## Meal delivery, kitchen help, service needed at Center

Plainview's Social Center is located at 108 South Maple Street and is managed by Diane Elwood. “The Social Center is a nonprofit organization,” said Elwood. “The Social Center is governed by Northeast Nebraska Area Agency on Aging. We are state and federally funded by doing the required meal programs and activities we do.”

Donna Petersen and Jennifer Weinrich work alongside Elwood serving the community. “Our main goal is to meet the needs of the older people in our community,” said Elwood. “We strive to provide nutritional meals to the community, to have social activities available for our older generation to stay active in the community, and be able to stay in their own home for as long as possible.” This includes nutritional programs, health education programs, morning coffee, social classes, and exercise classes.

Monday through Friday, the Social Center delivers home-made meals to anyone that is unable to get out or to anyone who is not physically able to prepare their own meals. The center has been delivering meals for 43 years. “We also have meals at the center daily which are open to the community,” said

Elwood.

The Social Center is always looking for volunteers to assist with delivering meals to community members. “We usually let a volunteer drive a day a week, or when they are available to drive,” said Elwood. “It is never longer than about 30 minutes of your time, depending on how many meals we have. If there is a couple who would like to volunteer, they can deliver meals together. One person can drive, and the other person can run the meal up to the door.”

“Volunteers can help Donna with preparing the meal,” said Elwood. “Or, volunteers could assist with setting up for the meal, carry trays if needed, clean up, and help with the dishes.”

Other tasks would include making coffee in the morning for the coffee drinkers, be a host or hostess at the noon meal, help with the dishes, or be on the Social Center board since all board members are volunteers.

Volunteers will work alongside Diane Elwood and current volunteers. “I have a great bunch of volunteers that work well together and work as a team.” While there are busy times of the year, the Social Center would appreciate volunteers on a daily basis.

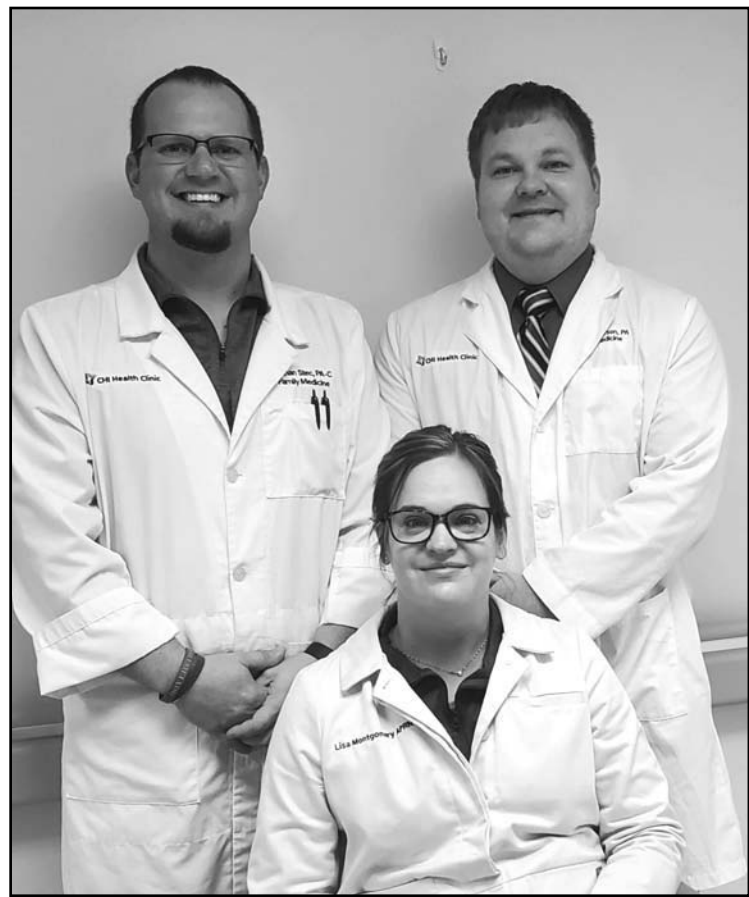

## USDA opens emergency CRP haying, grazing

Agricultural producers impacted by drought can now request haying and grazing on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres in certain Nebraska counties, while still receiving their full rental payment for the land.

