



- Budget surplus is much smaller compared to last year lots of references to accomplishments in Governor Newsom's first budget
- Governor Newsom proposes many one-time programs, mostly relatively small, to address
  priorities related to health care affordability, housing and homelessness, climate change and
  education
- Continued spending on reserves and paying down debts and liabilities, but not beyond what is required by Prop 2
- Schools get COLA but very little additional discretionary funding, while costs continue to rise
- With relatively flat budgets, there is a disconnect between public expectations based on talk
  of strong economy and school budget realities
- Will MCO tax or other creative approach provide opening for some additional spending, perhaps more help with school employer CalSTRS/CalPERS rates?

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


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# Political Backdrop

- Governor Newsom seeks contrast with President Trump
- Start of an election year in California turnout and enthusiasm should favor Democratic candidates and progressive issues, but no guarantees
- State school bond on ballot in March 2020 Proposition 13 title could cause some confusion, and lone measure on the ballot
- Split-Roll measure setting up for big battle in November
  - "No" side wants to make it all about "protecting" Prop 13
  - "Yes" side needs to persuade voters on commercial/residential property distinction, frame as "closing corporate loophole" while touting benefits for schools and public safety
- How will looming elections impact legislator's positions during budget negotiations?

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Employment and payroll growing at 1.9% in 2020, slowing to .9% in 2021
Real Personal Income growing by 2.1% and 1.9% in 2020 and 2021

 Higher cost of living for tech workers and contraction in logistics industries driving slowing growth in LA and Bay Area

Under current risks and projections, the state budget should be OK through 2020

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
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



# **Economic and Budget Risks**


- Static housing/construction industries; rising housing costs, continuing restrictions on immigration – all impacting tech, agriculture and service industries
- Trade issues, especially China decreased international activity through 2019 in CA ports and airports despite lessened fears
- Wildfires, power shutoffs and PG&E
- Trillion-dollar federal deficits, low GDP growth, low interest rates a recipe for a difficult climb out, if a recession hits
- Federal approval of the Managed Care Organization (MCO) tax
- · Revenue source swapping can increase future revenue volatility


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















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
# **Proposition 98**


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- \$84 billion Prop 98 Guarantee
- \$2.9 billion 2020-21 projected guarantee increase over 2019 Budget Act
- Upward adjustments to guarantee for 2019-20 (\$517 million) and 2018-19 (\$302 million) primarily due to increased property tax and GF revenues
- Test 1 projected for 2020-21 (funding K-14 education at 1986-87 proportion of GF) and throughout budget forecast due largely to declining ADA
- After providing COLA, about \$1.3 billion available in 2020-21 for ongoing purposes – Governor allocates most of that (\$1.1 billion) for one-time purposes


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
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

# LCFF Fiscal Transparency

- · Response to findings in recent LCFF state audit
- \$600,000 one-time Prop 98 to CDE to improve and strengthen LCFF fiscal accountability:
  - Develop online LCAP portal to house information (e.g. how much funding is being spent on increased or improved services for high-need student groups) collected from LCAPs to make the information more accessible
  - Co-locate the School Accountability Report Card (SARC) in the LCAP portal to make it easier to compare both accountability tools
- Administration will also be looking at other ways to strengthen accountability around LEAs' responsibility to their high-need students
- AB 1834 (tracking of funding) & AB 1835 (unspent S&C funding)

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# County Office of Education LCFF Entitlement

- Alternative Education Grant
  - Base Grant per ADA (with 2.29% COLA) = \$12,310
  - Supplemental Grant = 35% of Base Grant per unduplicated students + juvenile court school students
  - Concentration Grant = 35% of Base Grant per unduplicated student (beyond 50%) + 50% of juvenile court school enrollment
- Operations Grant \$736,266 (with 2.29% COLA) for each COE, plus
  - \$122,711 per each school district in the county, plus
  - A per ADA amount based on county-wide ADA, ranging from \$78.58/ADA in the smallest counties to \$44.90/ADA in the largest
- Administration plans to address funding for future obligations to provide differentiated assistance to charter schools

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




# Pension Relief for School Employers

- Governor cites continued relief from 2019 Budget Act, no new relief proposed
- 2019 Budget Act provided:
  - CalSTRS:
    - \$600 million to buy down employer contribution rates (by 1.03% in 2019-20, 0.7% in 2020-21)
    - \$1.64 billion to pay down long-term unfunded liabilities, expected to lower future rates by 0.3%
  - CalPERS:
    - \$244 million to buy down employer contribution rates (by 1.01% in 2019-20, 0.9% in 2020-21)
    - \$660 million to pay down long-term unfunded liabilities, estimated 0.3% ongoing decrease in rates

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# Schools and Communities First Initiative

- Currently collecting signatures to qualify for the November 2020 Ballot
- The initiative would require commercial property values to be assessed no less than every three years (instead of only when property ownership changes) – exempts some small commercial property owners
- No changes for residential property
- LAO estimates \$7.5-\$12 billion revenue annually, split between K-14 (40%) and local governments (60%) after costs, K-14 share is \$2.6-4.6 billion
- November 2019 PPIC Poll:
  - · 46% of likely voters in support
  - · 45% of likely voters opposed
- Potential alternative from Governor Newsom and Legislature?

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





# CSBA/ACSA Full & Fair Funding Campaign


- Now targeting 2022 ballot
- Would raise estimated \$15 billion for K-14 schools
  - Proposes to increase taxes on net corporate income over \$1 million by up to 5%
  - Proposes to increase taxes on personal income taxes on taxable income over \$1 million by up to 3%
- ACSA supports Schools and Communities First, on agenda for CSBA delegate meeting in May
- Some legislators have expressed support for approach outlined in Full & Fair Funding proposal

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














- Integrated wrap-around services, such as intensive health and mental health services, social services, and early screening and intervention
- Professional development in student mental and behavioral health, trauma informed care, social-emotional learning, and restorative justice
- Family and community engagement through activities including home visits and school climate surveys
- Expanded learning opportunities
- Likely to be competitive grants awarded to small number of LEAs in each of the four identified areas

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# School Nutrition

- On top of 2.29% COLA, additional \$60 million ongoing Prop 98 to improve the quality of meals and encourage participation in state and federal meals programs
  - Increases state reimbursement rate per meal to \$0.335, an approx. \$0.08 increase over the current rate
- \$10 million one-time Prop 98 for training for school food workers to promote healthier and more nutritious meals
- \$10 million one-time non-Prop 98 for the CA Department of Food and Ag to establish a Farm to School Grant Program to expand healthy food access through grants to schools
  - \$1.5 million annually starting 2021-22

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



# Career Technical Education

# No changes in funding proposed

- \$150 million in ongoing funding for the CTE Incentive Grant program, being administered by CDE
  - Round 5 allocations were to be approved by the State Board of Education on January 9 – questions and missteps led to delay
- \$150 million ongoing funding to expand K-12 component of the Community College Strong Workforce Program
  - · Reviewing and scoring 2019-20 applications
  - · Awards scheduled to be announced February 26, 2020
- Legislative interest still high Assembly Education Committee informational hearing January 29, 2020

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- Inclusive Early Education Expansion Progra
  - \$75 million in 2020-21 to expand the program
  - · Adds to the \$177 million allocated to the program in previous years
- · Existing funding
  - · Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program
    - No new funding: proposes shifting a portion of the \$300 million remaining in program to construction of preschool facilities on school campuses
  - Prop 51(2016) bond sales
    - \$1.5 billion proposed for 2020-21; same amount as 2019-20
    - · Totaling \$3 billion in Governor Newsom's first two years in office

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# Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2020 – Prop 13

- Preschool through Grade 12
  - \$2.8 billion for New Construction
  - \$5.2 billion for Modernization (including \$150 million for lead in water remediation)
  - \$500 million for career technical education (CTE)
  - \$500 million for charter schools
- Higher Education
  - \$2 billion for University of California (UC)
  - \$2 billion for California State University (CSU)
  - \$2 billion for California Community Colleges

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# Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2020 - Prop 13

- "Equity driven" revamp of the School Facilities Program (SFP) –
   Governor insisted on replacing "first in, first out" with priority categories for processing applications
- Increased grant sizes potentially for both new construction and modernization
- Small district protections preliminary apportionments for small school districts and grants for project and construction management
- Financial hardship expanded includes districts with bonding capacities up to \$15 million, which will capture more small districts

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
# Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2020 – Prop 13


- Set-asides CTE, charters, and lead remediation
- Preschools some preschool projects are now eligible expenditures for districts, but preschools are not directly eligible for state bond funding
  - Governor proposes to authorize SAB to provide per-pupil grant enhancement for LEAs if State Bond passes
- Developer fees fees for multi-family housing developments located within half a mile of a major transit stop suspended through January 1, 2026, and 20% discount on fees for other multi-family housing through January 1, 2026



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# School Disaster Preparedness/Response

- \$50 million one-time non-Prop 98 GF for critical services still vulnerable to power outage events, including schools, county election offices, and food storage reserves
  - Matching grant program to help local governments prepare for, respond to, and mitigate impacts of power outages
  - Trailer bill language (more details) expected in early February

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



# New Vaping/Tobacco Tax


- Proposes new tax of \$2 per 40 milligrams of nicotine (roughly equivalent to four cigarettes)
- Would be in addition to existing tobacco tax passed by voters under Prop 56 (2016)
- If approved, new tax would take effect January 2021 and generate approximately \$30 million (at least in the first year)
- Funds would be deposited into a special fund and allocated to programs designed to prevent teens from vaping, as well as health care workforce programs
- During budget briefing, Newsom signaled support for a ban on all flavored tobacco products (SB 793 by Senator Hill)

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


#### **Nutrition & Food Services Report February 2020**

Happy February! We have had a busy 2020 so far with staff being in and out, recipe and menu development, and issues with our walk-in cooler.


