Too often we forget about the personal sacrifices school board members routinely make.

Too often we forget about the important role school board members play in assuring local control over our public schools, control that is in the hands of people we know ... people who are our neighbors.

Too often we forget that, in the tradition of a representative democracy, school board members are our connection to influencing how our public schools are governed.

Too often we are quick to criticize school board members without really knowing all the details that went into any given decision.

Too often the efforts of school board members go unrecognized and unrewarded.

## '68 State Championship Football Team Honored

The 1968 State Championship Football Team was honored at the Cory-Rawson Varsity football game on Friday, October 12. It has been 50 years since this team earned their State Class A Champ title by being undefeated, untied and unscored upon. They were recognized during the game then they were invited to gather for a Meet & Greet with the public, Cory-Rawson football players, coaches and cheerleaders after the game in the school cafeteria. The Varsity football players each wore a special "stinger" on their helmets that evening in honor of the 1968 team and their accomplishment (see photo).

The 1968 State Championship Team's nine game season ended with them being undefeated, untied, and unscored upon. Only 8 teams in Ohio have been unscored upon and Cory-Rawson owns 2 of the 8 (1952 & 1968). The 1968 defense held their opponents to 615 total yards for

the season (458 yards rushing, 157 yards passing) while the C-R offense drove for 3,554 total yards (2,481 rushing, 1,073 passing). No opponent crossed C-R's 20 yard line. They pulled in 17 interceptions. During the season 14 different team members scored a total of 338 points, averaging 37.6 points per game. The offense allowed only 3 interceptions for the season. The C-R offense averaged 395 yards per game (5.8 yards or more per carry). The three team captains, Larry Young, Mike Inniger, and Kurt Beach, were all named 1<sup>st</sup> Team All-Ohio with Larry Young also being named Honorable Mention High School All-American.

The team was coached by Head Coach Jim "Spike" Berry, and assisted by Bob Abbey, Jim Hamman and Lowell Rossman. The banner behind the team in the above photo was designed by

Cory-Rawson High School art teacher, Kris Sherer. It is currently on display in the old high school cafeteria.






## State Soils