"Drought is heavily impacting livestock producers in parts of Nebraska and across the country, and emergency haying or grazing of lands enrolled in CRP is one more drought mitigation tool to help producers," said Zach Ducheneaux, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). "While CRP makes annual rental payments for land in conservation, under certain circumstances, FSA can allow the haying and grazing of these lands to mitigate the impacts of natural disasters without a reduction in payments. As part of our climate-smart agriculture efforts, we are working with all stakeholder groups to ensure that supplemental benefits of CRP acres, like emergency haying and grazing, can be accessed in a manner that is more universally beneficial."

Outside of the primary nesting season, emergency haying and grazing of CRP acres may be authorized to provide relief to livestock producers in areas affected by a severe drought or similar natural disaster. The primary nesting season for Nebraska ended July 15. Counties are approved for emergency haying and grazing due to drought conditions on a county-by-county basis using the D-2 drought classification on the U.S. Drought Monitor as the main program trigger. Producers interested in emergency haying or grazing of CRP should contact their county FSA office to find out whether their county is eligible.

Producers can use the CRP acreage under the emergency grazing provisions for their livestock or may grant another live-

stock producer use of the CRP acreage.

Producers interested in emergency haying or grazing of CRP acres must notify their FSA county office before starting any activities. This includes producers accessing CRP acres held by someone else. To maintain contract compliance, producers must have their conservation plan modified by USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

### Emergency CRP Haying and Grazing Option

CRP emergency haying and grazing is available in eligible counties as long as the stand is in condition to support such activity subject to a modified conservation plan. Hay may be cut once in eligible counties each program year (October 1-September 30). Haying must be concluded prior to August 31 according to an approved conservation plan to allow time for regrowth prior to winter conditions and must be removed within 15 calendar days of being baled.

CRP emergency grazing is available in eligible counties as long as it does not exceed 90 days each program year (October 1-September 30) and must be stopped when the minimum grazing height is reached, as established within the modified CRP conservation plan or when the county is no longer eligible for emergency haying and grazing.

### Non-Emergency CRP Haying and Grazing Option

For producers not in an eligible county, there are options available under non-emergency haying/grazing provisions outside of the primary nesting season, including:

Haying of all CRP practices, except for CP12 Wildlife Food Plots and several tree practices, not more than once every three years for a 25% payment reduction.

Grazing of CRP acres not more than every other year for a 25% payment reduction.

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### Livestock Forage Disaster Program Provisions

If the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) triggers in a county for 2021 grazing losses due to drought, the provisions for CRP emergency haying and grazing change. There may be restrictions on grazing carrying capacity and on which CRP practices can be hayed. Nebraska currently has five counties, Boyd, Cedar, Dixon, Holt and Knox, where LFP has triggered and where certain CRP emergency grazing restrictions may apply.

### Additional Drought Assistance

Other programs are available for livestock producers. Producers who experience livestock deaths and feed losses due to natural disasters may be eligible for the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP). This program also provides eligible producers with compensation for expenses associated with transporting water to livestock physically located in a county that is designated as level "D3 Drought - Extreme" according to the Drought Monitor.

More information on disaster assistance programs is available on farmers.gov, including the Disaster Assistance Discovery Tool, Disaster Assistance At a Glance brochure, and Farm Loan Discovery Tool, which can help producers and landowners determine program or loan options. For assistance with a crop insurance claim, producers and landowners should contact their crop insurance agent. For FSA and NRCS programs, they should contact their local USDA Service Center.

## Some School Policies

### REGISTRATION

**New students and those who did not complete early registration or those who have scheduling problems are to report to the principal-guidance office immediately.**

Included within this supplement is a printing of major policies and regulations affecting students, parents and the community in general. Keep these for a quick reference to major Plainview School policies.

The following policies affecting students have been set down in writing by the Plainview Board of Education.

Students are given a handbook which details all aspects of school. Be sure to read your child's copy as soon as possible.

### STUDENT FEE POLICY

Under state law, the school will waive fees for certain school activities. These activities may be curricular or extracurricular.