We sent in a few entries for the "USDA Foods in Schools Photo Contest" showcasing some of the food we get from the state and how we use them for a few of our menu entries. Results should be posted sometime at the beginning of March.


We have had a few taste tests in our kitchen and fun with some new recipes and revamping existing ones. The enchiladas were a huge hit. We hid shredded zucchini and potatoes along with cheese for the filling and topped it off with green enchilada sauce. They were fantastic and a fan favorite with the elementary kids. We had a plant based "meatball" that we put into our "Superhero Subs" that was extremely resourceful using garbanzo beans that we got from the state. The balls had a great earthy flavor that was complemented by addition of garlic and Italian seasoning, then nestled in-between a freshly baked Edna bakery roll and topped with Mozzarella cheese. It looked fantastic, however, about half the school enjoyed them and the other half did not. I would give us an A+ for creativity.


We received a call from J&R Meats in Paso offering to work with us on getting local meat into our cafeteria. With the cost being a lot higher than meat we get from the state, we decided to do a taste test to see what the students prefer and go from there. We asked elementary school teachers/staff and a few high school students to give their input. The taste test was blind (participants didn't know what brand they were tasting) and compared J&R chorizo vs. soyrizo, J&R Breakfast sausage vs. Advance Pierre (brand we currently use), J&R grass fed patty vs. USDA beef patty with soy, and USDA 85/15 beef vs. grassfed beef. The results are shown in the chart below and the tasters we a bit surprised on the results. Based on these results we will be keeping some of our currently brands, but also might mix in local beef where and when we can if the price is right. This was a fun way to interact with students and staff, get input, and discuss how we can make our food even better.



# SHANDON ELEMENTARY APPLICATION NARRATIVE

# **Academic Assistance**

Shandon Elementary is a small, rural, underprivileged, K-8 school within the Shandon Joint Unified School District. Shandon Elementary's unduplicated student population is 83%. 26% of Shandon parents did not graduate from high school and only 10% have a college degree. Therefore, many families are not equipped to assist their children in meeting the demands of California's academic standards and school expectations.

The effects of limited exposure to literature and early childhood education experiences can be seen throughout the district. 42% of k-2 students are reading below grade level as measured by Fountas and Pinnell. CAASPP scores indicate that 50.4% of students in grades 3-8 are performing below standard in ELA and 50% are below standard in Mathematics.

Shandon Elementary is committed to closing the achievement gap through focused academic programming, responsive to the personal needs of the student. ASES funds will help the school in achieving student academic success by providing afterschool homework and tutoring support designed to build student competencies in core academic standards. Through our partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of Mid Central Coast, students will participate in "Power Hour" five days a week. "Power Hour" is a homework-help program that promotes academic success by providing homework support, tutoring, and high-yield learning activities while encouraging students to become self directed learners. Dedicated youth development professionals will serve as the "Power Hour" leaders and will consult with classroom teachers on curriculum and instructional delivery. Staff will assist grade level groups to build conceptual understanding and competency in core subjects while classroom teachers will advise homework leaders if a child needs individualized attention. Additionally classroom teachers, on a volunteer basis, may use homework time to provide targeted interventions to academically at-risk students.

Shandon Elementary is currently utilizing Fountas and Pinnell Leveled Literacy Intervention to increase the number of students reading at grade level. All students are assessed on their reading ability at the beginning of the year and then again at each of three reporting periods. These scores will be shared with the Boys and Girls Club staff so they can ensure that students are reading books at their instructional level for a minimum of 20 minutes per day during "Power Hour". The After School Program will then work on improving student comprehension by engaging students in comprehension questions through the Accelerated Reader program.

During "Power Hour", the After School Program will also assist students in gaining foundational skills in mathematics. K-8<sup>th</sup> grade students can strengthen their individual math skills through accessing ST Math. ST Math is a visual math program that builds a deep conceptual understanding of math through rigorous learning and creative problem solving. 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade students will also have access to Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces (ALEKS). ALEKS is an online learning tool that offers differentiated assignments based on a student's assessed knowledge of mathematic standards and skills. The ALEKS program monitors student progress on assigned math topics and reassess to assure concept retention and mastery.

Students will have access to ST Math and ALEKS during the After School Program to help them stay on target for reaching goals and learning milestones.

The After School Program can also assist students by providing extension activities that build critical thinking and collaborative skills. These can be available as an extension to regularly assigned homework and would include grade level reading, writing and math materials along with performance task based inquiry projects. In addition, students would have access to brain teasers that test the students' knowledge of the world around them, with riddles, crossword puzzles, word searches, or team building activities that require deductive reasoning.

The After School Program will support English learner students through collaboration and articulation of needs with general education teachers and bilingual staff. Books on learning fundamental English as well as, fiction and non-fiction Spanish books will be available in the After School Program library. Older bilingual students will also be paired with younger counterparts to serve as peer tutors and primary language support. The After School Program room will build dual literacy by providing materials in English and Spanish and labeling items in the room in both languages.

Collaboration with the After School Program staff and classroom instructors on interventions, student progress, behavioral changes, or new routines that can increase academic success will be revisited weekly thus aligning the school and After School Program expectations of students and their academia.

# **Enrichment**

Shandon Elementary and the Boys and Girls Club of Mid Central Coast have been fortunate in obtaining unique enrichment opportunities for our students. Enrichment activities are aligned with the California Common Core Standards and utilize standard aligned instructional materials. The After School Program will provide enrichment activities that will encompass the areas of Art, Sports, Fitness and Recreation, Character and Leadership, Health and Life Skill, and Education and Career Development.

In the area of Art, students will participate in Drama Matters. Drama Matters is a drama education program designed to build self-confidence, spark creativity and boost academic achievement. The weekly program consists of 60 minute sessions segmented for beginner, intermediate, and advanced students. Each segment is adaptable to fit the age and developmental level of the participant. Each class consists of a short warm-up exercise, a main activity of games, script work or performance, and a 10-minute cool-down. During Drama Matters, students will be able to express themselves creatively, from costume and set design to directing while building communication and public speaking skills.

Also in the area of Art, students will have the opportunity to participate in the National Fine Arts Exhibit Program. The National Fine Arts Exhibit Program encourages artistic recognition by showcasing student drawings, paintings, printmaking, collages, mixed media displays and sculptures at local and regional exhibits such as the California Mid State Fair. During the After School Program, students will be exposed to and encouraged to explore a variety of mediums in which to demonstrate their artistic expression. Student pieces will be selected for inclusion in the National Fine Arts Exhibit, which is displayed at Boys and Girls Club of America events and their National Conference.

Sports, Fitness, and Recreation will be supported through student participation in WANNA PLAY. WANNA PLAY encourages students to increase their overall fitness and health through physical activity and improved nutrition education, while learning the fundamental skills of baseball and softball. The program increases students' physical fitness by focusing on agility, balance, and coordination. The program features multiple fun and engaging activities and games to improve fitness, increase awareness of nutrition and hydration while learning basic knowledge of baseball and softball.

Triple Play, a game plan for the mind, body and soul, will also be utilized to promote student Sports, Fitness and Recreation. Triple Play is a proven health and wellness program cosponsored by the Anthem Foundation and founding partner The Coca-Cola Company. The program promotes the importance of physical activity and proper nutrition through the programs three components: mind, body, and soul. Healthy Habits (Mind) addresses the ways an individual's health behaviors are influenced by personal beliefs and exposure to positive messages. In addition to nutrition education, activities focus on helping students assess, practice, identify, consider, and recognize healthy behaviors and advertising. Daily Challenges (Body) has an intentional emphasis on physical activity. Students focus on increasing their ability to perform basic movements and improve overall fitness. They gain confidence in their knowledge and sports capabilities while developing a love for physical activity. Social Recreation (Soul) emphasizes the students' social, emotional development and the mindset that is needed to maintain healthy and productive interactions with others. Emotional regulation, healthy relationships (with self and others), and responsible decision making become the primary focus of the Social Recreation component of Triple Play.

Character and Leadership skills will be developed through implementation of the Junior Staff Program. Through this program, young teens will gain experiences in career development, apprenticeship, customer service, and community service. They will learn 21<sup>st</sup> century skills including leadership, goal setting, and teamwork that are needed for future career success. In addition they will develop a strong sense of civic responsibility and a desire to serve others.

The SMART Girls program promotes health and life skills for young female students. The program is designed to provide education on health, fitness, and prevention while improving student self esteem. Young ladies participating in the program will examine their attitudes, values and societal norms on body image as they learn about healthy eating and exercise.

