utilizes the Tiered Fidelity Inventory (TFI) survey to measure fidelity of PBIS implementation and to create school PBIS Action Plans. The TFI results in a single, valid, and reliable outcome to guide implementation and measure the extent to which school personnel apply the core features of PBIS at all three tiers. PBIS teams analyze Teams, Implementation and Evaluations as being fully implemented, partially implemented or not implemented. During October and November, RCS PBIS teams have reviewed school specific SAS results and Walkthrough reports to complete their TFI. Data driven decision making has then been utilized to develop an action plan specific to their school. Upon completion of the Action Plan, the plan is then shared with staff! Having a prioritized Action plan allows for updates of progress as the action plan is reviewed at each meeting and completion of action items can be acknowledged and celebrated!

PBIS Film Festival

The 12th Annual Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) Film Festival will be held at the Association for Positive Behavior Supports Virtual Conference in March! The goal of the PBIS Film Festival is to collect and share videos from a wide range of schools, districts, and countries recognizing films that (a) demonstrate the core PBIS principles and (b) meet technical video production standards.
