Students Protest Racial Inequity

On the weekend of February 3rd, several students took to social media to express their concerns regarding the treatment of students of color by administration, staff and fellow students at Collingswood High School.

As the weekend progressed, several stories were shared to the Face-book group "In The Wood" and by Tuesday, February 7th, a post from an activist based in Camden called for students to walk out of their classes and join a protest in Knight Park across from the high school. Students and staff inside the building were instructed to shelter in place while the activist rang the school doorbell and demanded to speak with administrators.

After school let out on Tuesday, students joined the man and held a short protest. The following day, students organized a protest at 12:30 p.m. and dozens of students filed out with signs. Some students gave statements about the treatment they have experienced or witnessed at the high school. Others chose to simply show their support with chants or signs. The walkouts continued on Thursday and by Friday had dwindled.

In the days following the protests, the administration began taking steps to address racism and discrimination within the school and to create an initiative called "One School, One Community," which aims to bring together students of various backgrounds. In an email sent out to students the administration stated "this will not be swept under the rug."



Will Al-Created Art Replace Human Art?

Have you ever thought about the possibility that our smart devices will outsmart us at any point in the near or far future? Many scientists across our history have theorized about this topic. One example of this would be Stephen Hawking and his famous quote, "The develop-ment of full artificial intelligence could spell the end of the human race. It would take off on its own, and re-design itself at an ever-increasing rate. Humans, who are limited by slow biological evolution, couldn't compete, and would be superseded." This was seen as something plausible, but we didn't expect for it to happen as fast as it is. In the last

decade, specifically in the last 5 years, many jobs were completely changed due to automation. Some examples of this are factory and manufacturing related jobs. Most of the big corporations that previously relied on human labor completely ditched their human workers as soon as they could, replacing them with Al-directed machines.

But before starting, what is AI? AI stands for artificial intelligence, a medley of code and information that emulates sentience, giving them the capability to perform tasks that before were only fit for humans. One of the many tasks that AI can now perform is art. Before we could only give simple directions to a machine, like to calculate something or move an object to another place, but now it is capable of essentially replacing one of the things that makes us human, our creativity. Over the last few months, AI that was capable of emulating human art came to light, raising big concerns across the art community. So far it doesn't appear to have cost anyone their job, but that could change as it has with other industries.

I got in contact with someone who makes a living as an illustrator, Kevin Sherry. He believes that "every human being is creative at their core," which is true, human beings have been creating art from the very beginning of our existence. "As long as there are humans, we will make art and there will be artists," he affirmed. He also states, "We live in a capitalist country. If you can make money from something, you have to do it. No one else is going to look out for you. So I try to never look down on someone hustling to make money." He thinks that if this continues companies might start using AI-generated art pressed by their schedules and budget instead of hiring an illustrator, which could cause many artists to lose their source of income, as well as cause fewer people to pursue art as a career.

Artists losing their jobs is not the only concern with AI art. One of the main problems it presents is that it takes artwork from the internet and generates art based on them. It is even possible to entirely replicate someone's style by simply feeding the machine their work and with just a few clicks and a prompt, you can get an almost endless amount of artwork that you can sell as your own.

You could argue that it is just "Inspired" by artwork it finds online, just like artists are inspired by other artists' work, but that's not true at all, because Al can not be inspired. Basically, while an artist bases their art on a piece that they have seen, an Al just takes a bunch of them as samples and mashes them. This whole process happens in the blink of an eye, so it can make thousands of variations of a single artwork in a matter of seconds based on the artworks it has fed on. "Al generated images are a finished product without any production behind it, the ends without the means," Sherry said. The truth is that Al can't create something entirely new like a human can. Most artists agree on that. If Van Gogh could create a thousand of The Starry Night variations in a matter of seconds, would we really care that much about it? Would we really care about the story behind that glittery starred sky that he saw through his window while interned in an asylum? The answer is no, we probably wouldn't, when things are that easy to get, we usually take them for granted, "It's not about the destination, it's about the journey, the climb."