Lastly, we plan to offer a summer program for club students to reduce the learning losses that historically occur during the summer months and result in children falling further and further behind. Summer Brain Gain is the program that would be used to keep students on course for their return in the fall. The program consists of grade appropriate one week modules that are aligned with the Common Core Standards. Each module promotes project-based learning through discovery, creative expression, group work, and a final project or product. Student projects will emphasize math, literacy, and 21st century skills. Each module is designed to develop high level/critical thinking and problem solving skills. In addition, students will work on building their literacy skills through READ. READ is a summer reading program where new books are presented each week along with activities to cultivate interest and a love for reading. Finally, middle school students will enjoy two weeks of STEM. These are modules specifically aligned to Next Generation Science Standards and focus on science, technology, engineering and math.

The planned enrichment programs and activities are designed to supplement the school's adopted curriculum and provide opportunities to develop the whole child. The enrichment

programs are essential to having each child recognize their full potential as well as rise to it. Without an After School Program the majority of our students would be home unsupervised and left to their own devices. We strive to provide a safe and healthy learning environment that will empower every child and leave them yearning to know more about the world they live in.
















### **Drug Testing**

Random Drug Testing of Student Athletes

All student-athletes and their parents must give written consent for drug testing prior to participation in sports. Those who do not will not be allowed to play.

- 1. All student-athletes will be tested (mandatory) at the beginning of the sports season. For those who do not play a Fall season sport, they will be tested at the beginning of whatever season they begin sports. Also, if a student comes out to the team late (after that season has begun), this individual will be tested at that time. If an individual plays more than one sport they are tested (mandatory) only at the beginning of their first season.
- 2. Testing will be performed randomly throughout the remainder of the year. Testing will take place at random times and with random people. A lottery type of system will be used where the student-athletes are assigned numbers and these corresponding numbers will be drawn on certain dates. If the student-athlete's number is drawn, this person will be tested. It is important to note that every single number will be available to be drawn and tested every time.
- 3. Testing will be administered by the drug testing administrator or designee.
- 4. Refusal to be tested will be treated the same as a positive verification
- 5. If a positive test occurs or proof of adulterated urine (failed drug test): The student-athlete will be treated as innocent until proven guilty. The positive sample will be immediately sealed and sent to the company's professional laboratory for verification. If a positive verification returns from the company the following procedure will be used.

First time positive verification (failed drug test) or positive adulteration test:

- 1. Testing for that individual will become mandatory for the remainder of the athletic year. If that student tested positive during the fall season and they played during the winter season then testing would remain mandatory throughout Basketball season. If the individual also then played a Spring sport, testing would remain mandatory through the Spring season.
- 2. This mandatory testing will occur at least once every two weeks, but no more than three times for a two week period. This mandatory testing will be up to the drug testing administrator's discretion as to when and how often to test.

- 3. The student-athlete will be suspended from game play, until the following occurs: a. a minimum of 2 weeks and a clean specimen and b. the individuals' mandatory drug tests are now "clean" and unadulterated.
- 4. The student-athlete will still be encouraged to continue to practice with the team (throughout suspension). The goal here is to keep this individual involved. Regular team rules regarding absence from practice will apply to the individual. If this person should be released from the team, they will still be required to take mandatory drug tests for future sports seasons' eligibility (Winter and Spring). These mandatory drug tests will continue from the point of the positive test, NOT from the time of the new sports season. If the student-athlete refuses to take the tests he/she will not be eligible for play in the remaining seasons that year.

Second Time Failed or Second Time Adulterated Drug Test:

1. The student-athlete will be excluded completely from athletics for the remainder of that school year.

Notification of student-athlete and parent(s)/legal guardian:

1. After confirmation of a positive result from the laboratory has returned, the student-athlete and parent(s)/guardian(s) will be informed of the result. A conference will be held at which the student-athlete, parents/guardians, head coach and an administrator will be present. The results will be presented and the future of the student-athlete, in terms of athletics at Shandon High School, will be determined.

Student athletes may be tested for the presence of illegal drugs at the beginning of each sport season and shall be subject to random testing during the entire season.

Students desiring to participate in a district athletic program shall first provide their parent/guardian's written consent for urinalysis testing.

Upon confirmation of a positive test, students who have been or are presently taking prescription medication shall present either a copy of the prescription or a physician's written verification of this fact.

If a student's initial drug test is positive, a second test shall be administered as soon as possible to confirm the results. Parents/guardians shall be notified after the test results are confirmed. If requested by the student or parent/guardian, a hearing shall be conducted by the Superintendent or designee with the parent/guardian and the student.

This Notice of Public Hearing provides information about the proposed water rate increase for County Service Area 16 (CSA 16) Shandon pursuant to the require ments of California Constitution Article XIII (Proposition 218). This notice provides information on (1) why the proposed rate increase is needed, (2) how the rat were calculated, (3) the amount of the rate increase, (4) how customers can receive more information, and (5) how to file a protest regarding the proposed rate increase. If you agree with the need for the proposed water service charges, no action on your part is required. If you oppose the proposed water service charges your protest must be submitted in writing, see below.

### WHY ARE WATER RATES ARE BEING INCREASED?

The CSA 16 water system is entirely financed by rates and fees associated with water service. Through the sales of water, CSA 16 must generate enough revenues to cover expenditures, loan payments, and maintain a reasonable operating reserve. The proposed increase to water service charges was calculate to generate additional annual revenues of approximately \$180,000. This will provide for increased operations and maintenance (O&M) due to an aging system, provide for the increasing costs of State Water, and to pay existing loan debt. With this proposed rate increase the County will be able to continue to provide you with clean drinking water right to your tap.

### Operations and Maintenance Needs (-\$107,500)

The water system is nearly 50 years old with many of the components being original. The only significant improvements since 1972 have been a new tank in 2001, a new well drilled in 2002, and a State Water Turnout in 2017 but most of the distribution piping is original material. As such, operators need additional time to perform routine maintenance, preventative maintenance, and emergency maintenance. As the system ages emergency maintenance costs associated with line breaks increase as well as the need to do more preventative maintenance to lengthen the life of the system.

State Water Project costs have increased significantly since 2015 and were not anticipated to this extent. Costs associated with the Oroville Dam disaster as well as the State Water Projects aging infrastructure are several reasons for the increased costs, these increases are then passed onto the State Water Contractors such as CSA 16.

Financially, it is important that CSA 16 continue to pay its loan obligations to be eligible for future grants and low interest loans. In 2016, a total of \$179,000 in loans were approved by the Board of Supervisors for CSA 16 from the District for additional costs associated with the State Water Turnout construction that could not be funded through existing funds. With this rate increase it is anticipated that the District loans will be paid off in 2031

### HOW WAS THE PROPOSED WATER RATE CALCULATED?

Under the CSA 16 rate structure, customers are charged a Basic Bi-Monthly Charge made up of a minimum charge and a usage charge. The minimum charge applied to all customers regardless of quantity of water used. The usage charge is based on a three-tiered rate structure; 0-10 units, 11-16 units and greater than 16 units, each charged at a defined rate. Significant factors used to calculate the proposed water rate increase are as follows:

Only one written protest per affected property will be counted towarthe majority protest. If written protests are filed by a majority of the affected parcel owners and/or customers, the proposed rate increases will not be impose Although oral comments at the public hearing will not qualify as formal protests unless accompanied by a written protest, the Board of Supervisors welcome input from the community during the public hearing.

It is important that you follow these instructions in order for your protest to be valid:

- 1. The protest must be submitted in writing and received by the County Clerk at or before the end of the public hearing on March 24, 2020. ### Local Control And Accountability Plan

\*\*\*Note: 5 CCR 15495 defines what it means to consult with students, including unduplicated students and other numerically significant student subgroups, and gives examples of methods that may be used for this consultation. State regulations do not provide examples of consultation with groups other than students, but consultations might include surveys, the establishment of an advisory committee consisting of representatives of all the specified groups, solicitation of feedback from the groups after a draft plan is available, discussion of the LCAP at staff meetings, and communication with parent organizations, student councils, school site councils, or other established committees or organizations. Pursuant to Education Code 48985, whenever 15 percent or more of the students in a school speak a single primary language other than English, notifications sent to parents/guardians of such students must be written in the primary language as well as in English; see BP 5145.6 - Parental Notifications.\*\*\*

The Superintendent or designee shall notify members of the public of the opportunity to submit written comments regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The notification shall be provided using the most efficient method of notification possible, which may not necessarily include producing printed notices or sending notices by mail. All written notifications related to the LCAP shall be provided in the primary language of parents/guardians when required by Education Code 48985. (Education Code 52062)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 305, the LCAP parent/guardian and community engagement process must include solicitation of input on language acquisition programs. See BP/AR 6174 - Education for English Learners for further information regarding the types of language acquisition programs that may be offered.\*\*\*

As part of the parent/guardian and community engagement process, the district shall solicit input on effective and appropriate instructional methods, including, but not limited to, establishing language acquisition programs to enable all students, including English learners and native English speakers, to have access to the core academic content standards and to become proficient in English. (Education Code 305-306)

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with the administrator(s) of the special education local plan area of which the district is a member to ensure that specific actions for students with disabilities are included in the LCAP and are consistent with strategies included in the annual assurances support plan for the education of students with disabilities. (Education Code 52062)

(cf. 0430 - Comprehensive Local Plan for Special Education)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 42127, the Board must not adopt a district budget until the LCAP is in place for the budget year; see BP 3100 - Budget. The budget must include the expenditures necessary to implement the plan that will be effective during the subsequent fiscal year. If it does not, the County

## Superintendent of Schools will disapprove the district's budget. \*\*\*

The Board shall hold at least one public hearing to solicit the recommendations and comments of members of the public regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. The public hearing shall be held at the same meeting as the budget hearing required pursuant to Education Code 42127 and AR 3100 - Budget. (Education Code 42127, 52062)

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices)

## Adoption of the Plan

The Board shall adopt the LCAP prior to adopting the district budget, but at the same public meeting. This meeting shall be held after the public hearing described above, but not on the same day as the hearing.

