Check Out What's Happening at Morse School: Week of 3/27

K/1

This week, we revisited the Zones of Regulation. This program helps students name and understand emotions and helps them make choices to become calmer and ready to learn. Our lessons this week looked at recognizing emotions and why it is important to see how others around you are feeling. We will keep working on these lessons for the next several weeks, and they blend perfectly with the work we have already done around what respectful learners do and using learning time to learn. I'm really excited to see how well our littles are doing with the challenge to be the best learning role models they can be.

1	Our first trip to the YMCA Swim Safety Program was a success! Students had a lot of fun in the pool and in the gym. It was exciting to see friends from Monroe Elementary too. We look forward to going back this week. Please remember your bathing suit, towel, plastic bag, and home lunch if that is what you signed up for. We are also excited to be going to Troy Elementary and visiting the Planetarium. We are continuing to learn about patterns in the sky and this week will be focusing on the phases of the moon. What does the moon look like this week? Remember to draw or color the moon in your Moon Journal.
2	Last week was a busy one for second grade. Math assessments were given and students are beginning new chapters. We are rotating through our centers nicely and showing our learning in exciting ways. As a class we are reading a James Preller's chapter book from his JigSaw Jones Mystery series. We are keeping track of the clues and can't wait to solve "The Case from Outer Space". It is always fun to get lost in a good book! We are earning Bikes for Books slips in class but don't forget to read at home too. Let me know if you need more reading slips.
3	This past week we took a serious look at how our behaviors are affecting our classroom and special times. We reviewed our zones of regulation and are starting to create toolboxes we can use when we are not ready to learn. We had some amazing discussions on expected and unexpected behaviors. We will continue to work on our zones and look for new tools to help us learn.
4	We started to discuss the Zones of Regulation this week. We all shared what helps us to be in the green zone. When we're in the green zone, we're ready to learn! Students were eager to share what helps them to be focused. We agreed we would help each other in the classroom to be ready to learn! Students did a fantastic job coming up with ideas to encourage each other!
5	This week 5th grade explored a new math website called 99math. It's an engaging way for them to practice their basic math facts. Ask them about it! We will have March's Book Share presentations this week. Please remind your student about this.
SEL	This week at Morse, 3, 4, and 5 continued practicing working in groups and made great progress on their projects. 2 had fun outside this week playing some cooperative games and learning how to work as a team. K-1 finished the book we were reading aloud and then got to enjoy some time outside where we practiced ways to calm our bodies and reset ourselves when we have big emotions.
Garden	Our K/1 learners made mini greenhouses this week in our exploration of plants and plant parts. Will the roots break through the seed coat this week? Second graders went back in time to see how maple sap was traditionally collected, making "birch bark" sap baskets. Our oldest students worked in the orchard, pruning trees and picking up branches. We also sampled a little lettuce that wintered over in our hoop house!