While it might not necessarily replace human artists, over time, Al art might become its own thing and might even make human art evolve. We have seen this before. With the introduction of photography, people didn't need to hire artists to paint portraits anymore, but that didn't make human art disappear. To the contrary, having photography as a competition, art evolved and branched into many surrealist and abstract styles, such as the works of Piccaso or Dalí, styles that portray things that can't be seen in real life, thus being impossible to replicate by photography. And that also did not make realist art disappear, instead, it became something rare that only rich people wanted to have, making a traditional portrait artist's labor way more expensive than it was before photographs were a thing. And that's exactly what could happen, modern-day art might become something else due to the existence of Al. Maybe more people will be interested in traditional pencil art than digital, or maybe some measures will be taken against it. Maybe human art will become rarer making it more expensive. People may even develop more unique art styles that are harder for AI to replicate. We do not know what's going to happen, but something is going to change. That's for sure.

Absurdity and Meaning

One Camus quote that resonates with me is, "In the midst of winter, I found there was, within me, an invincible summer." Everyone has the ability to be happy. Now you may be asking, 'what about all the devastation and suffering?', well, like previously said, you should revolt against it. Have disdain and sneer at the absurdity. Accept that nothing truly makes sense. This leads to another tale. The tale of Sisyphus; of whom Camus was inspired. Sisyphus was condemned for life by pushing up a boulder over a hill but, when the boulder was at the top, it rolled to the bottom again. The task is futile and strenuous. But, Sisyphus knows that his actions are meaningless and that he is stuck where he is. Sisyphus does not hope that his condition will get better. He does not wish the boulder to finally reach the top and stay there. He doesn't turn towards god, he doesn't turn towards suicide, instead, he relishes it. He espouses absurdity. By revolting against this absurdity though, he is contemptuous. In Camus's words, "One must imagine Sisyphus happy". But again, this is not where this ends, live your life. Embrace every day as a reminder that you get to do anything. Whether or not debating whether suffering is worse for some is pointless, for suffering is a greater reason to strive, to have compassion, to have sympathy. Ultimately, for you to be unique for no suffering is the same. Now, consider yourself a blank canvas, an empty desert, you must create! You must continue to push that boulder up the hill. Mental Health Days For Students

Mental health, by definition, is "a person's condition with regard to their psychological and emotional well-being." The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) states, "One in six youth aged 6-17 experience a mental health disorder each year." In a smaller sense, this means that out of your thirty person class, at least five of them will have issues with their mental health. Along with this, NAMI also states, "Some students may not necessarily have a mental health condition but are having a challenging day or week where their mental health is suffering." This explains how everyone is impacted by



mental health, and it's something that is just as important as one's physical health.

So, should students have excused mental health days?

This question was first brought to light in 2019 when the New York Times asked students about their feelings towards the idea. At large, the student responses indicated that not only should we have mental health days, but that they are a necessity. Along with this, twelve states have already recognized the need for mental health days: Washington, Utah, California, Nevada, Arizona, Kentucky, Colorado, Maine, Illinois, Oregon, Connecticut, and Virginia. To continue, NAMI states the benefits of mental health days, stating, "School policies that recognize mental health symptoms and treatment as an acceptable reason for absence can help students take the time they need to care for themselves, restore their health and help minimize additional symptoms. This can help normalize the conversation around mental health, which can in turn promote understanding and empathy and create a greater willingness to seek help if they need more intensive support."

On the contrary, there are arguments as to why students should not have days set aside for their mental health. Numerous researchers of the Child Mind Institute, worry that students may take mental health days as a way of avoidance - whether that avoidance is running from anxiety induced from school or dodging schoolwork- both can hold negative impacts. Also, several students across the nation believe that teens would take advantage of excused mental health days- students would skip school simply because they do not feel like attending. Some believe having mental health days could be used to procrastinate on assign-

However, these arguments are futile, as there are potential solutions to them. For example, having limits as to how many mental health days one can take could discourage students from skipping. To add on, one article, contemplating if Philadelphia should instate mental health days for students, provides realistic safeguards to prevent the misuse of days. It essentially states, once a student exceeds the number of mental health days granted, parents, teachers, or counselors can step in to determine if the student needs greater help or if they've been abusing the privilege.