The Board may adopt revisions to the LCAP at any time during the period in which the plan is in effect, provided the Board follows the process to adopt the LCAP pursuant to Education Code 52062 and the revisions are adopted in a public meeting. (Education Code 52062)

## Submission of Plan to County Superintendent of Schools

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 52070 requires the district to submit the LCAP to the County Superintendent, who may seek written clarification of the contents of the plan and may submit recommendations for amendments as provided below. The County Superintendent is required to approve the LCAP on or before October 8 if it is determined that (1) the LCAP adheres to the template adopted by the SBE and follows any SBE instructions or directions for completing the template; (2) the district budget includes expenditures sufficient to implement the specific actions and strategies in the LCAP; and (3) the LCAP adheres to supplemental and concentration grant expenditure requirements specified in Education Code 42238.07 for unduplicated students. In determining whether the district has fully demonstrated that it will use supplemental and concentration funds to increase or improve services for unduplicated students, 5 CCR 15497 requires the County Superintendent to review any descriptions of districtwide or schoolwide services provided.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 52064.1 requires the district to file the LCFF budget overview for parents/guardians with the County Superintendent to be reviewed for adherence with the template adopted by the SPI. If the budget overview is not approved, the County Superintendent will withhold approval of the LCAP and will provide technical assistance pursuant to Education Code 52071.\*\*\*

Not later than five days after adoption of the LCAP, the district budget, and the budget overview for parents/guardians the Board shall file the LCAP, the budget, and the budget overview with the County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 52070)

If the County Superintendent sends, by August 15, a written request for clarification of the contents of the LCAP, the Board shall respond in writing within 15 days of the request. If the County Superintendent then submits recommendations for amendments to the LCAP within 15 days of receiving the Board's response, the Board shall consider those recommendations in a public meeting within 15 days of receiving the recommendations. (Education Code 52070)

If the County Superintendent does not approve the district's LCAP, the Board shall accept technical assistance from the County Superintendent focused on revising the plan so that it can be approved. (Education Code

52071)

## **Monitoring Progress**

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraph may be revised to reflect the district's timeline for reviewing the progress and effectiveness of strategies included in the LCAP. Reports should be provided to the Board in sufficient time to allow for any necessary changes in the annual update to the LCAP by July 1 of each year, as required by Education Code 52060-52061. The Dashboard provides a tool to assist in evaluation of district and school performance and includes all of the state priorities for the LCAP described in Education Code 52060.\*\*\*

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually in accordance with the timeline and indicators established by the Superintendent and the Board, regarding the district's progress toward attaining each goal identified in the LCAP. Evaluation shall include, but not be limited to, an assessment of district and school performance reported on the California School Dashboard. Evaluation data shall be used to recommend any necessary revisions to the LCAP.

(cf. 0500 - Accountability)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 52071, when a school or a numerically significant student subgroup is not making sufficient progress toward its LCAP goals, the County Superintendent may be required to provide technical assistance or the Board may request technical assistance. In addition, the Superintendent of Public Instruction may intervene in any school which has been identified as in need of intervention based on criteria specified in Education Code 52072. Pursuant to Education Code 52059.5, CDE has established a unified system of support for districts and schools that meets state requirements as well as federal Title I requirements and ensures consistency between technical assistance provided under both sets of requirements. For more information, see BP 0520 - Intervention for Underperforming Schools.\*\*\*

The Superintendent or designee shall seek and/or accept technical assistance or other intervention that may be required pursuant to Education Code 52071 or 52072 or 20 USC 6311 when a school or a numerically significant student subgroup is not making sufficient progress toward the goals in the LCAP.

(cf. 0520 - Intervention for Underperforming Schools) (cf. 0520.1 - Comprehensive and Targeted Support and Improvement)

### **Technical Assistance/Intervention**

At its discretion, the Board may submit a request to the County Superintendent for technical assistance, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 52071)

- 1. Assistance in identifying district strengths and weaknesses in regard to state priorities, which includes the review of performance data on the state and local indicators included in the Dashboard and other relevant local data, and in identifying effective, evidence-based programs or practices that address any areas of weakness.
- 2. Assistance from an academic, programmatic, or fiscal expert, or team of experts, in identifying and implementing effective programs and practices that are designed to improve performance in any identified areas of weakness. The district may engage other service providers, including, but not limited to, other school districts, county offices of education, or charter schools, to provide such assistance.

In the event that the County Superintendent requires the district to receive technical assistance based on one or more numerically significant student subgroups meeting the criteria established pursuant to Education Code 52064.5, the Board shall work with the County Superintendent or another service provider at district expense, and shall provide the County Superintendent timely documentation of the district's completion of the activities listed in items #1-2 above or substantially similar activities. (Education Code 52071)

If referred to the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence by either the County Superintendent or the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), the district shall implement the recommendations of that agency in order to accomplish the goals set forth in the district's LCAP. (Education Code 52071, 52074)

If the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) identifies the district as needing intervention, the district shall cooperate with any action taken by the SPI or any academic advisor appointed by the SPI, which may include one or more of the following: (Education Code 52072)

- 1 Revision of the district's LCAP
- 2. Revision of the district's budget in accordance with changes in the LCAP
- 3. A determination to stay or rescind any district action that would prevent the district from improving outcomes for all student subgroups, provided that action is not required by a collective bargaining agreement

**Intervention For Underperforming Schools** 

**BP 0520** 

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 52059.5, the California Department of Education (CDE) has established a single statewide system of support for districts and schools that meets state requirements as well as federal Title I requirements. The following policy reflects the purposes and requirements of the statewide system and may be revised to reflect district practice.\*\*\*

The Governing Board desires that all district schools provide a high-quality educational program that maximizes the achievement of each district student. The district shall provide assistance to schools to support the continuous improvement of student performance within the priorities identified in the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) and to enhance the achievement of low-performing student subgroups.

(cf. 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan) (cf. 0500 - Accountability)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 52071, the Governing Board may, at its discretion, request technical assistance from the County Superintendent of Schools as described in items #1-2 below. The County Superintendent may charge a fee, not to exceed the cost of the service, when the district has otherwise not been identified for technical assistance or state intervention and the service requested would create an unreasonable or untenable cost burden for the County Superintendent.\*\*\*

At its discretion, the Board may submit a request to the County Superintendent of Schools for technical assistance regarding the following: (Education Code 52071)

- 1. Identifying the district's strengths and weaknesses in regard to state priorities addressed in the LCAP, including collaboration between the district and County Superintendent to review performance data on the state and local indicators included in the California School Dashboard and other relevant local data and to identify effective, evidence-based programs or practices that address any areas of weakness
- 2. Securing assistance from an academic, programmatic, or fiscal expert, or team of experts, to identify and implement effective programs and practices that are designed to improve performance in any areas of weakness identified by the district

In the event that the County Superintendent requires the district to receive technical assistance based on a determination that one or more numerically significant student subgroups in a district

school meet the performance criteria established pursuant Education Code 52064.5, the Board shall work with the County Superintendent and shall provide the County Superintendent timely documentation of the district's completion of the activities listed in items #1-2 above or substantially similar activities. (Education Code 52071)

With the approval of the County Superintendent, the district may, at its own expense, engage another service provider, including, but not limited to, another school district, the county office of education, or a charter school, to act as a partner to the district in filling the district's need for technical assistance. (Education Code 52071)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 52074, either the County Superintendent or the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) may refer a district to the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence (CCEE) if it is determined to be necessary to help the district accomplish the goals set forth in the district's LCAP. Additionally, if a district receives an emergency apportionment pursuant to Education Code 41320-41322, the district shall be deemed to have been referred to CCEE.\*\*\*

If referred to the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence by either the County Superintendent or the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), the district shall implement the recommendations of that agency in order to accomplish the goals set forth in the district's LCAP. (Education Code 52071, 52074)

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 52072 provides that the SPI, with approval of the State Board of Education (SBE), may intervene when a district meets both of the following criteria: (1) the district did not improve the outcomes for three or more student subgroups identified pursuant to Education Code 52052, or all of the student subgroups if the district has fewer than three subgroups, in regard to more than one state or local priority in three out of four consecutive school years; and (2) the CCEE has provided advice and assistance to the district and submits a finding that the district failed or is unable to implement the CCEE's recommendations or that the district's inadequate performance, based on the California School Dashboard, is so persistent or acute as to require intervention. For any district identified as needing intervention, the SPI or an academic trustee appointed by the SPI may, with approval of the SBE, take one or more of the actions listed in items #1-3 below.\*\*\*

If the SPI identifies the district as needing intervention, the district shall cooperate with any action taken by the SPI or any academic advisor appointed by the SPI, which may include one or more of the following: (Education Code 52072)

- 1. Revision of the district's LCAP
- 2. Revision of the district's budget, in conjunction with changes in the LCAP, that would allow the district to improve the outcomes for all student subgroups in regard to state and local priorities
- 3. A determination to stay or rescind any district action that would prevent the district from improving outcomes for all student subgroups, provided that action is not required by a

### collective bargaining agreement

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to 20 USC 6311, based on data in the Dashboard, schools that are in the lowest performing five percent statewide of schools receiving federal Title I funding, as well as high schools with a graduation rate lower than 67 percent averaged over two years, are identified by CDE for comprehensive support and improvement (CSI). Schools are identified for targeted support and improvement (TSI) if one or more numerically significant student subgroups meet the criteria for the lowest performing five percent of Title I schools, or for additional targeted support and improvement (ATSI) if one student group, on its own, meets these criteria. For program requirements, see BP 0520.1 - Comprehensive and Targeted Support and Improvement.\*\*\*

In addition, any school identified by the California Department of Education for comprehensive support and improvement, targeted support and improvement, or additional targeted support and improvement shall develop and implement a school plan in accordance with 20 USC 6311. Such schools may be required to partner with an external entity, agency, or individual with demonstrated expertise and capacity to identify and implement more rigorous interventions.

