Overview		
The CDC recommends frequent handwashing. In addition to practicing handwashing and respiratory etiquette (covering coughs and sneezes) to keep from getting and spreading infections, the use of hand sanitizer containing at least 60% alcohol (for teachers, staff, and older students who can safely use hand sanitizer) is recommended. The Newell School District has budgeted funds to purchase sanitizing wipes and hand sanitizer to implement these recommendations. To maintain clean and sanitary facilities, the NHS will follow CDC guidelines, which state that: cleaning once a day is usually enough to sufficiently remove potential viruses that may be on surfaces. Disinfecting (using disinfectants on the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency COVID- 3 19 list external icon) removes any remaining germs on surfaces, which further reduces any risk of spreading infection. Overview

The Newell School District monitors student progress through a variety of ongoing formal and informal assessments. Students in grades K-10 utilize MAP reading and math assessments as a part of the comprehensive needs assessment data to assess growth from pre-determined instructional periods.

The Newell School District would update curriculum in the elementary, middle school, and high school to meet the changing standards in education along with provide the teachers and students with up-to-date resources. The updated curriculum choice was a suggestion from many staff members from a 2021 summer survey. Staff for the 2020-2021 had a data retreat at the end of the school year and some of the student's needs are addressed in new curriculum. The data retreat ended with goals for our elementary, middle school, and high school staff members to achieve for the 2021-2022 school year.

Curriculum selection was orchestrated through a staff survey in where respondents addressed the age of the curriculum currently using along with answering the question- "Is this curriculum addressing content standards in their subject"? Staff felt curriculum was outdated and not addressing content standards. Sample curriculums from textbook companies was received.

In the elementary, there would be updates to the science, math, and phonic curriculums to meet the changing needs for students. The school administration and staff want students to have a strong academic foundation in elementary school. The current elementary curriculum is outdated and does not meet the core needs.

In the middle school, updating social studies curriculum will support staff in teaching the everchanging history of our country and world.

The high school needs to update curriculum in physical science and world history.

Next, we would like to give staff professional development in the summer monthly to curriculum map the new curriculum and to become comfortable with the resources offering by the new curriculum. Professional development would allow for success for teachers and students throughout the school year and would receive compensation for teachers in the summer. Planned units for the upcoming school year would benefit academic success.

Continuing to offer credit recovery in the summer months for the upcoming years:

- Supervised by school personnel assisting students
- Keep students on track with graduation
- Provide students with another avenue to earn credit

Increases graduation rates (have been below 100% for past 5 years)

Offering an after-school program:

- Twice weekly

Overview

Newell school District would use funds to update and improve maintenance of flooring throughout the campus.

- Current lower elementary flooring would be updated with new tile
- Current upper elementary, middle school and ag/science buildings carpeted floors in hallways receiving multiple grades daily travel would be replaced with tile
- The century old high school building would have any current carpeting (15 yr. age) replaced and the basement painted floor would be tiled.
 - Increasing the ease of cleaning will decrease the presence of germs and bacteria though out the campus, improving student and staff health and well-being
- The lower elementary building restrooms would receive a remodel
 - Current cracked, unlevel and missing tiles from the 1950's would be replaced
 - Boys' restroom would receive installation of age-appropriate urinals and adequate stalls
 - Girls' restroom would receive a stall renovation to meet privacy needs as well as allow a storage space for supplies
 - These restrooms would be easily maintained increasing cleanliness

Project #1	\$100,000

Also, in the lower elementary we would like to renovate the girls' and boys' bathrooms. The lower elementary services preschool for 3- and 4-year-old and four- and five-year-old, kindergarten, vocal kindergarten through twelfth grade, speech/physical therapy/occupational therapy offices for preschool through twelfth grade, library for all students, and a DDN for virtual classes taken by our ninth through twelfth students. The bathrooms have cracking and uneven floors which make them hard to clean. The boy's bathroom has urinals that are not at the appropriate height for the students that use these bathrooms. Also, the boy's bathroom only has one bathroom stall that is completely closed off for privacy. I would like to add more ageappropriate urinals and more bathroom stalls that ensure privacy. They girl's bathroom in the lower elementary has urinals that do not work and tiling that is uneven and cracking. The Newell School District would like to renovate this bathroom in the summer for 2022. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors. Lastly, the bathrooms in the lower elementary have asbestos in them according to our asbestos report.

Project #2 \$359,202

The Newell School District would like to replace the carpet in the upper elementary, middle school, ag/science, and high school hallways and have tiling in these areas which can be cleaned easier and more thoroughly than our current carpet. The carpet is at least 15 years old and traps in germs that are harmful for students, staff, and patrons. The classrooms in the upper elementary, middle school, ag/science, and high school have carpet in them and I would like to replace the current carpet with carpet that is easier to maintain. We would like to keep the carpet flooring in the classroom to not create an echoey environment which would not make it conducive for learning. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors. The Newell School District would like to complete this project in the summers of 2022 and 2023.

Project #3 \$300,000

Lastly, we would like to do an addition our current agriculture/science building. The expansion would include a classroom we could offer welding separate from the woodworking class. Currently, we have six welders that are along the wall of our industrial technology classroom and these welders are close in proximity to projects for woodworking and other classes. The additional welding classroom would give storage for welding supplies, material, and projects for our students in welding class. The welding shop would be 30 feet long by 30 feet wide which would be larger than our current classrooms in the ag/science building. The Newell School District would look at workforce grants to supplement the building of the welding

classroom. The Newell School District would look for contractors during the 2021-2022 school year and plan construction of the welding classroom for the summer of 2023. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors.

The Newell School District will use ARP ESSER funds to identify students with social/emotional support through counseling and social/emotion curriculum. This will be provided to all students in the school district. Also, we will use ARP ESSER funds through

upgrading our technology to ensure we are a 1:1 district that have devices and equipment under warranty. We will reengage students through ARP ESSER funds by providing academic support in areas such as credit recovery, after-school program, and providing curriculum that is standard-based and peaks the interests of our students in elementary, middle school, and high school. We will support students through the purchase of updated technology and curriculum. Also, we will support students by having a full-time substitute teacher available on staff that the students can build positive relationships within and outside the classroom.

Missed Most In-Person

Our Butte County assistant state's attorney has come up with a plan to help our school district hold students accountable for their attendance in school.

The Newell School District will use ARP ESSER funds with students that missed last year due to virtual learning by offering services such as counseling, social/emotional curriculum, and academic support through the after-school program and credit recovery. These opportunities will allow a student to decrease the learning gap that might have occurred last school year.

Did Not Participate in Remote Instruction

The Newell School District did not have any individuals that did not participate in remote instruction last school year.

At Risk for Dropping Out

The Newell School District will help students who are at a risk of dropping out. An option of credit recovery and academic support through the after-school program. Both will help decrease dropout rates and increase academic success.

The Newell School District will inform families of students through public meetings and articles in the local newspaper regarding ARP ESSER spending. Also, the school district will provide families with support to make sure students are academically successful. Families will be able to fill out surveys over ESSER III funding usage.

The Newell School District will make sure administrative leaders have a voice regarding ARP ESSER funding. They will be in the front of the conversation to make sure that purchases are used in the best way possible to help educate students.
