FAMILY ENGAGEMENT PLAN

2022-23 Components:

A. The Family Engagement Plan is developed with parental input and is distributed to parents.

- Keep parents of students in Tier II or III Programs informed of RTI progress by sending home progress monitoring results every 4 weeks
- Send parents a mid-nine weeks progress report
- Send home nine weeks report cards
- TCap results are sent to Ross to be sent home from there the following year

F. Meetings requested by parents are scheduled to allow parental suggestions to be part of the educational decision-making about their child. Responses to the suggestions are given as soon as possible.

- Hold parent meetings as requested to discuss the child's progress and to decide about the best plans for improvement
- Hold Support Team (S-Team) meetings weekly
- Hold meetings concerning IEPs and 504s as needed

 - Develop and maintain a Parenting Skills Library on various topics with materials available for checkout
 - Inform parents of educational computer programs & websites available for their child to use at home
 - Share parenting newsletters throughout the year
 - Parenting brochures are available in the school lobby
 - Provide case by case support for families by partnering with the school social worker
 - K. The school will educate teachers, pupil services personnel, principals, and other staff (with the assistance of parents) in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs, and build ties between parents and the school.
 - Hold Parent Advisory Board meetings as a means of parental input
 - Provide opportunities for parents to work with their child on assigned projects at home
 - L.