Mental health is health. Allowing students to utilize mental health days has many benefits. By excusing absences for mental health purposes, the stigma around it could reduce significantly. This could also lead to people being more comfortable with seeking help. Along with this, academic and athletic performance could increase, as students would have the opportunity to rest, recharge, and take care of themselves. When a student is physically ill, attending school is discouraged - so why isn't this the case when one is mentally unwell?








Show Season

Preacher's Daughter Review





The film opens in media res on a hallucinated fascist rally imagined by the main character, "Pink". Pink yells at his audience that they're worthless, which is met with thunderous applause. We're then thrown into a scene during the Second World War, in which Pink's British father loads a gun to prepare for an upcoming battle (in which he is subsequently killed by a bomb). We see the young Pink looking at his father's war memorabilia. He doesn't fit in his father's clothes and, symbolically, fails to fill the void left by his father when he dies. He cannot become a well-adjusted man with his goals set out for him, just an aimless musician. We continue to see scenes from Pink's life in which he fails to find any purpose amidst a landscape of pointless commercialized art and mindless consumption. We see him as he continues in the same emotional state he's always been in, just a little who can't quite fit in like normal. He doesn't get over the loss of structure marked by the loss of his father, and he wastes away as his unhappy marriage collapses around him. We hear, in the song Mother, his youthful conversations with his overbearing mother. She controls his life such that it's safe, but also meaningless. She makes it such that he has no room to make mistakes or mature very much, in just the same way that his boys' school relentlessly tries to whip him into another unfeeling, unthinking cog in industrial society. In The Happiest Days of Our Lives and Another Brick in the Wall (parts 2-3), we see his authoritarian headmaster beating unruly children, including Pink (for writing poetry). The visuals in this part of the film include the children marching around in expressionless masks as they are herded into a meat grinder, symbolically killing their real personhood to extract value from them. The school, according to the film, exists to produce productive workers who will follow the orders of any man in charge of them.

Pink describes this process, in which any individuality is crushed in favor of rote memorization and unthinking ascension, as being "just another brick" in the metaphorical, emotional "wall" he's built between himself and society. Alienated already, he takes control of the only thing he really can. He gives up the trappings of individuality, trying to superficially stop feeling. He shaves his entire body and sits obsessively in front of a TV in his hotel room. However, what neither he nor anyone else understands is that one can never really stop feeling. There's always a part of you that's human, the part of you that overprotective parents and abusive schoolteachers set about to kill. We see this feeling part of him break out when he brings a groupie to his hotel after a concert of his. He sits listlessly in front of the TV flipping through old programs while she tries to talk to him. There is a sense of positivity and security in the shows as if they're from a time when everything was certain and there wasn't such a mess in everybody's heads. Snippets of the traumatic moments that have brought him to this point in his life (set against the backdrop of prewar media), he has an emotional breakdown in which he completely destroys the room. He tries, to no avail, to put it back together. Far from destroying the wall, the part of him that can feel anything only feels hatred. His wall is totally built.

With nothing left in his life for him, Pink falls depressed in his hotel room and is found by his manager on the eve of a big concert. He is drugged and has a hallucinatory episode in which he remembers what it was like to feel human but realizes he doesn't really care that he's so soulless now. He has become, as the overlaid song says, Comfortably Numb. He then laments the loss of simplicity and sureness that Britain had had during the war, in which there was a common goal to which the whole country was committed. Where, he asks, is Vera Lynn? Where is there anything of which to be sure? Where is the singularity of the wartime effort? Finding no certainty such as he believes the world once had, Pink turns his emotions to rage and hatred once more.

In a drug-induced hallucination, Pink enters the concert to find it as the fascist rally at which the film opened. His fans, once rockers, are now his followers. Their lives as British schoolchildren already primed them to follow orders and conform. They, too, felt the hole left in a postwar world in which the flaws of the world are revealed to its people. They become the acolytes of a strong, charismatic man. The film's boldest claim is made here: in a neoliberal world there is little difference between a rock star and a dictator. In a world where nothing means anything to anybody and in which the systemic effects of institutional hate are ignored, it's very easy for some strong man to make his fans round up undesirables, as Pink does in In the Flesh.