(cf. 0420 - School Plans/Site Councils) (cf. 0520.1 - Comprehensive and Targeted Support and Improvement)

## **Shandon Joint Unified School District Board Policy**

Comprehensive And Targeted Support And Improvement

BP 0520.1

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives and Comprehensive Plans

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to 20 USC 6311, the California Department of Education (CDE) has established a system of school support and improvement to assist low-performing schools. Based on data in the California School Dashboard (or other performance data if a school is too small to receive a color-coded performance level on the Dashboard), every three years CDE identifies schools that need comprehensive support and improvement (CSI), including (1) schools in the lowest performing five percent of Title I schools and (2) all high schools (including Title I, non-Title I, traditional, and alternative schools) with a graduation rate lower than 67 percent averaged over two years. A district with school(s) that meet the criteria for CSI is eligible to apply to CDE for Title I, Part A funding to assist with the development and implementation of a plan to improve student outcomes. Such a district may also choose to provide all students in a CSI school the option to transfer to another district school, provided that priority is given to the lowest achieving students from low-income families, and may use up to five percent of its Title I allocation to pay for transportation for this purpose.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Schools will be annually identified for targeted support and improvement (TSI) if one or more student subgroups, for two consecutive years, meet the criteria for the lowest performing five percent of Title I schools. Every three years, TSI schools that have not improved will be identified for additional targeted support and improvement (ATSI). \*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Identification of schools for CSI and ATSI began in the 2018-19 school year. Schools will be identified for TSI for the first time beginning in 2020-21.\*\*\*

The Governing Board is committed to enabling all district students to meet state academic achievement standards. The district shall provide support and assistance to increase student achievement in all district schools, especially any school that has been identified by the California Department of Education (CDE) as in need of comprehensive support and improvement (CSI), targeted support and improvement (TSI), or additional targeted support and improvement (ATSI).

(cf. 0500 - Accountability)

(cf. 0520 - Intervention for Underperforming Schools)

(cf. 6011 - Academic Standards)

(cf. 6171 - Title I Programs)

When any school is identified for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the school community, including the principal, teachers, and parent/guardians of students of the

school, of the identification and, if applicable, shall inform the school of the student subgroup(s) which are consistently underperforming at the school.

#### School Plan

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to 20 USC 6311, the district is required to develop a school improvement plan for each school identified for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, which must be based on all state indicators in the California School Dashboard. In accordance with the discretion granted to state agencies under 20 USC 6311, CDE has determined that schools eligible for Dashboard Alternative School Status pursuant to Education Code 52052 that have fewer than 100 students are not exempted from this requirement, but they do have flexibility within the school planning process to focus on the Dashboard state indicators that are more applicable to the nature of their program. See the Frequently Asked Questions on CDE's web site.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: 20 USC 6311 also requires that the plan include evidence-based interventions. Such interventions are described in the U.S. Department of Education's Non-Regulatory Guidance: Using Evidence to Strengthen Education Investments. \*\*\*

Upon receiving notification from CDE that a district school has been identified as eligible for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, the district shall, in partnership with principals, other school leaders, teachers, and parents/guardians, develop and implement a plan to improve student outcomes at the school. The plan shall: (20 USC 6311)

- 1. Be based on all state indicators in the California School Dashboard, including student performance against state-determined long-term goals, except that any school subject to the state's Dashboard Alternative School Status that has fewer than 100 students may focus on the state indicators that are more applicable to the nature of its program
- 2. Be based on a school-level needs assessment
- 3. Include evidence-based interventions
- 4. If the school is identified for CSI or ATSI, identify resource inequities, which may include a review of district and school-level budgets, to be addressed through implementation of the plan

(cf. 0400 - Comprehensive Plans)

The school plan for student achievement developed pursuant to Education Code 64001 may serve as the school improvement plan required for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, provided that the plan meets the requirements of 20 USC 6311. (Education Code 64001)

(cf. 0420 - School Plans/Site Councils)

The school improvement plan shall be submitted to the Board for approval. (20 USC 6311)

\*\*\*Note: In addition to requiring district approval of school plans, 20 USC 6311 requires that CSI plans be approved by the state educational agency. However, CDE does not directly review and approve school-level plans. Instead, the template adopted by the State Board of Education for the local control and accountability plan requires a district with school(s) identified for CSI to provide the following information within the plan summary. \*\*\*

If any district school is identified for CSI, the district's local control and accountability plan shall include descriptions of how the district provides support to CSI school(s) in developing the CSI plan and how the district will monitor and evaluate the implementation and effectiveness of the CSI plan to support student and school improvement.

(cf. 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan)

## Monitoring and Intervention

The Board and the Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the performance of each school identified for CSI, TSI, or ATSI.

\*\*\*Note: For schools identified for TSI, 20 USC 6311 requires the district to monitor the school's implementation of its plan and take action if implementation of the plan is unsuccessful after a period of years established by the district. The following paragraph extends this requirement to CSI and ATSI schools and may be modified to reflect district practice, including the number of years for determining if the plan has been successful.\*\*\*

After two years of implementing the school plan, if any such school has been unsuccessful in improving student outcomes to a level that exceeds initial eligibility criteria, the district shall identify the problem and take additional action as necessary.

\*\*\*Note: In accordance with 20 USC 6311 and CDE's California ESSA Consolidated State Plan, schools identified for ATSI and CSI are expected to meet exit criteria after four years. A school is considered to have met exit criteria if it no longer has any combination of performance levels on state indicators that meet the criteria used for identification at the time the school was identified.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: For schools identified for CSI, CDE must monitor and periodically review the implementation of the school's plan. The following paragraph reflects interventions established by CDE that may be imposed if a school fails to satisfy the exit criteria for CSI within four years of the initial identification. For further information, see CDE's California ESSA Consolidated State Plan.\*\*\*

If a school identified for CSI fails to improve student outcomes within four years to a level that exceeds the CSI eligibility criteria, it shall be subject to more rigorous interventions that include, but are not limited to, partnering with an external entity, agency, or individual with demonstrated expertise and capacity to:

1. Conduct a new needs assessment that focuses on systemic factors and conduct a root

cause analysis that identifies gaps between current conditions and desired conditions in student performance and progress

- 2. Use the results of the analysis along with stakeholder feedback to develop a new improvement plan that includes:
- a. A prioritized set of evidence-based interventions and strategies
- b. A program evaluation component with support to conduct ongoing performance and progress monitoring

# **Shandon Joint Unified School District Board Policy**

Waivers

BP 1431 **Community Relations** 

\*\*\*Note: The following optional policy covers waiver requests that the State Board of Education (SBE) generally has legal authority to grant (general waivers). In order to provide districts with flexibility without undermining the basic intent of the law, Education Code 33050-33053 permit the Governing Board to request that SBE waive sections of the Education Code and Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations. Education Code 33050 exempts certain sections of the Education Code from SBE's authority to grant waivers. SB 75 (Ch. 51, Statutes of 2019) amended Education Code 33050 to prohibit the waiver of specified provisions relating to funding for charter schools.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: This policy does not address waivers expressly authorized by law for specific programs and situations (specific waivers) such as the waiver of Education Code 56101 for students with disabilities, the waiver of specified school site council provisions pursuant to Education Code 65001, waivers that may be granted by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing, or waivers that may be specifically granted by the Superintendent of Public Instruction such as waivers for alternative schools. See BP 6181 - Alternative Schools/Programs of Choice. For any such waiver, the process for obtaining the waiver would be as specified in the provision of law governing the program. \*\*\*

The Governing Board recognizes that circumstances may arise in the operation of the district that require a waiver from state law or regulation. When it is in the interest of district students, the Board may request that the State Board of Education (SBE) waive any provision of state law or regulation which SBE has authority to waive pursuant to Education Code 33050.

\*\*\*Note: The California Department of Education (CDE) web site contains an online waiver request system as well as guidance and Frequently Asked Questions to help expedite the waiver submission process. Prior to submitting a waiver request, the district should confirm that it has gathered all the data required and has complied with all the legal requirements for the request. The district should also review Education Code 33051 which specifies the reasons for which SBE may deny the request.\*\*\*

Any waiver request to be submitted to SBE shall first be approved by the Board. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each proposed waiver request includes all information necessary for the Board to analyze the need for the waiver and make an informed decision.

