1	We learned some new strategies to help with subtraction this week. We used addition and make a 10 strategy, as well as, break the number we are subtracting into two parts. We played a game of "Around the World" with subtraction flash cards that a student donated to the class. Thank You! We also played Kahoot with some day/night vocabulary we have been learning about. We have been writing our opinions about some collections that we brought from home and acting as judges to select the winner of our collection and give reasons why. We are finishing that part of the unit up and now will be writing about places and book reviews. I will be returning the collections for students to bring home. Thank You.
2	Learning is happening all around second grade. In math we are continuing to master our addition facts to 20. Students have been working on remembering their facts using multiple strategies. We are also using what we know about place value to add two digit numbers. Last weeks poem was "Baby Animals" and their fluency practice on Seesaw sounds amazing! Check it out if you haven't lately.
3	This past week we applied our math rules to multiples of 7 and 8. This week it's onto 9's. We also learned how to use a multiplication table. In writing we are selecting topics to research for our informational writing unit. On a side note please be sure to remind your child to bring a water bottle to school. Learning is thirsty work and we don't have may plastic cups remaining.
4	Students enjoyed participating in a science activity this week where they created rainbows using cups of water, sunlight, and white paper. We discovered that the water was acting like a prism and split the white sunlight into all colors of the rainbow. We even tried variations to the activity such as moving the water and making a shadow to see how the rainbows changed.
5	This was a very short, but exciting week for 5th grade. We attended the Gulf of Maine Research Institute, in Portland, on Thursday. Students collected and graphed data on live lobsters as well as other sea life.
Garden	Do you know about the Three Ds? The fourth and fifth graders do! We used the Three Ds (dead, dying, and diseased) to help us determine which branches to prune from our fruit trees. We also pruned branches that were crossing, had acute angles, or branches that were clustering (CAC). The time to prune is now, while trees are still dormant.

Fluency is the ability to read at an appropriate rate, read accurately, and use proper expression. In order to understand what they read, children must be able to read fluently whether they are reading aloud or silently. When reading

aloud, fluent readers notice all the punctuation, read in phrases and add intonation appropriately. Their reading is smooth and has expression. (Reading Rockets)


