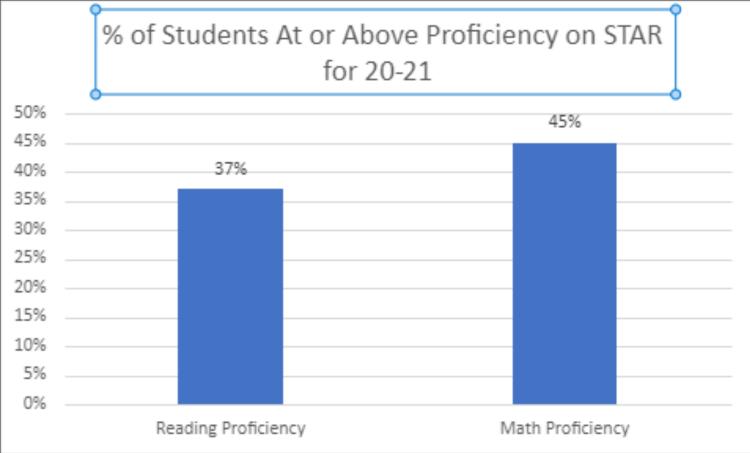

Star Proficiency District level K-8





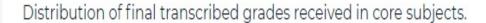

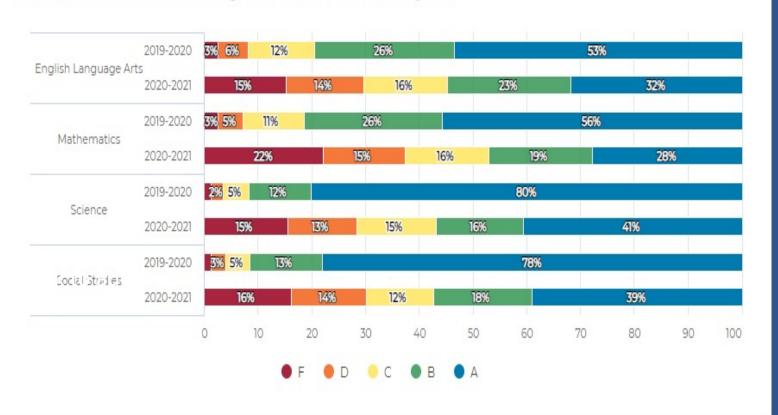

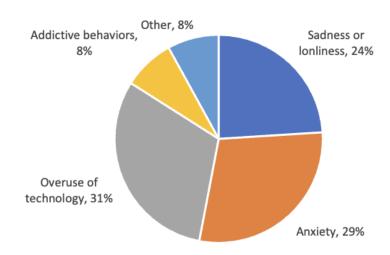

Social Emotional Needs of Staff/Students

Student Social Emotional Concerns

- Significant increase in secondary students reporting thoughts of selfharm/suicide from 19/20 SY/Pre-Covid
- Lack of Participation in Extra Curricular/Community Activities
- Students experience issues outside of school that hinders their ability to fully engage with school

Staff Ratings from Climate/Culture Surveys

- Moderate Issues:
 - Lack of respect by students toward staff
 - Disruptive Student Behavior
 - Harassment/Bullying Among Students
- More PD on Closing the Achievement Gap



MCS Attendance Data

 - 2017-18 17.14%

Tech World

- Technology -
 - MCS did not plan on going 1:1 initiative for K-12
 - 34% of MCS students experience Connectivity Issues
 - Complicated by Grandparent Caregiver's Tech Barriers
 - Recoup Homeschool students through Edmentum
 - Develop 21st Century Skills for Teachers/Students through Tech Coach

ARP will allow short-term sustainability until a more stable virtual education environment pans out, then sustainability can be assessed

COVID Related Data

- 1398 students quarantined with 108 positive cases
- 200 staff (including EPIC HeadStart, contractors, MCP employees) quarantined with 41 positive cases
- Staff and student cases were almost entirely the result of outside transmission
- 78 MCS Professional Staff Members were absent from work with COVIDrelated absences. (COVID positive and/or Quarantine by the Health Department)
- Those absences account for 642 days absent.
- 109 Professional & Service Staff Members were absent from work with COVIDrelated absences. (COVID positive and/or Quarantine by the Health Department)
- Those absences account for 884 days absent.

Root Cause Analysis



MCS is a **rural** community affected by significant disruptions to traditional **family units**, as a result of the **opioid** epidemic

- Affects students emotional and physical development
 - Results in difficult/challenging behaviors at school (dysregulation)
- Inconsistent attendance/fear of losing loved ones
- Limited extracurricular/community-based activities

10 year declining enrollment

- Funding reduced Coaches & Interventionists
- Reduced funding of local Levy by 30%

Teachers Need/Requested PD on How to Close the Achievement Gap

- Families with Generational Trauma/Non Traditional Family Units
- Limited Industry/Work
 Opportunities
- Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) & Co-Teaching

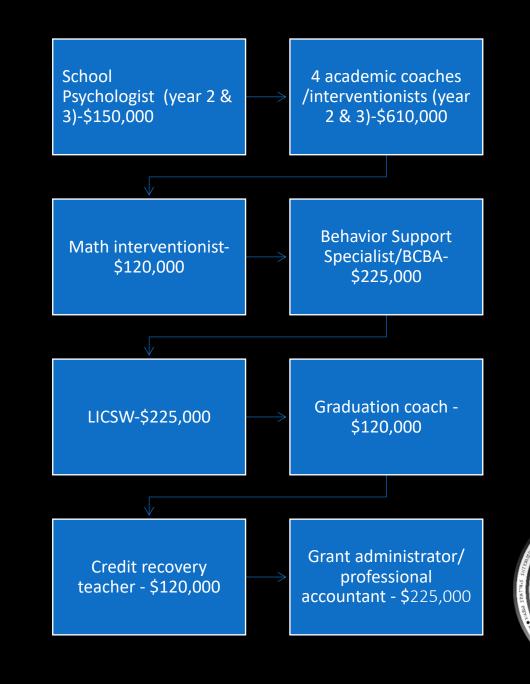

- Summer Programs
 - Required \$66,326.43
 - Discretionary \$500,000
 - Total \$566,326.43
- Continue Summer programming for K-12
 - 10 teachers
 - 1 social worker
 - 2 coordinators
 - 1 nurse
 - 1 custodian
 - Transportation
 - Meals
 - Blending of other funds for additional staff and resources

- After-school Programming
 - Required \$66,326.43
 - Discretionary \$233,673.57
 - Total \$300,000.00
- 3 of our schools are funded by 21st CCLC Grants
- Programming will be driven by skill gaps identified through various benchmark and summative assessments.

Connection to the County Strategic Plan

 - Goal 2: By June 2022, Morgan County Schools will reduce behavioral incidents by 2%, as measured by EOY discipline reports.
 - Goal 3: By June 2022, Morgan County Schools will strive to remove 5% of our students from a list of chronic absences.
