Program Information

Regular Education. The district provides a comprehensive curriculum that meets or exceeds state standards at all grade levels. Students may graduate with a minimum, recommended, or distinguished transcript.

Special Education. The district serves as the fiscal agent for the Swisher-Briscoe Special Education Cooperative and provides appropriate services for all special needs students.

English as a Second Language. Students who have limited English speaking ability are provided with ESL classes at all grade levels. While some teachers and aides are bilingual, the predominant language of instruction is English.

Fine Arts. The district provides music instruction by certified teachers at all grade levels. Band instruction begins in the 6th grade and continues through a very successful high school program. Art and Theater Arts instruction is provided at grades 6-12 as well.

Vocational Education. The vocational education program consists of auto mechanics, metal trades, agriculture, culinary arts, and business education. Students are afforded extended opportunities through the vocational clubs in each of the courses.

Athletics. Students may participate in a successful, competitive athletic program in grades 7-12. Sports made available include football, crosscountry, volleyball, basketball, track, golf, tennis, and baseball.

Technology. TISD has a strong commitment to provide state-of-the-art technology to students, teachers, and the community. The district is completely networked and implemented a 1:1 computer initiative in March, 2012.

Student Services Programs

Food Services. Breakfast is currently free for students of all grade levels. Lunch prices are \$2.35 for grades PK-5 and \$2.45 for grades 6-12.

Transportation. The district operates six regular bus routes daily and provides transportation for students of need.

Guidance. Guidance services are available to all students. Services include individual and group counseling, placement and scheduling, standardized testing, parent consultations and referrals to outside agencies.

Health Services. Two nurses are available for students as needed. Health care services include vision and hearing screening and health education.

Special Programs. Programs are provided to students in grades PK-12 to meet special needs such as gifted and talented, ESL, resource, and other identified areas. The district utilizes state and federal funds to supplement compensatory instruction as well as for programs in safety and drug awareness.

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