Pink and his followers marched through the streets, following orders he gives on a megaphone. Eventually the shots of them marching meld into animated sequences of rows and rows of hammers goosestepping. The symbol of two crossed hammers adorns the uniforms of the live-action fascists, symbolizing the tendency of far-right ultranationalists to reduce their people to their utility toward the actualization of a singular goal: A return to past greatness and stability by exterminating internal enemies. The men are literally reduced to hammers, blunt objects of violent utility. Fascism is, according to the film, the blinding process through which tradition and fear drive a unified effort to self-objectify. When presented with a world that doesn't fit cleanly into the hierarchies instilled in them by society (including their schools), they have to make those hierarchies make sense. Their "rebellion" against this world can only really reflect their emotional immaturity and their inability to let go of what it once meant to them. This idea is explored further when Pink's mental breakdown reaches its climax, during which he puts his own mind "on trial". He hallucinates all the people with whom he's had bad interactions as testifying against him in front of a huge magistrate. He hallucinates his mother as a bomber plane (not unlike those he earlier hallucinates pointlessly killing his father during Goodbye Blue Sky). and his exwife as a monstrous flower and his teacher as a butcher. He can't conceive of anybody hurting him for any other reason than they wanted to. Even if he can rationally see his own responsibility and the ways his own actions have led him to this point, he's still emotionally stunted to the point he can't get over his rough childhood. All his emotional depth and intelligence come from his exploration of his own depravity. During the aforementioned Goodbye Blue Sky, Pink once again laments the absence of meaning in anything after the war. He sees a faceless soldier die and become one among the countless headstones marked with a cross. Blood drips down it and just runs down the gutter. The cross, a symbol of meaningful sacrifice, loses any meaning when it makes up a sea of men killed for no real reason. There is nothing important or special about the sacrifice of any one of these men. There is nothing left of their Union Jack but the gravestone hidden in its cross. What else, asks the film, facilitates fascist nationalism? When the only meaningful signifier of your nation is its death machine which strips men of individuality and leaves them to die, what is left for anyone except their destructive utility? Where can we even go from there?

The answer lies, as the film's closing credits posit, somewhere Outside The Wall. We must reject the social conservatism that turns people into dead, soulless shells. We must accept the "bleeding hearts and artists" that the headmaster rejected when they eventually make their stand. No, it's not easy, but the only thing that's really between us and freedom is the wall we build for ourselves and each other. Please, reach out and form a community. Stay human. If nothing else, the film tells us that humanity is worth more than any nation or its economy.

The Decline of Native Animals

Over the last hundred years, humans have expanded and advanced further than any known creature. We have explored almost every place on the planet and control huge parts of it.

The mass expansion of people has led to climate change, overpopulation, and the loss of thousands of different animal species. In America especially we have lost or seen the decline of many native animals.

This article will go over a few of those cases. One example of a sharp decline in native range is the Grizzly bear. Originally, these animals could be found in most Western states. Their range stretched from Alaska, down the Pacific coast, and into Northern Mexico. After hundreds of years of hunting, habitat loss, and other human-caused issues, the range of the Grizzly bear has moved much more North and is now mostly located in the wilderness of Canada and Alaska. This was matched by a decrease in population throughout the Continent. Another example is the population of wolves. At one point they inhabited most of North America besides the southern states such as Alabama and Mississippi. Due to years of targeted hunting and bounties, just like the Grizzly bear, the population and range of wolves have greatly decreased. At this point, wolves in the United States are mostly found in nature reserves or the wilderness in western states. Wolfs were especially targeted because of the danger they posed for settlers and so their population numbers dropped significantly throughout the 19th century. Greater than both of these examples, however, was the drop in the population of the Bison. Caused by hunting and loss of habitat, the Bison population dropped from an estimated 30-60 million before European settlers to around 1,000 by 1890. The current range is even smaller for Bison. They once roamed all of inland North America but are now found in small herds in the great plains or in livestock farms. This staggering drop in population is one of the greatest examples of just how much of an effect people can have on the world around them.