Certain fees for activities will be waived for students whose families qualify for free and reduced lunches. These families will need to sign a waiver permitting the exchange of their free and reduced status with the activity waiver program.

In addition, individual applications for a waiver must be made for each fee to be waived. Information is available in the student handbooks. Contact the school offices for complete details.

### ATTENDANCE

Students are said to be in "attendance" when they are physically present in school or school-sanctioned activities and are under the care and supervision of authorized school personnel.

Regular and Punctual Attendance: Encouragement, helpfulness, impartiality and genuine firmness as necessary are more conducive to good attendance than any dictatorial mandates. However, prompt and authoritative action should be taken whenever attendance requirements are purposely flouted.

Procedure - Absences. Tardiness will be reported to the principal's office at the outset of each period. At the Elementary Building, attendance is recorded twice daily. An attendance record card will be kept on each student. A term attendance report will be maintained by the individual teacher and due in the principal's office following the close of the quarter. Absences will be posted each day.

### EXCUSED ABSENCES

Absences from school are excused for illness, bereavement in the family, doctor or dental appointments, court appearances, or religious observances and special requests made in advance of absence. Whenever possible, parents are requested to notify the principal's office in advance of any absence. The school principal determines if an absence is excused.

### UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

Truancy, skipping of class, or unexcused absences will result in discipline from teacher and administration - to include: notification to parents, detention after school, or possible suspension and/or recommendation for expulsion. Examples of unexcused absences are shopping trips, haircuts and senior pictures. If not sure, ask the principal.

### EMERGENCY PLAN

A new state regulation became effective on Oct. 1, 2003. This regulation requires that our school be prepared to implement an emergency treatment plan, called a protocol, anytime a student or staff member experiences a life threatening asthma attack or systemic allergic reaction (anaphylaxis).

## Plainview Elementary School Information

### LEAVING SCHOOL DURING SESSION

The school day begins at 8:00 a.m. and ends at 3:27 p.m. The library opens at 8 a.m. for students to read or check out books.

### ABSENCES

Plainview Elementary School has taken some steps to ensure the safety and accounting of regular attendance. In order to accomplish this task, we must have the support of the home. Please read these steps in reporting your child's absence:

1. The day of absence, contact the elementary school office, 402-582-3808. Please inform the office of the nature of the absence and anticipated length of the absence.

2. These calls should be made between 7:30 and 8:30 a.m. If we are to effectively check on the safety and whereabouts of our students, we need to work within this time line. If homes do not have phones, it still becomes your responsibility to notify our offices of the absence.

3. Vacations which result in loss of several days' attendance are discouraged.

4. Parents picking up children at times other than the regular dismissal time should send a note with their child to inform the teacher. Parents should come to the office for their child.

5. If a student is tardy, he/she must check in with the office before going to their classroom.

Two days are allowed for the children to get their work made up for every day they are absent. However, if the child knows he will be absent, he should have his work completed in advance of his absence.

The protocol requires that 911 is called first. After that call is made, an EpiPen injection will be given and then albuterol is provided through a nebulizer. An EpiPen is a small pre-filled, automatic injection device that resembles a high-lighter. It is used to deliver epinephrine. Epinephrine is a medication that is used to bring quick relief by improving breathing and lung function. Albuterol is another medication that is used to bring breathing relief (commonly found in metered-dose inhalers). The nebulizer is a machine that mixes the albuterol with air to provide a fine mist (aerosol) for breathing in through a mask or mouthpiece.

The protocol steps are designed to provide quick, effective care in order to prevent death from occurring due to a severe asthma attack or anaphylaxis. Staff members have been trained to recognize the signs and symptoms of a life-threatening "breathing" emergency and to properly administer the medications. The protocol is a standing medical order that has been signed by the physician at Plainview Area Health System. This protocol will be in effect during normal school hours.

If you know that your student has asthma or a known allergy, it is critically important that you communicate this information to our school staff. For each student with a known allergic condition or asthma, you must provide the school with written medical instructions and medications as directed by a physician. An emergency care form must be filled out for those students with known asthma or allergies. You can obtain this form from the school office. In the event that your student experiences a life-threatening asthma attack or systemic allergic reaction, we will defer to the specific documents and medication that you have provided. If you do not have medical documentation and instructions on file with the school for your student, we will defer to the regulatory protocol described above. If, for whatever reason, you do not want your student to receive the life-saving emergency treatment under the protocol, you must file your written objection with the school board.

