

Haskamp Marks 200th Career Win

Hanson Beavers' Head Football Coach, Jim Haskamp, reached a milestone that many coaches dream of. Haskamp marked his 200th career win over the Garretson Blue Dragons in Garretson on Friday, September 30.

Haskamp is in his 35th season at Hanson with an all-time record of 200-130.

Currently through this season, Haskamp ranks first among active coaches in the three 9 man classes of football in South Dakota and is ranked 17th in all SD football classes. Haskamp has helped Hanson claim the 2005

Class 9A state title, along with 9A titles in 2009 and 2010. Haskamp also won the Class 9B title in 2008.

In January of 2017, Haskamp was inducted into the South Dakota Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Haskamp, who grew up in Michigan, moved to South Dakota in 1981 to accept a teaching position at Todd County. After teaching at Todd County, Haskamp got his first varsity football job as an assistant in Onida before taking over at Hanson in 1988.

Beavers Blank The Blue Dragons

The Hanson Beavers traveled to Garretson on Friday, September 30, to take on the Garretson Blue Dragons.

The Beavers won the football game with a score of 51-0 as the game ended early due to the mercy rule. The Beaver win marked Coach Jim Haskamp's 200th career win.

The Beavers started off their scoring with a fumble recovery by Hayden Schroeder in which he returned it for a 30 yard touchdown. Hadley Wallace completed the conversion. At the 2:36 mark, Wallace broke free for a 40-yard touchdown and Jackson Jarding completed the conversion. This made the score 16-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The Beavers started off the second quarter with a score right away as Brock Tuttle ran in from

five yards out. Wallace completed the conversion. Wallace scored again at the 7:39 mark from four yards out. Tuttle completed the conversion. The Beavers scored again at the 5:06 mark as Jarding scored from eight yards out. The conversion failed. At the end of the second quarter, Weston Kayser broke free for a 72-yard touchdown. Jarding completed the extra point kick. This made the score 45-0 at the end of the first half.

The only score in the second half was in the third quarter when Cole Dewald ran in a 68-yard touchdown which ended the game due to the mercy rule.

The Beavers had 338 yards of total offense - 299 rushing and 39 passing. Leading the Beavers was Wallace with three carries for 56 yards and two touch-

downs. Jarding had six carries for 55 yards and a touchdown. Tuttle had four carries for 27 yards and a touchdown. Kayser had two carries for 86 yards and a touchdown. Dewald had one carry for 68 yards and a touchdown. Ethan Cheeseman caught one pass for 11 yards and Wallace caught one for 26 yards.

Leading the defense was Tuttle with eight tackles followed by Charlie Prien with six tackles. Sutton Dewald and Wallace added five tackles apiece. Keenan Waldera had one interception. Schroeder and Tuttle both had fumble recoveries with Schroeder returning for a touchdown.

The Beavers now move to 5-1 on the season. They will host Viborg-Hurley on Friday, October 7.

Harriers Continue To Perform Well

The Hanson high school and middle school cross country runners performed well at recent meets.

On Saturday, September 24, the team traveled to Platte to run at the Platte-Geddes Invite where medals were given to the top 15 in each division. division: Tenly Slaba, 10th place (12:39).

On September 28, the high school harriers ran at the Parker Invite at the ParMar Golf Course in Parker.

The Hanson girls won the varsity girl's division and were led by Eliza Oltmanns who won the event with a time of 20:34.39. Taziah Hawkins medaled in fourth place (21:49.16); Cadence Jarding, fifth place (22:05.10); Reese Marek, sixth place (22:39.17); Alyssa Moschell, seventh place (23:11.54); and Erin Dewald, 11th place (23:19.72).

Kyannah Sweeten placed third in the junior varsity girl's division with a time of 22:03.55.

The boy's team finished fourth overall with Platte-Geddes winning the meet.

In the varsity boy's division, Carson Ferry placed highest in fifth with a time of 19:31.24. Will Jarding placed 13th (20:20.94) and Anthony Geist finished in 22nd place (21:15.21).

On Thursday, September 29, Slaba was the lone Hanson harrier to compete at the Menno Junior High Power Run in Menno. Slaba placed sixth overall with a time of 15:39.06.

The Hanson cross country team will run at the Howard Invite today and will be in Parkston for the Ethan/Parkston Cross Country Meet on Thursday, October 6.