If the proposed waiver request affects a program that requires the existence of a school site

council, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain the school site council's approval of the request before presenting it to the Board. As appropriate, other councils or advisory committees, including bilingual advisory committees, shall be provided adequate opportunity to review a proposed waiver request, and the request shall include a written summary of any objections to the request by the councils or advisory committees. (Education Code 33051)

(cf. 0420 - School Plans/Site Councils) (cf. 1220 - Citizen Advisory Committees)

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts with an employee organization certified to represent the district's employees in negotiations with the district.\*\*\*

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with the exclusive representative of district employees in the development of the waiver request, and shall include in the request the exclusive representative's position regarding the waiver. (Education Code 33050, 33051)

(cf. 4140/4240/4340 - Bargaining Units)

\*\*\*Note: The following paragraph is for use by districts that participate in a joint powers entity to operate a regional occupational center or program. See BP 6178.2 - Regional Occupational Center/Program.\*\*\*

A request for a waiver related to a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers agency shall be submitted as a joint waiver request with other participating school districts upon approval of a unanimous vote of the governing board of the joint powers agency. (Education Code 33050)

(cf. 6178.2 - Regional Occupational Center/Program)

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 33050 does not include specific requirements in regard to the public hearing that must be held before the Board submits a waiver request. CDE's General Waiver Instructions, located on its web site, state that the public hearing must be properly noticed and held during a board meeting.\*\*\*

To receive public testimony on each proposal for a waiver request, the Board shall hold a properly noticed public hearing during a Board meeting. (Education Code 33050)

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 33050 does not specify the length of the advanced notice required for the public hearing described above. However, CSBA believes that the notice must allow sufficient time to enable members of the public adequate opportunity to participate in the waiver request process. \*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: CDE's General Waiver Instructions provide that distribution of the board meeting agenda is insufficient to constitute proper notice for the public hearing. The notice must specifically invite public testimony, and can be advertised by (1) printing a notice that includes the time, date, location, and subject of the hearing in a newspaper of general circulation, or (2)

in small districts, posting a formal notice at each school and three public places in the district. \*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraph may be revised to specify the length of the notice in accordance with district practice, and should be modified appropriately depending on the size of the district. \*\*\*

The notice, which shall state the time, date, location, and subject of the public hearing and invite public testimony, may be printed in a newspaper of general circulation and/or posted at each school and three public places in the district.

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 33051, any general waiver which has been granted for two consecutive years, or which is initially granted for two years, may be regarded as "permanent" for as long as the information on the waiver request remains current. However, SBE may require updated information for a general waiver whenever it determines that information to be necessary. SBE may also rescind a waiver if additional information supporting a recession is made available to SBE. \*\*\*

If the district determines that a waiver is needed for more than one year, the Board shall reapply to SBE. When the Board has requested and received the same general waiver from SBE for two consecutive years, the Board does not subsequently need to reapply annually provided that the information contained on the request remains current, except that the district shall apply annually for the renewal of any waiver regarding teacher credentialing. (Education Code 33051)

### **BP 3515**

## **Business and Noninstructional Operations**

\*\*\*Note: The following optional policy should be modified to reflect district practice. \*\*\*

The Governing Board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes the safety of students, *staff* employees, and visitors to school grounds. The Board also recognizes the importance of protecting district property, facilities, and equipment from vandalism and theft.

(cf. 4158/4258/4358 - Employee Security) (cf. 5131.5 - Vandalism and Graffiti) (cf. 5142 - Safety)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop campus security procedures, which may be included in which are consistent with the goals and objectives of the district's comprehensive safety plan and site-level safety plans. Such procedures shall be regularly reviewed to reflect changed circumstances and to assess their effectiveness in achieving safe school objectives.

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan)

### **Surveillance Systems**

\*\*\*Note: The following optional section is for use by districts that have authorized the use of surveillance systems. Generally, the use of cameras (i.e., a "search" within the meaning of the Fourth Amendment) must be reasonable and the cameras must not be used in areas where there is a "reasonable expectation of privacy" (New Jersey v. T.L.O.). To protect reasonable expectations of privacy, cameras should not be located in areas such as bathrooms, locker rooms, or private offices. In addition, Education Code 51512 prohibits the use of a recording device in a classroom without the prior consent of the teacher and principal. Examples of locations where cameras may generally be used include hallways, stairwells, parking lots, and cafeterias. For language about the use of cameras on school buses, see AR 5131.1 - Bus Conduct.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Penal Code 632 prohibits the recording of conversations unless the parties to the conversation may reasonably expect that the communication may be overheard or recorded. Thus, if the district's equipment has audio capability, it should be disabled so that sounds are not recorded.\*\*\*

The Board believes that reasonable use of surveillance cameras will help the district achieve its goals for eampus security. In consultation with the *district's* safety planning committee, *other relevant stakeholders* and relevant staff, the Superintendent or designee shall identify appropriate locations for the placement of surveillance cameras. Cameras shall not be placed in areas where students, staff, or community members have a reasonable expectation of privacy. Any audio capability on the district's surveillance equipment shall be disabled so that sounds are not recorded.

(cf. 5131.1 - Bus Conduct) (cf. 5145.12 - Search and Seizure)

\*\*\*Note: According to the National Institute of Justice publication The Appropriate and Effective Use of Security Technologies in U.S. Schools: A Guide for Schools and Law Enforcement Agencies, signage is an important component of a successful surveillance system and can serve as a deterrent. The Institute recommends that the signs state that the system may or may not be actively monitored. Such language is intended to deter potential perpetrators while also not building an expectation among potential victims that a person is watching events live and will be able to provide immediate assistance.\*\*\*

Prior to the operation of the surveillance system, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that signs are posted at conspicuous and targeted locations around at affected school buildings and grounds. These signs shall state that the facility uses video surveillance equipment for security purposes and that the equipment may or may not be actively monitored at any time. inform students, staff, and visitors that surveillance may occur and shall state whether the district's system is actively monitored by school personnel. The Superintendent or designee shall also provide prior written notice to students and parents/guardians about the district's surveillance system, including the locations where surveillance may occur, explaining and that the recordings may be used in disciplinary proceedings and/or and that matters captured by the camera may be referred to local law enforcement, as appropriate.

(cf. 5144 - Discipline) (cf. 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process)

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to 20 USC 1232(g) (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act), 34 CFR 99.3, and Education Code 49061, any recording or image that is directly related to a student and is maintained by the district or a person acting for the district is considered a "student record" and thus is subject to those laws regarding access, disclosure, and retention. See BP/AR 5125 - Student Records. Also see the U.S. Department of Education's FAQs on Photos and Videos under FERPA, located on its web site.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In addition, a recording or image of a staff member that may be used in a personnel action is subject to the laws regarding personnel records, including an employee's right to comment on derogatory information placed in a personnel file. See AR 4112.6/4212.6/4312.6 - Personnel Files. \*\*\*

To the extent that any images from the district's surveillance system create a student or personnel record, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the images are accessed, retained, and disclosed in accordance with law, Board policy, administrative regulation, and any applicable collective bargaining agreements.

Probationary/Permanent Status

BP 4116
Personnel

\*\*\*Note: The following Board policy is for use by districts that grant permanent status to certificated employees following successful completion of a probationary period, and should be modified for consistency with the district's collective bargaining agreement if applicable.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 44929.23, districts with an average daily attendance (ADA) of less than 250 may adopt a policy of annually reelecting certificated employees instead of granting them permanent status. Such districts may replace the following policy with a policy statement reflecting the decision to not grant permanent status in accordance with the authority granted pursuant to Education Code 44929.23.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Probationary employees should not be confused with temporary employees, as there are significant differences in terms of the layoff procedures and reemployment rights applicable to them; see BP 4117.3 - Personnel Reduction. According to the courts in Bakersfield Elementary Teachers Association v. Bakersfield City School District and California Teachers Association v. Vallejo City Unified School District, employees who have not attained permanent status but who cannot properly be classified as temporary or substitute employees (see BP 4121 - Temporary/Substitute Personnel) must be classified as probationary employees. An employee should not be classified as temporary rather than probationary solely on the basis of not holding a clear credential (e.g., a holder of a preliminary credential, internship certificate, provisional internship permit, short-term staff permit, emergency permit, or credential waiver). In addition, in Stockton Teachers Association CTA/NEA v. Stockton Unified School District, the court held that employees hired for the term of a categorically funded project pursuant to Education Code 44909 may only be considered temporary employees if they are terminated at the expiration of the categorically funded project and, if not terminated, must be considered probationary employees.\*\*\*

The Governing Board desires to employ and retain highly qualified certificated personnel to implement the district's educational program. Newly hired certificated personnel shall serve a probationary period during which the Board shall determine their suitability for long-term district employment.

Certificated employees who satisfactorily complete the probationary period shall be granted permanent status.

