## Panther Kids Doing Good



Sixth grade students Hanna Lomoro, Brianna Shriver and Hailey Adams organized a student hat and pajama pants day to raise money for the Benton Harbor Soup Kitchen. They raised and delivered \$169 to help others with food insecurity.

In February, with the help or our community South School students collected over 660 cereal boxes for a domino style lesson about chain reaction, cause & effect, etc. The cereal boxes were then donated to a local food pantry to help feed hungry folks in our community.

A video of the activity posted on our district Facebook page went viral and garnered over six million engagements worldwide! The story was picked up by both area and national news outlets, and the Kellogg cereal company matched the donation with an additional 660 boxes of cereal!





### Watervliet Public Schools Partners with Berrien County Hearing Impaired Program

The Berrien County Hearing Impaired Program performs hearing evaluations for children birth through grade 12 in which licensed audiologists can identify or rule out hearing loss.

#### If hearing loss is identified, audiologists can:

- Discuss what sound amplification options a family may have for their child
- Help with the selection, fitting, and service of hearing aids, as well as troubleshooting cochlear implants
- Help with the fitting of assistive listening devices in the form of personal FM devices and classroom FM devices

 Provide professional in-services for teachers and school staffon the signs/causes/treatments of hearing loss; how to troubleshoot hearing aids, cochlear implants, and or FM system issues a student may have in the classroom; and education on hearing conversation

#### Students can be referred for a hearing evaluation by:

- ♦ Doctors
- ♦ Teachers
- ♦ Service Providers
- ♦ Parents

You may call their office directly at **269-471-8858** to discuss or schedule a hearing evaluation for a child you have concerns about. The evaluations and services are free of charge for families in Berrien County.

### Meeting challenges with a little help

So many educational challenges are being met this year by our talented staff that they make it look easy. It's not! It requires a lot of effort and hard work by an exceptional team. And we have also had some extra support staff come onboard this year to help make it all happen.

Hannah Armstrong, Emma Chester, Kristy Moxley, and Alyssa Konkel are serving as Elementary Virtual Specialists to assist our South and North School Option B learners. They work with teachers and students to make sure that virtual learners are working at the same pace as those students learning onsite.

These mentors have regular learning sessions with groups of virtual students. In these sessions, virtual students work on reading, language arts, math, science, fine motor skills - and have a little fun as well. A bond is developed, and students often show up to the virtual classes with jokes and stories to tell their mentors. Mentors also work one on one with kids who need extra support, or in small groups with families. Sometimes they work long hours in the evening planning for virtual learning. Hannah, Emma, Kristy and Alyssa all say they love working with the students despite the challenges that virtual learning brings for the learners, families, and educators.

WPS Option C students are those who have elected to take all online classes from an outside provider, allowing them to work at their own pace. Ben Loshbough is our North and South Elementary Schools Virtual/Option C Specialist. Kristopher Hickman fills this roll in the Middle and High Schools. They enroll students in their online courses and communicate daily with the virtual instruction provider to keep abreast of our students' online progress. While these students are not taught by WPS teachers, Ben and Kris serve as mentors, holding them accountable to their coursework and the use of technology, as well as advocating for students concerning their work. They also communicate with

parents to discuss issues that arise.

Additionally, Kris oversees six sections of high school online courses for students who are in the building during the day. These students may be pursuing credit recovery or taking electronic elective alternatives for classes not offered in our regular course selections.