Despite this, however, another commonality between these three species is their slow but steady recovery. Due to new laws that prevent hunting and more people becoming aware of the effects of climate change and habitat destruction, all three of these animal populations have been increasing. Although there is still a long way to go before they reach their original size, it is a good trend that can be seen across the world. It is a sign that even though people do have a lot of effect on the world, it doesn't have to be bad.

Alfredo Review

In May of 2020, after finding success in his previous album, Bandana, Fredrick Tipton (better known as Freddie Gibbs) knew he had to deliver something big to outdo himself. He decided to collaborate with famed record producer and former business partner, Alan "The Alchemist" Maman. Theyworked together on a 10-track, 35-minute album and titled it Alfredo, both as a combination of their names and to bolster



the overlying theme of gangs, particularly the Italian mob. The prominence of the mob in the album is also shown on its cover, which resembles that of the logo for Godfather the franchise. album The

features a psychedelic kind of sound using reverb and melodic backing tracks. The instrumentals are in stark contrast to the

feature Gibbs's low, raspy voice rapping about themes such as violence, gang affiliation, and narcotics, all while a guitar gently strums in the background or a distant voice sings a looping melody. The vocals of the featured artists Benny the Butcher, Rick Ross, Conway the Machine, and Tyler, the Creator, possess similar traits. Most of the tracks feature sampled dialogue at the beginning or end of the song from movies and shows such as Breaking Bad, Chappelle's Show, and The Black Godfather.

The lyrics and themes of the album tend to consist of Gibbs leaving behind his past life of dealing drugs and running with gangs in Gary, Indiana. There are also several mentions of repentance and wishing for forgiveness, making references both to Christianity and Islam. In the 6th track, Something to Rap About, Gibbs says, "I'm tryna live to 93 and see the old me/When I touched that crack, I let them crackers take control of me" which refers to the negative cycle that selling and doing narcotics can put someone into. The premise of the song is Gibbs wanting to be able to grow old and not lose what he has worked for.

The album was met with critical acclaim. It was given an 88/100 on Metacritic (tying his previous album Bandana for his highest Metacritic rating), ranked 15th on the Billboard 200 (his highest Billboard ranking), and was nominated for Best Rap Album at the Grammys in 2021 (his first Grammy nomination).

In my opinion, this is Freddie's best work. I rarely find myself skipping any of the tracks and the features & beats were certainly not wasted. I would give the album a 9.5/10 with my only complaint being that the album is only a little over a half-hour long and would benefit from a couple more tracks. My favorite song on the entire album is Babies & Fools, which has one of my favorite instrumentals in all of hip-hop, meaningful lyrics, and a well-placed feature from Conway the Machine.

Freaks and Geeks Review

On September 25, 1999, the first episode of the award-winning teen comedy/drama series Freaks and Geeks was aired on NBC. It was created by Paul Feig and executively produced by Judd Apatow. Only spanning 18 episodes, it was canceled due to poorly executed airing times and mixed reviews. Not even all of the episodes were aired, with only 12 of them being released at the time. With all of the somewhat bad press, nevertheless, the

series has grown a bit of a following over the last two decades. But what really makes this show so special? What makes it a so-called cult classic?

The show follows Lindsay Weir, a teenage girl in 1980-1981 Michigan as she finds where she belongs in society and the social scene of McKinley High School. A former mathlete, she befriends a group of burnouts- the "freaks"- and goes through their fair share of trials and tribulations. The story also follows her little brother Sam and his two friends, Neal and Bill. Considered the "geeks", they deal with bullies, cheerleaders, D&D, and gym class. The idea of another coming-of-age show in a sea of dozens of them just seems overdone. Not all, but most of them seem to only touch on surface value issues while fulfilling overdone stereotypes. Personally, I think this series is the opposite of that.

Firstly. Freaks and Geeks represent two different groups of adolescents that have either been misrepresented or not represented at all in these types of shows and movies. Geeks, nerds, outcasts, and burnouts are almost always the side characters there to further the story and to be one-dimensional. The nerds' only personality traits are being good at STEM, liking Sci-fi, and being socially awkward. The burnouts are only interested in smoking, hanging out in each other's basements, and doing anything but being in class. This show goes deeper

into its characters, and gives them many real dimensions.

