Parental Involvement

Parental involvement with homework is very beneficial. While no student should have an excessive amount of homework, these assignments are given for a variety of reasons:

- when students don't finish class work.
- to practice reading independently.
- to complete a reading log.
- to practice Go Math with an online tutorial program.

When students return to school repeatedly without homework, or have not made a good effort, a number of things can happen:

- they miss an opportunity practice.
- they may make slower than expected growth.
- they may receive a lower report card grade.
- they receive a consequence.

If students have ongoing problems with behavior, a behavior log may be used. This can be a successful strategy when the log is:

- signed and returned daily.
- used to talk with your child about behavior.
- combined with rewards and consequences.

Your involvement and assistance is of great benefit to your child's progress in school and will have a positive effect on their behavior. We appreciate your partnership in this process!

About the Third Grade Reading Guarantee

In kindergarten through grade three, schools will evaluate all children to determine if they are reading on or off track. If a child appears to be off track in reading, the school will immediately start a reading improvement plan.

A reading improvement plan (RIMP) will address each student's unique reading problems. Schools will monitor the plan to make sure the student's reading is improving. Schools will work closely with parents to help create a remedy and for parents to be able to support the plan.

In order for students to advance to the fourth grade, students had to meet a minimum score on the state reading test of 685 (scaled score) or 47 (subscore). This score needs to be attained either in the fall or spring administration of the state third grade reading test. The students will also be given an alternate measure called the Terra Nova where the student would need to reach another specific cut score. Notification of results from the winter administration of the Terra Nova will be sent home soon.
