REAL MONEY, REAL WORLD

WMS 8th-graders recently participated in a financial literacy simulation developed by Ohio State University Extension, "Real Monday, Real World." The students began the unit in the classroom








with lessons focused on income, budgeting for expenses, and the fluctuating economy. The students then had the opportunity to enter a real-world simulation to "learn by doing" as they connected what they've learned in the classroom to real-life scenarios with various occupations, corresponding salaries, and the difference that family sizes can make to monthly budgets.

On Friday, the students visited several Real Money, Real World stations conducted by local business partners and community members. Each stop along the road of life allowed students to make decisions that would result in a financial impact, such as childcare, student loans, insurance, and housing expenses. Students concluded the exercise with a better understanding of monthly expense categories for families, the difference between needs and wants, and the factors to