One thing that draws people to F&G's is that it gives a true perspective into what high school is actually like- or at least what it was in 1980. Even though it is set in the past and there is a sense of nostalgia at play, that doesn't mess with the fact that it is so relatable. After all, the soundtrack still holds up. Pink Floyd, Billy Joel, The Who, Styx, the Moody Blues, Van Halen, and many other bands that your dad probably loves are featured. Another factor that plays into this is the technical work of the show. For the most part, the simplified camera work and editing allow for the actors to be on full display. There's nothing to hide behind, and it allows for people viewing it to easily make connections with the characters. Speaking of characters, this show was where a few big-name actors got their start. Before the live action Scooby Doo as my personal favorite Velma, Linda Cardellini had her first major success as Lindsay. Other, more niche actors who you may have heard of, also had a bit of a break out; such as Jason Segel as Nick, James Franco as Daniel, Seth Rogan as Ken, and Busy Philipps as Kim. Furthermore, the show has a beautiful duality of comedy and sincerity. My favorite group is Sam, Neal, and Bill who all crack many jokes. Deathconsciousness

The Deathconsciousness album is played by a band called Have A Nice Life. This band has only two members; Tim Macuga sings the vocals and Dan Barret plays the instruments. The album had been recorded for five years from 2002-2007 and was finally published in January of 2008. Some songs were even added through 2016-2022. Two sides of this album were written, the first being called "The Plow That Broke The Plains," consisting of seven songs, and the second being "The Future," consisting of six tracks. With a total of thirteen

tracks on this album, all are worth listening to.

The first side, "The Plow That Broke The Plains," is a total of forty-five minutes and twenty-one seconds long. It withholds my personal favorite song, "Bloodhail." The song begins with a fifty-three second instrumental intro, having a guitar start only twenty-six seconds into the song as well. It continues during the first vocals, creating the feeling of being alone with thoughts. This song has a strong and powerful chorus as well; while the words may be hard to understand, the song still manages to make listeners feel something. The power held in this song isn't just in this song, for it goes throughout the entire album. Another song on the first album, titled "Hunter," has the same feeling and power held in it. It starts with mostly drums playing, and vocals come in thirty-eight seconds into the song. It remains mellow and without much of a beat to it for almost half of the song later on. It seems as though it's about to end, but about six minutes and eleven seconds later, it begins to pick up the pace. The song is nine minutes and forty-four seconds long, managing to reach in to the brains of

listeners, forcing them to think of ways to solve their problems.

The second side of the album, "The Future," consists of six songs, lasting a whole of thirty-nine minutes and forty-two seconds. The total length of the album adds up to be one hour, twenty-five minutes, and three seconds. My personal favorite song on this side of the album is "I Don't Love," which begins with a slow introduction, lasting fifty-one seconds. The lyrics in the first minute say "I don't want to live like this," over and over, while slightly changing the phrases up. Once the song continues, it carries into the strong sound of bass and drums. The vocals continue, still repeating similar lyrics. The six minute song once again carries listeners into a new world, where only your thoughts can be heard. It's a very sad song, although it fits perfectly into the album since each song is just as sad. Like, "Earthmover," which is another song on the second side of this album. This is the longest song on the entire album, being eleven minutes and twenty-eight seconds. It starts out with guitar, not sounding as sad as the rest. The guitar introduction carries throughout the first minute of the song, which is then when drums are added. While this song may not seem as sad as most, reaching the halfway mark of this song may change a listener's mind. To start, the cover of the album is a darkened version of the painting The Death of Marat, created by Jacques-Louis David. Obviously initially frightened by Edward's violent appearance, she offers to leave, but Edward tells her to stay.

