DEFINITION

The Occupational Therapist functions are part of a multidisciplinary team and provide an appropriate program for selected and eligible students with disabilities; provide occupational therapy assessment, plans goal development; provides appropriate intervention service to assist special needs students in acquiring functional performance skills; and perform other related duties as assigned.

• One year experience in a school setting serving students with disabilities preferred.

KNOWLEDGE OF

Sensory integration theory and application in the treatment of autism, PDD and associated regulatory disorders; an understanding of developmental foundations and neurodevelopment implications as related to learning/behaviors and educational success; clear understanding of the difference of an educational versus medical model in determining appropriate school based therapy services; understanding of state and federal regulations, guidelines and time lines.

- 4. Provide or serve as a resource to guide accommodations for students to gain access to the curriculum, classroom, and campus, including modifications of tools, tasks, materials or the environment.
- 5. Recommend methods and strategies to address student needs for therapy services.
- 6. Collaborate with medical personnel and multidisciplinary team members in interpreting and implementing therapy service.
- 7. Collaborate with teachers and support staff regarding activities to support and or reinforce student occupational therapy needs.

- 8. Communicate and collaborate with other staff and family members as a means of effectively infusing therapy activities in home and school to optimize the overall program and progress of the student.
- 9. Provide direct training and assistance to support staff directly involved with a student.
- 10. Maintain safe equipment and therapy environment.
- 11. Re-evaluate students' individual occupational therapy plans on a regular basis.
- 12. Develop and review student goals and objectives in accordance with each student's IEP.
- 13. Maintain appropriate records and documents related to individual assessment and services.
- 14. Attend IEP meetings as necessary and maintain progress notes of student records.
- 15. Other duties as assigned appropriate to the position.

WORKING CONDITIONS