### IMMUNIZATION

Nebraska law now requires students to present proof of immunization prior to entering school. Waivers for religious or medical reasons must be verified by clergy or doctor.

### LUNCH PERIOD

Still working on a flexible schedule. Students who bring lunches will be allowed to eat out-of-doors or in the elementary hot-lunch cafeteria. Campus is closed during lunch.

### LOCKER SERVICE

**PARENTS SHOULD UNDERSTAND THAT LOCKERS WITH LOCKS ARE PROVIDED.** However, money or other articles of value should be left at home or carried on your person. Under no circumstances should they be left in your locker.

Lost locks will cost students \$3.50. Students must make some effort to secure their possessions. The school is not responsible for lost or stolen articles.

Students must use school-provided locks.

### BUS UNLOADING

**All buses will unload and load in front of the elementary school on the street between the two buildings.**

**The street will be closed during school hours, 7:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.**

## Service Available to Students with Disabilities

School districts are required to identify children in need of special education services each year. Services needed for children may be arranged within the district or by contracting with another district or agency.

According to state and federal statutes, children with disabilities are those with disabilities in any of the following areas: vision, hearing, physical development, emotional development, speech or language development, and intellectual development.

Children eligible for services through school districts include children ages zero to 21. Programs for preschool children may range from programs for parents (in-home training for ages infant to age three) to programs at a center or school (ages three to five).

Parents or heads of families should contact the school district or the Special Education Department of E.S.U. No. 8 at Neligh if any of the following conditions apply in their family:

1. The parent suspects his or her child (preschool or school-age) may have a disability and would like to secure an evaluation for the child.

2. The child (preschool or school-age) has been diagnosed with a disability and is eligible for services.

Only children who will be five years of age or over by July 31, 2020, will be enrolled in kindergarten.

### School Nutrition Program

Arrangements are again being made to serve breakfast at a cost of \$1.60 for pre-kindergarten through 12th-grade students and hot lunches this year at a cost of \$2.25 for pre-kindergarten through third-grade and \$2.50 for fourth-through 12th-grade students.

Students must bring lunch money before the first meal.

We are offering "Grab-N-Go" breakfast in the high school for students to eat in their homeroom.

### Daily Schedule

Classes will begin in the junior-senior high at 8:00 a.m. and dismissal at 3:27 p.m.

We will have 1 p.m. dismissal on the following dates: Sept. 1, 15, 22, 29; Oct. 6, 20; Nov. 3, 17; Jan. 5, 19; Feb. 2, 10, 16; March, 2, 16; April, 6, 20; May 4, 18, 19.

Students are to be cleared from the building by 4 p.m. unless in a supervised activity or administrative clearance has been granted.

### First Day of School

The first day of school will be Tuesday, Aug. 17.

### Accredited

The Plainview Public School is fully accredited with the State of Nebraska Frameworks and the Nebraska State Department of Education.

### Extracurricular Activities

Highlighting extracurricular events will be athletics, with a schedule of games arranged for the local school, and its music department with both instrumental and vocal music divisions. Dramatics are also offered, with school plays, one-act plays and other public speaking events.

Particularly important is that a veteran should know his "C" number and carry it with him at all times. In matters involving insurance the number of the certificate is very important, and in all cases rank, organization, service number, and enlistment and discharge dates can be of added advantage. The original discharge certificate, or a large certified copy (not billfold photostat, which is neither certified nor, in many instances, legible) is valuable in that it furnishes much of the information last above listed, and should be taken to the office where assistance is sought, along with copies of all prior correspondence. Service workers will bend over backward at all times to do everything possible for the veteran with a claim, but a little cooperation on his part, along the lines above suggested, will prove most beneficial to him, as well as to the office which is trying to serve him.

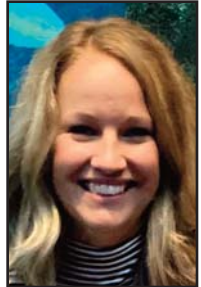