\*\*\*Note: The district should select the option below that reflects the ADA of the district. \*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 44929.21, a district with ADA of 250 or more must grant

permanent status in accordance with Option 1.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 44949.23, if the Governing Board of a district with ADA of less than 250 elects to dismiss probationary employees during the school year in accordance with Education Code 44948.2 and 44948.3, the district must grant permanent status after two years (Option 1). Other districts with less than 250 ADA may choose to grant permanent status after three years (Option 2).\*\*\*

OPTION 1: (Districts of 250 ADA or more, and districts with less than 250 ADA whose Board has elected to dismiss probationary employees during the school year pursuant to Education Code 44948.2 and 44948.3)

A probationary employee who has been employed by the district in position(s) requiring certification for two complete consecutive school years and is then reelected for the next succeeding school year shall become a permanent employee at the beginning of the third year. (Education Code 44929.21, 44929.23)

OPTION 2: (Districts with less than 250 ADA that grant permanent status after three years)

A probationary employee who has been employed by the district in a position(s) requiring certification for three complete consecutive school years and is then reelected for the next succeeding school year shall become a permanent employee at the beginning of the fourth year. (Education Code 44929.23)

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraphs apply to all districts. \*\*\*

During the probationary period, employees shall receive professional development and assistance which may consist of inservice training and/or meetings with the employee's evaluator to discuss areas of strength and areas requiring improvement. Inservice training may be provided during school hours as part of a comprehensive staff development program.

(cf. 4131 - Staff Development)

The performance of each probationary employee shall be evaluated and assessed at least once every school year.

(cf. 4115 - Evaluation/Supervision)

Dismissal/Nonreelection of Probationary Employees

During the school year, a probationary employee may be suspended or dismissed only for cause and in accordance with district procedures. (Education Code 44948.3)

(cf. 4118 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)

With proper notice, the Board may, without cause, elect not to reemploy a probationary

employee for the subsequent year. (Education Code 44929.21, 44929.23)

(cf. 4117.3 - Personnel Reduction)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually provide the Board with recommendations regarding the reelection or nonreelection of probationary certificated personnel for the ensuing school year.

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts that grant permanent status to certificated employees after completion of two consecutive years of service (Option 1 above). Districts with less than 250 ADA that grant permanent status upon completion of three consecutive years of service (Option 2 above) should revise the following paragraph to indicate that a nonreelection notice may be provided during the employee's first or second year of employment if the probationary employee will not be reelected for the following year.\*\*\*

At any time during a probationary employee's first year of employment in the district, the Board may give written notice to the employee of the Board's decision not to reelect the employee for a second school year. If the Board does not give written notice, the employee shall be deemed reelected for the next succeeding school year.

\*\*\*Note: For districts that select Option 1 above, Education Code 44929.21 requires the district to give written notice, as provided below, if the probationary employee will not be reelected for the third year. Districts with less than 250 ADA must also provide notice by March 15 pursuant to Education Code 44948.5.\*\*\*

During the final year of the probationary period, the Board may decide not to reelect the employee for the following year, and shall so notify the employee in writing on or before March 15. If the Board does not give written notice on or before March 15, the employee shall be deemed reelected for the next succeeding school year. (Education Code 44929.21, 44948.5)

(cf. 4112.9/4212.9/4312.9 - Employee Notifications)

\*\*\*Note: State law does not specify a method that must be used to provide the above notice to a probationary employee who is not reelected for the subsequent school year. The following paragraph may be revised to reflect district practice.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In Grace v. Beaumont Unified School District, the court ruled that acceptable methods of notification include email, certified mail if a return receipt shows that the letter was received before March 15, oral notification, and/or adoption and publication of termination decision(s) by employee number at a board meeting when the employee is present.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In Hoschler v. Sacramento City Unified School District, the court held that, when providing notice of nonreelection pursuant to Education Code 44929.21, the district must ensure that the employee receives notice on or before March 15 either through personal service or through another method equivalent to imparting actual notice. Because the district provided notice via certified mail but did not have evidence that the employee received the certified letter

on or before March 15, the notice was not timely and the employee was deemed to have been reelected for the subsequent school year.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In Sullivan v. Centinela Valley Union High School District, the court held that a probationary teacher who avoided service of the notice may not assert failure of notice since it reasonably can be inferred that the teacher did so with knowledge of the nonreelection decision.\*\*\*

Such notices shall be delivered through personal service upon the employee, certified mail with return receipt, email, or another method which documents actual receipt of the notice by the employee.

**Dress And Grooming** 

BP 4119.22/4219.22/4319.22

#### Personnel

\*\*\*Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice. Government Code 12949, several court cases, and Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) decisions support districts' nonnegotiable management prerogative to adopt a dress code. However, in 22 PERC P29, 136, PERB determined that districts must provide the exclusive bargaining representative with an opportunity to bargain over the "effects" of the dress code which may have an impact on matters within scope of representation. Districts should consult legal counsel when prescribing or prohibiting specific items of clothing.\*\*\*

The Governing Board believes that appropriate dress and grooming by district employees contribute to a productive learning environment and model positive behavior. During school hours and at school activities, employees shall maintain professional standards of dress and grooming that demonstrate their high regard for education, present an image consistent with their job responsibilities and assignment, and do not endanger the health or safety of employees or students. All employees shall be held to the same standards unless their assignment provides for modified dress as approved by their supervisor.

Probationary/Permanent Status

BP 4216
Personnel

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 45113 mandates the Governing Board in a non-merit system district to develop rules and regulations for the personnel management of classified employees. For districts establishing the merit system pursuant to Education Code 45240-45320, rules for the efficient running of the classified service are established by the personnel commission pursuant to Education Code 45260. The following policy may be revised to reflect district practice, the collective bargaining agreement, or personnel commission rules.\*\*\*

The Governing Board desires to employ and retain highly qualified classified personnel to support the district's educational program and operations. Newly hired classified employees shall serve a probationary period during which the Board shall determine their suitability for long-term district employment.

\*\*\*Note: The following paragraph should be revised to reflect the specific length of the probationary period prescribed by the district, provided the probationary period does not exceed the time limits specified below.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 45113, as amended by AB 1353 (Ch. 542, Statutes of 2019), shortened the maximum length of the required probationary period in non-merit system districts from one year to six months or 130 days of paid service, whichever is longer. Therefore, the maximum length of the required probationary period for non-merit districts is now the same as that of districts incorporating the merit system as provided under Education Code 45301. Education Code 45113, as amended, will not override any conflicting provision of a collective bargaining agreement entered into before January 1, 2020, until the collective bargaining agreement expires or is renewed.\*\*\*

A probationary employee who has been employed by the district for six months or 130 days of paid service, whichever is longer, shall be classified as a permanent employee of the district. (Education Code 45113, 45301)

Probationary employees shall receive written performance evaluations by their supervisor during the probationary period. These evaluations shall indicate whether the evaluator is satisfied or not satisfied with the employee's ability, performance, and compatibility with the job.

(cf. 4215 - Evaluation/Supervision)

The district may, without cause, dismiss a new employee during the probationary period.

(cf. 4218 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)

Permanent employees promoted to a higher classification shall be considered probationary in their new position until they have satisfactorily completed the probationary period.

A permanent employee who accepts a promotion and fails to complete the probationary period for that promotional position shall be employed in the classification from which the employee was promoted. (Education Code 45113)

This policy shall be made available to classified employees and the public. (Education Code 45113)

\*\*\*Note: The following policy is for use by districts that have not incorporated the merit system for classified employees pursuant to Education Code 45240-45320. For procedures applicable to districts that have incorporated the merit system, see BP/AR 4218.1 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action (Merit System).\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: The following policy is subject to collective bargaining and may be deleted or revised by any district whose collective bargaining agreement covers classified employee dismissal, suspension, and other disciplinary action. To the extent that this policy is inconsistent with provisions of the collective bargaining agreement, the collective bargaining agreement would prevail.\*\*\*

The Governing Board expects all employees to perform their jobs satisfactorily and to exhibit professional and appropriate conduct. A classified employee may be disciplined for unprofessional conduct or unsatisfactory performance in accordance with law or any applicable collective bargaining agreement, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Disciplinary actions shall be based on the particular facts and circumstances involved and the severity of the employee's conduct or performance. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that disciplinary actions are taken in a consistent, nondiscriminatory manner and are appropriately documented.

(cf. 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment) (cf. 4112.6/4212.6/4312.6 - Personnel Files)

Disciplinary actions may include, but are not limited to, verbal and written warnings, involuntary reassignment, demotion, suspension without pay, reduction of pay step in class, compulsory leave, and dismissal.

A probationary classified employee may be dismissed by the Superintendent or designee at any time prior to the expiration of the probationary period.

(cf. 4216 - Probationary/Permanent Status)

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 45113 mandates districts not incorporating the merit system to prescribe, by written rule or regulation, causes and procedures for disciplinary action against permanent classified employees. Also see the accompanying administrative regulation.\*\*\*

Permanent classified employees shall be subject to disciplinary action only for cause as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 45113)

Procedures for Serious Disciplinary Proceedings

\*\*\*Note: The following section should be revised to reflect district practice. \*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In Skelly v. State Personnel Board, the California Supreme Court held that permanent public employees have a right to certain due process protections prior to any punitive disciplinary action, such as termination, suspension, or demotion. These procedural rights include notice of the proposed materials upon which the action is based and the right to respond, either orally or in writing, to the individual recommending that discipline be imposed. These procedural rights are designed to protect an employee who may be wrongfully disciplined, without necessitating a full evidentiary hearing before the Governing Board. Therefore, CSBA recommends that the Superintendent or designee appoint a Skelly officer to evaluate whether there are reasonable grounds for believing that the employee engaged in the alleged misconduct and whether the proposed discipline is justified.\*\*\*

The Superintendent or designee shall develop disciplinary procedures for use when dismissal, suspension, demotion, involuntary reassignment, or other serious disciplinary action is contemplated against an employee. The procedures for such discipline shall include an opportunity for an employee for whom any such disciplinary action is recommended to meet with, or respond in writing to, a designated district official ("Skelly officer") who will determine whether the recommended discipline should proceed further or be modified or withdrawn.

