Shifting Points of View

Both fiction and nonfiction can be written from various points of view. The author's **point of view** is the voice of the person telling the story.

First Person Narration

When the story is being told from the point of view or perspective of a character who is in the story.

Pronouns such as I, me, we, us, my, our, myself, ourselves show first person narration.

Example: I knew I was in trouble when I saw my mom's face.

Third Person Narration

When the story is being told from someone else's point of view or perspective.

Pronouns such as **he**, **she**, **her**, **him**, **it**, **they**, **them**, **their**, **themselves** show third person narration.

Example: Shannon knew she was in trouble when she saw her mom's face.

Steps:

- 1. Read the excerpt with a partner.
- 2. Determine whether it is written in first or third person narration.
- 3. Restate the excerpt from a different point of view. For example, if the text is written in first person narration, restate it in third person narration.

TEXT 1: One fine morning, the curious baby elephant asked, "What does the crocodile have for dinner?" All together everybody yelled, "HUSH!" in a dreadful tone, and they shushed and shooed him away angrily. But the baby elephant did not understand why. He was still curious!

TEXT 2: When the earthquake hit, I was in my bedroom getting ready to sleep. My brother was downstairs in the kitchen. He screamed for me to come downstairs, "Rian, I think it's an earthquake! Run down now! We need to evacuate the house." My heart was racing as I noticed the ground rumbling and my books falling off the shelf. We made it out of the house safely and nothing major was damaged. I was so relieved.

TEXT 3: Marcela walked right past her sister. She had no plan to give her any of the candy that she had earned herself. If Janet wanted candy, she would have to use her own money. Marcela felt that was fair.

TEXT 4: Rosie wanted a kitten more than anything in the world. For months, she had dreamed of the day that she and her parents would adopt a new pet. But Rosie's mother insisted they wait until Rosie's birthday, which was still two months away. Rosie thought of kittens all day. She hoped hers would have blue eyes, fluffy fur, and a happy purr that Rosie would feel through her shirt when the kitten curled up on her chest.

REMEMBER: First person is when a character narrates the story with *I*, *me*, *my*, or *mine* in his or her speech.

FOINT OF VIEW IN STORYTELLING

Every writer tells his or her story from a certain perspective, or point of view. Some stories are told from the perspective of a narrator who is part of the story, known as first person point of view. Other stories are told from the perspective of a "narrator" who is not in the story at all, which is known as third person point of view. With this exercise, you'll learn about the difference between first person and third person, two of the most common points of view used in storytelling.

Third Person

The narrator is not in the story, only tells what happens. For example, in the story "Goldilocks and the Three Bears," the all the characters are called "he," "she" or "it."

When deciding if a story is first or third person, conversations in quotation marks don't count.

First Person

The narrator is a character in the story and often does not know what is going to happen next. He tells the story using the pronouns "I" and "me." Example:

Robert Louis Stevenson's Treasure Island:

Well, mother was upstairs with father and **I** was laying the breakfast-table against the captain's return when the parlour door opened and a man stepped in on whom **I** had never set **my** eyes before.
