### Mapping Your Way from Home Sweet Home

After providing map symbols and directions, invite students to create a map showing the route from their home to school. A fun motivator is to tell students that they have won a contest but the only way to receive their prize is to provide the delivery service with a clear and accurate map to their home. Maps should be neat, easy to read, and contain proper map symbols, with a key and compass rose. Let them know that landmarks will help the driver make a speedy delivery. (Most middle and high school students will be familiar with the route from home to school.)
