Hesston Elementary Families:

Our school year is off and running. It is awesome to have students back at the building. They have been working hard learning grade level expectations and reconnecting with classmates. We welcome kindergarten families, new students, and previous students to the building. We also welcome several new staff members to H.E.S.: Mrs. Hannah Reber joined the first grade team, Mrs. Rozalyn Frey is our new literacy specialist, Mrs. Melissa Carlson is our ESOL paraprofessional, along with two new Special Ed. paraprofessionals, Mrs. Laura Krehbiel and Mrs. Marilyn Noll, Mrs. Diana Regier is supporting in the library, and Mrs. Danielle Flaming transitioned to first grade this year.

Safety is a top priority at Hesston Elementary. I have a few reminders to help make our school safe for all students. The alley to the west of the school is reserved for **buses only** throughout the school day. It is not to be **used as a drop off or pick up point for students.** Students and families should not be riding their bikes up the alley, as this is a bus drop off zone. Also, if your child has to cross Amos Street to get to the front of the school, an adult must assist them across the street. Your help with these procedures is greatly appreciated. We also thank our volunteer crossing guards, who keep students safe to and from school. Thank you for all of your assistance in keeping our students safe.

Having two drop off and pick up lines has reduced the amount of time parents have to wait. We ask your help to keep the process moving quickly, by not leaving your vehicle unattended. If you need to exit your vehicle, please find a parking spot in the lot. Students are asked to be dropped off and picked up only in the designated pick up lane. Students should not be walking between cars or through parking lots to get in the car or to their parents.

The official start time of the school day is 8:00 a.m. Please be aware, students need to be *in their classrooms by the 8:00 a.m. bell.* If they arrive in the classroom after 8:00 a.m., they will be marked tardy. Please refer to the student-parent handbook for the tardy policies. Thank you parents for ensuring your child is at school on time and off to a positive start each day.

We appreciate the support of our parents at Meet the Teacher Night and the Parent Open House. Each of these events provided opportunities for families to get into the building and to build a relationship with teachers and staff. We also appreciate your support in reading and practicing math facts each evening. If you have questions or concerns, please feel free to address them with your child's teacher.

We also appreciate the support of our parents as we navigate strategies to keep our students healthy. There are several elements I want you to be aware of. Visitors will continue to be limited to the front office and must wear a mask into the building. We ask parents not to join us for lunch and for birthdays in the classroom at this time. We will continue to evaluate this practice as the year progresses. The fundamental safety practices will continue with good hand washing practices, social distancing, disinfecting high touch areas, and staying home when sick.

Hello! My name is Dawn Lafferty and I am the Counselor here at Hesston Elementary. This is my 5th year as counselor and my 24th year in education! As the school counselor, I provide educational activities for students related to academic, career and social emotional development skills. I teach whole group lessons during the wheel, meet with small groups and provide individual student support. We are excited to be back together here at school. The theme at HES this year is #bettertogether. We are truly better when we work together! To be proactive in supporting the mental well-being of our elementary students, last year USD 460 adopted the Character Strong curriculum. The elementary portion of the program is called Purposeful People. Students will once again be learning about one character trait each month through lessons taught by their classroom teacher. I will also be teaching lessons during the wheel that support the word of the month. We began the year by focusing on the word RESPECT, which is: "Seeing the good in people and things and treating them with care." Be watching Class Dojo for monthly updates and videos that talk about the word of the month. You will also receive a home handout each month with many ideas and conversation starters. We enjoyed making our monthly character videos last year and we will continue to do this again this year. Stay tuned to see how Banana and T-Rex practice their character skills!

This year has gotten off to a running start! I would like to start by acknowledging that HES parents have been doing a SPECTACULAR job of keeping their children home when they are not feeling well. Thank you! I also want to say a huge thanks to everyone for their patience and willingness to do what it takes to keep our kids in school as we navigate another year of battling COVID.

Dental Screens: Dr. Dillner's office will be returning to HES this year on Sept. 10 to provide free dental screens. They will also be offering free fluoride treatments. Fluoride treatment does require a signed consent form. Watch your child's backpack this week for more information.

And finally, a reminder that a good day starts with a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast. It's the best way to fuel your body and stay healthy!

Make sure your child gets plenty of rest:

Kids ages 6 to 9 need about 10 hours of sleep a night, while children ages 10-12 need a little over 9 hours a night. Since not every child needs the same amount of sleep, it is up to parents to judge the exact amount of rest their child needs and make sure they get to bed in time for them to have the required amount. Lack of sleep can cause kids to be irritable, have a hard time concentrating on schoolwork, and even physical symptoms like headaches and stomach problems.

Feed your child a good breakfast:

A healthy breakfast refuels the body and replenishes blood sugar (glucose), giving a person the energy needed to start a new day. Children who don't get breakfast have a hard time concentrating in class, and often come to the health office complaining of stomachaches. A hot breakfast is offered at school every day of the week, so if your morning is too busy your child can eat at school.

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