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 45113 and 45116, a permanent classified employee must be given notice of any disciplinary action against the employee, including a time period during which the employee may request a Board hearing on the charges. See the section "Initiation and Notification of Charges" in the accompanying administrative regulation.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 45113, the Board may delegate its authority to determine whether sufficient cause exists for disciplinary action against classified employees, excluding peace officers as defined in Penal Code 830.32, to an impartial third-party hearing officer. Hearings conducted by the Board or a hearing officer are not subject to the procedures used by the Office of Administrative Hearings pursuant to Government Code 11500-11529. Districts that refer all serious disciplinary matters to a third-party hearing officer rather than holding Board hearings should revise the remainder of this section accordingly.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Education Code 45113 requires the Board to delegate its authority to an administrative law judge in cases involving allegations of egregious misconduct with a minor. Egregious misconduct is defined as immoral conduct leading to an allegation of a sex offense pursuant to Education Code 44010, a controlled substance offense pursuant to Education Code 44011, or child abuse or neglect pursuant to Penal Code 11165.2-11165.6.\*\*\*

After meeting with the employee or considering the employee's written response, if the Skelly officer determines that the recommended discipline should proceed, the Superintendent or designee shall send the employee a notice of the recommended disciplinary action, a statement of charges, and the results of the Skelly hearing. The notice shall include a statement advising the employee of the right to request a Board hearing on the matter.

If a permanent classified employee receives a notice from the Superintendent or designee of a recommended suspension, demotion, involuntary reassignment, or dismissal, the employee may request a Board hearing on the matter.

If the employee fails to request a hearing within the time specified in the notice, the employee is deemed to have waived the right to do so, and the Board may order the recommended disciplinary action into effect immediately.

If a timely request is submitted, a hearing shall be conducted by the Board, except that, if the matter involves an allegation of egregious misconduct as defined in Education Code 44932 and involves a minor, the matter shall be referred to an administrative law judge to determine whether sufficient cause exists for disciplinary action against the employee. (Education Code 45113, 45312)

#### (cf. 3515.3 - District Police/Security Department)

The hearing shall be held at the earliest convenient date, taking into consideration the established schedule of the Board and the availability of legal counsel and witnesses. The employee shall be notified of the time and place of the hearing.

The hearing shall be held in closed session, unless the employee requests that the matter be heard in an open session meeting. (Government Code 54957)

(cf. 9321 - Closed Session)

The employee shall be entitled to appear personally, produce evidence, and be represented by legal counsel.

The Board may use the services of its legal counsel in ruling upon procedural questions, objections to evidence, and issues of law. The Board may review and consider the records of any prior personnel action proceedings against the employee in which a disciplinary action was ultimately sustained and any records contained in the employee's personnel files and introduced into evidence at the hearing. The Board shall not be bound by rules of evidence used in California courts. Informality in any such hearing shall not invalidate any order or decision made by the Board.

At any time before a matter is submitted to the Board for decision, the Superintendent or designee may, with the consent of the Board, serve on the employee and file with the Board an amended or supplemental recommendation of disciplinary action. If the amended or supplemental recommendation includes new causes or allegations, the employee shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to prepare a defense. Any new causes or allegations shall be deemed controverted and any objections to the amended or supplemental causes or allegation may be made orally at the hearing and shall be noted on the record.

Following the hearing or, if the employee has not requested a hearing, after reviewing the Superintendent or designee's recommendation for disciplinary action, the Board shall affirm, modify, or reject the recommended disciplinary action. The decision of the Board shall be in writing and shall contain findings of fact and the disciplinary action approved, if any. The decision of the Board shall be final.

Following the hearing, the Board shall affirm, modify, or reject the disciplinary action recommended by the Superintendent or designee. The decision of the Board shall be in writing and shall contain findings of fact and the disciplinary action approved, if any. The decision of the Board shall be final.

Within 10 working days of the Board's final decision, a copy of the decision shall be delivered to the employee and/or designated representative personally or by registered mail.

In lieu of holding a Board hearing on the sufficiency of the causes for disciplinary action, the Board may delegate its authority to an impartial third-party hearing officer. When the matter is heard by a third-party hearing officer, the Board retains the authority to review the determination and to adopt or reject the recommended decision. (Education Code 45113)

If the matter involves an allegation of egregious misconduct as defined in Education Code 44932 and involves a minor, the matter shall be referred to an administrative law judge to determine whether sufficient cause exists for disciplinary action against the employee. In such cases, the ruling of the administrative law judge shall be binding on the district and the employee. (Education Code 45113)

In cases involving an allegation of egregious misconduct, the ruling of the administrative law judge shall be binding on the district and the employee. (Education Code 45113)

#### **SUMMARY:**

New policy reflects New Law which authorizes boards to limit or prohibit student use of smartphones while at school or while under the supervision and control of a district employee, except under specified circumstances.

# Shandon Joint Unified School District Board Policy

**Mobile Communication Devices** 

BP 5131.8 **Students** 

\*\*\*Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 48901.7, as added by AB 272 (Ch. 42, Statutes of 2019), authorizes the Governing Board to limit or prohibit student use of smartphones while at school or while under the supervision and control of a district employee, except for specified purposes. In addition, Education Code 48901.5 authorizes the district to regulate the use of electronic signaling devices that operate through the transmission or receipt of radio waves unless essential for a student's health.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Districts that choose to regulate mobile communication devices differently based on grade level may revise this policy accordingly.\*\*\*

The Governing Board recognizes that the use of smartphones and other mobile communication devices on campus may be beneficial to student learning and well-being, but could be disruptive of the instructional program in some circumstances. The Board permits limited use of mobile communication devices on campus in accordance with law and the following policy.

Students may use cell phones, smart watches, pagers, or other mobile communication devices on campus during noninstructional time as long as the device is utilized in accordance with law and any rules that individual school sites may impose.

Mobile communication devices shall be turned off during instructional time. However, a student shall not be prohibited from possessing or using a mobile communication device under any of the following circumstances: (Education Code 48901.5, 48901.7)

- 1. In the case of an emergency, or in response to a perceived threat of danger
- 2. When a teacher or administrator grants permission to the student to possess or use a mobile communication device, subject to any reasonable limitation imposed by that teacher or administrator

- 3. When a licensed physician or surgeon determines that the possession or use is necessary for the student's health and well-being
- 4. When the possession or use is required by the student's individualized education program

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program)

Smartphones and other mobile communication devices shall not be used in any manner which infringes on the privacy rights of any other person.

\*\*\*Note: A search of a student's personally owned mobile communication device may be subject to the Fourth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution which prohibits unreasonable search and seizure. When school officials want to search a student's mobile communication device as part of an investigation of suspected student misconduct, the legality of the search will depend on whether the search is "reasonable" (New Jersey v. T.L.O.). The "reasonableness" of a search depends on (1) whether there is individualized suspicion that the search will turn up evidence of a student's violation of the law or school rules and (2) whether the search is reasonably related to the objectives of the search and not excessively intrusive in light of the student's age, gender, and/or the nature of the infraction. It is recommended that the district consult with legal counsel as appropriate. See BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure.\*\*\*

When a school official reasonably suspects that a search of a student's mobile communication device will turn up evidence of the student's violation of the law or school rules, such a search shall be conducted in accordance with BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure.

(cf. 5145.12 - Search and Seizure) (cf. 5145.2 - Freedom of Speech/Expression)

When a student uses a mobile communication device in an unauthorized manner, the student may be disciplined and a district employee may confiscate the device. The employee shall store the device securely until it is returned to the student or turned over to the principal or designee, as appropriate.

\*\*\*Note: The following optional paragraph addresses students' off-campus conduct during nonschool hours. In general, the courts have upheld districts' discipline of students for off-campus conduct that posed a threat to the safety of other students, staff, or school property or presented a risk of substantial disruption of school activities, provided that the district was able to document the impact or disruption that the conduct had, or could be expected to have, on school activities.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: Pursuant to Education Code 48900, districts have the authority to suspend or expel students who engage in cyberbullying off campus, provided that the act meets the criteria specified in the definition of "bullying" in Education Code 48900 (i.e., a severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct that has or can be reasonably predicted to have the effect of placing a reasonable student in fear of harm to the student's person or property, causing a

substantially detrimental effect on the student's physical or mental health, causing substantial interference with the student's academic performance, or causing substantial interference with the student's ability to participate in or benefit from school services, activities, or privileges); see BP 5131.2 - Bullying.\*\*\*

\*\*\*Note: In adopting policy related to off-campus conduct, districts should consult with legal counsel to ensure that the policy does not violate students' First Amendment rights to freedom of speech or expression. Also see BP 5145.2 - Freedom of Speech/Expression.\*\*\*

A student may also be subject to discipline, in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation, for off-campus use of a mobile communication device which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or district property or substantially disrupts school activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall inform students that the district will not be responsible for a student's mobile communication device which is brought on campus or to a school activity and is lost, stolen, or damaged.
