<p><b>Overview</b></p> <p>The Stanley County School District implemented several mitigation strategies as outlined in the 2020 Return to Learn Plan. The Stanley County School District’s mitigation strategies consisted of: practicing of social distancing to the greatest extent possible, post signage and provide lessons to strongly encourage frequent hand washing and hygiene practices, provide hand sanitizer throughout the campus, increased cleaning protocols throughout the campus, including frequency and foggers, limited group gatherings where possible, strongly encouraged the wearing of an appropriate face covering while on campus and at school activities, symptom screening for all staff and students and visitors were excluded.</p> <p>The Stanley County also offered distance learning as an option for the 2020-2021 school year.</p> <p>As a further mitigation strategy for the 2021-2022 and beyond the District will use ARP/ESSER funding. Options include but are not limited to:</p>

In previous years we offered only a couple of days a week, this year we will offer every day to help get the students caught up. (2 years)</p> <p>New to Stanley County this year the district will offer a credit recovery program which will give staff the opportunity to monitor students and to work with them to ensure they have the proper credits needed. <p><b>Overview</b></p> <p>Educating the children in the Stanley County School District from all subgroups continues to be the #1 priority. The Stanley County School Districts uses Title I and Federal REAP funding to focus on student achievement and students from multiple backgrounds such as: homeless, low socio-economic status, and children with disabilities. The Stanley County School District has used previous ESSER funds and Coronavirus Relief Funds to purchase technology to address learning loss.</p>

<b>Narrative</b>
<p><b>Overview</b></p> <p>98% of students in the Stanley County School District attended in-person instruction during the 2020-2021 school year. At times during the year, students missed due to being identified as a close contact or contracting the virus.</p> <p>Our district outlined strategies for remote learning based on the phases correlated to the Stanley County COVID plan. Stanley County is a 1:1 laptop district 3<sup>rd</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grade. The district utilized online platforms such as Google Classroom, Zoom, and the district website.</p>
<p><b>Missed Most In-Person</b></p> <p>The Stanley County School District communicated with families to monitor student attendance and documented reasons for absences. Very few students were in violation of the attendance policy. For those students that did miss numerous days teachers worked closely to provide online or paper copies of work to stay on track.</p>
<p><b>Did Not Participate in Remote Instruction</b></p> <p>2% of our students participated in remote instruction. One certified teacher at the elementary and one certified teacher at the MS/HS checked in on these students weekly and monitored their process.</p>
<p><b>At Risk for Dropping Out</b></p> <p>Any student that was behind schedule based upon semester grades met with administration and teachers. Students who were behind were invited to attend BUFF tutoring program paid for by REAP dollars.</p>

<p>The Stanley County School District has developed a ARP ESSER funds committee. This committee includes district administration, board members and staff. Administration have disseminated surveys, COVID updates via school website and opportunities for public input.</p>
<p><b>Students</b></p> <p>Administration will monitor student needs and academic progress. The Stanley County School Board, administration, and staff are committed to making every decision based upon the best education for our students.</p>
<p><b>Families</b></p> <p>Stanley County will continue to disseminate surveys and gather parent input. The District will encourage two way communication and be transparent with ARP/ESSER spending by sharing information at school board meetings, newspaper articles, and website posting.</p>
<p><b>School and district administrators (including special education administrators)</b></p> <p>The District will have monthly administrative team meetings to analyze the impact of COVID on students. ESSER/ARP will be a standing agenda item on these administrative team meetings.</p>