The non judgemental and warmly kind Peg chooses to take him home and introduce Edward to her husband. The following scenes depict his fascination with the neighborhood's pastel houses, beautiful gardens, happy people roaming the streets, and the way all different kinds of people are interacting with each other. The similar-looking and cliché houses are important to the development of the story as Edward's interest in them exemplifies how he has never before been able to experience what real life outside of the abandoned mansion is like. After arriving at the house and meeting Peg's husband, Edward is asked to stay in their daughter Kim's room because she is away from home for a few days and wouldn't be occupying the space. She does come back soon, though, and when she enters her room that night, she is met with Edward laying in her bed. Predictably, at first, Kim is absolutely terrified of the man with blades for hands as she finds him resting in her bedroom. After this poor initial interaction though, Kim is able to get past it and respect him. From the very first time he sees her, Edward thinks Kim is so beautiful. He even felt this strongly about her when he saw a picture of her in the house. While she is kind at heart like her mother, Kim is simultaneously embarrassed to be seen with Edward. More than she is horrified by Edward's looks, she is actually more terrified of what people, especially her toxic and controlling boyfriend, Jim, will think. Neighborhood housewives and husbands are understandably curious about this very special character staying in the Boggs' house, so they decide to host a barbeque event where everyone can meet him. Despite Jim's hate, the majority of these interactions are positive, and people are fascinated by Edward, and the skills he has with trimming hedges, cutting hair, and grooming dogs. Jim is very jealous of everyone, most especially Kim's interest in Edward.

Due to this complication, Edward finds himself in a lot of predicaments as the rest of the story unfolds. By the end of the film, though, the viewer watches an unpredictable romance between Edward and Kim occur. After confessing her love to Edward, Kim realizes that he will never truly be safe in the real world. She accepts that it would be selfish to try to pursue this love with him. In an immature society that could not get over his looks, it was not ever actually possible. Kim makes the correct decisions to keep Edward safe and protect him from all of the hatred and danger in our real world- where she is also unable to see him ever again. This bittersweet and not necessarily happy ending of the movie is very important. With this, the viewer learns that making dangerous and scary sacrifices for the people you love can be ultimately worth it to keep the person you love, and your mutual love safe. Tim Burton considers Edward Scissorhands to be his most personal work. Burton has discussed multiple times how this film was a way for him to express how he felt as an isolated teenager who struggled to communicate with others while in a suburban area. He explains how growing up, it was extremely difficult for him to form and keep meaningful friendships. Burton says it always felt like there was something wrong with him like there was some sort of barrier between him and everyone else that caused society to shun him. Edward Scissorhands unpacks a man dealing with the same issue, just with physical differences in appearance that hold him back. This is obviously an ironic way to make fun of society's biases and a reference to humans' unfair default emotion being judgement. Through Edward's curious and passionate nature, Burton does an excellent job of explaining to the viewer what it is truly like to be a quiet person with a loud mind. The most peculiar character in the most incredible fairytale ultimately unravels to demonstrate how all different kinds of people are capable of experiencing strong emotions. A beautiful story about true love- I would recommend this film to just about anyone.

The Transformation of Persephone

You may or may not know Persephone, the Greek goddess of Spring, infamous for her kidnapping and marriage of the King of the Underworld. This mythological tale is often depicted in modern media as a love story, one where Persephone uses Hades to get away from her controlling mother, which is just one way her story is distorted. What you do not know is that this is not the first time Persephone's image has transformed.

In the common interpretation of the Greek myth, Persephone is the daughter of Zeus, King of Olympus, and Demeter the Goddess of Agriculture. Despite having many affairs and children, Demeter never married. Persephone is raised by her mother in the mortal realm, having no contact with her father or other Gods. One day she was spot-

ted by Hades who instantly fell in love with her. Not knowing what to do with his newfound love, he went to his brother, Zeus for advice. Zeus knew that Demeter would never consent to a relationship between the two, so he suggested kidnapping, which was a decision very on brand for Zeus's poor treatment towards women. Hades kidnaps her, and because the decision was made by Zeus, this kidnapping is turned into an arranged marriage. Demeter, now missing her precious daughter, looks everywhere for her, thus neglecting her duties as the goddess of agriculture. This creates the first winter because Demeter refuses to let anything grow until she gets her daughter back. This leads to Zeus negotiating for Persephone to be allowed to leave the underworld in spring. This agreement causes Demeter to grow plants when she is with Persephone, but not when Persephone is in the underworld, which results in winter. Meaning Dememeter is the true goddess of spring.

