5 6 7 8 9	This level includes misbehavior whose frequency or seriousness tends to disrupt the learning climate of the school. These misbehaviors do not represent a direct threat to the health and safety of others but have educational consequences serious enough to require corrective action on the part of administrative personnel
10 11	Offenses that may result in suspension. Any student suspended will not be allowed to participate in any school function including field trips, athletic practices or contests, etc.
12 13	1st time Category II Offense - 3 days suspension or in-school suspension (where applicable) or corporal punishment
14 15	2nd time Category II Offense - 5 days suspension or corporal punishment or in-school suspension (where applicable)

These acts are so serious that they usually 8 require administrative actions which result in the immediate removal of the student from the school, 9 the intervention of law enforcement authorities, and/or action by the Board. 10 If a student's action poses a threat to the safety of others in the school, a teacher, principal, school 11 employee, or school bus driver may use reasonable force when necessary to prevent bodily harm or 12 death to another person.⁵ 13 14 These offenses are subject to suspension up to a maximum of 20 days. PROCEDURES FOR VIOLATION OF STUDENT USE OF CELLULAR TELEPHONES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Examples of Electronic Devices but not limited to:

Cell phones, Camera phones, PDAs, iPods, MP3 players, Discman, Beepers, Pagers, Gameboys, etc.

- 1. First Offense Confiscate cellular phone and return only to parent, warning issued.
- 2. Second Offense Two days after school detention or two days in-school suspension (ISS).
- 3. Third Offense One day out-of-school suspension and subsequent offenses will result in one day out-of-school suspensions per offense.

Principal may, at their discretion, follow Discipline Procedures for Grades 7-12 for repeat offenders

All confiscated electronic devices must be picked up at the school by the parent.
