Oakbrooke Elementary will communicate with parents in the following ways to increase parent involvement and to support classroom instruction by:

- Distributing a monthly newsletter through email and school website to parents that is developed with the collaboration of PTO, principal, staff and parent volunteers. It includes school news, a calendar of events, and parenting tips related to school achievement. Flyers and callout are made on an as needed basis promoting school events.
- Routinely contacting parents on an individual basis to communicate about their child's progress. Daily communication will be sent by a communication folder. Feedback regarding work is in Schoology for parents to see. The PBIS app will be used for two-way communication with parent and teacher for information regarding school behavior. Parents can also access HAC (Home Access Center) to check student grades.
- Using the student handbook, school website (oakbrooke.pcssd.org), signage, and parent orientation meetings to display information regarding the school-wide plan.
- Providing parents with an interim report on the 5th week of the first 9 weeks. During the
 fifth week of the second, third and fourth terms, teachers will send interim reports to
 parents for students who have low or failing grades. Report cards will be sent every 9
 weeks with information regarding their child's academic progress.

- Conferencing with parents through parent teacher conference days to discuss student's
 progress, standardized test scores, and an explanation of the interventions teachers are
 using to assist the child in reaching achievement goals. Parents will be asked to engage
 in discussion of how they can support these efforts. Conferences for this school year are
 scheduled for September 15/22 and February 9/16.
- Communicating with other parents and staff at Oakbrooke through the Oakbrooke Facebook account.