Persephone's prior image was similar to a goddess of death. For starters, in ancient Greek texts, she is usually referred to as "Dread Persephone," and never "Goddess of Spring". Similarly, her name translates to something along the lines of "The Dread Slayer". However, back in Mycenaean Greece, (which is what the ancient Greeks would consider ancient Greece) the matter of her name was even more severe. She was known as Kore and Desponia, which are vague names meaning, girl or mistress. Persephone's name was avoided due to the taboo that comes with talking about underworld gods.

Something else that supports this ancient form of Persephone, is that unlike many other Gods, Hades, the current God of the Underworld, does not have a Mycenaean form that he would have developed from. In truth, despite being the God of the Underworld and one of the three kings, Hades is a rather shallow character who rarely shows up in any of the mythos or practices of Ancient Greek religion. He does not even play a big part in his main myth, the kidnapping of Persephone. Most of his domain was contributed to either Poseidon or Persephone in Mycenaean Greece, who along with Demeter were worshiped together as the main Gods in the older version of the religion. He really had nobody to develop from or a reason to exist.

So, now you understand how the images of most Gods change over time, especially Persephone, who goes from Goddess of death to Goddess of spring all while her husband is created to take over her mantle. Together they are being reinterpreted as a love story. If you want to know more about it, "Overly Sarcastic Productions" has a great Youtube video on it, that has been an incredible source for this article. Why did this happen? My personal theory is that Mycenaean Greece just generally had a deeper respect for women than Ancient Greece. Ultimately I want you to come up with your own conclusion now that you have all the facts.

Prosthetics a Brief History and the Now

Prosthetics, or prosthesis, is a word to describe an artificial body part. Human beings have been using artificial limbs in order to substitute broken or amputated ones for a long time. Such as an Egyptian prosthetic toe made out of leather and wood, or



Rome's usage of prosthetic limbs on those who lost their original limbs in war. In the 1500s knights, such as Götz von Berlichingen, had iron prosthetics. Meanwhile, Pirates iconically used peg legs and hand hooks for their own injuries.

Prosthetics have always been a part of history, but it wasn't until Ambroise Paré in the 1500s, that prostheses started seeing a turn for the better. The start of using materials like paper and leather, along with adding harnesses, and knee locks greatly improved their functions. In 1975, Ysidro Martinez further improved prosthetics by increasing friction and balance. Additionally, the use of modern materials like carbon fiber, made prosthetics lighter and more durable than before.

However, the question that remains is, what about now? The improvement of materials in prosthetics, the bettering for comfort and stability for those prosthetics, but what does it all mean? For the majority, it means that those who are born without proper usage of their limbs, and those who have lost limbs in accidents and in wars, get a chance to live a new-normal life. Instead of having a permanent limb loss, they could have something made to replace it, and hopefully, regain a resemblance to their old life.

Even now we see an improvement in prosthetic limbs, and that improvement will only continue in the future. Prosthetic arms, such as the potential Atom Hand, have the ability to be moved in premade motor patterns and have sensors that give tactile feedback. The media depicts life for prostheses in the future, as a time when prosthetic limbs are impossible to differentiate from natural ones. From examples like Atom Hand, current prosthetics are quickly approaching that expectation. Hopefully, soon enough those who experience limb loss may find an easy and efficient alternative.

You run face-first into your enemies or die. On the other hand, a cautious methodical player will only meet the reality that if you stop moving, you will die, If you stop killing enemies, you will die. Throughout the game, if you don't feel like you are doing anything cool, it's probably because you are not very good at the game and are unprepared for everything it has to offer. ULTRAKILL eases you into the game, as you start out on level one the game begins with tight halls and small play spaces to let new players experiment with movement. As you get more comfortable, more and more levels are open for you. Each level is your personal playground to experiment with how fast you are able to move and kill clumps of enemies, while not being shot down in the process. With the game still receiving new updates, there is no reason not to buy ULTRAKILL. It is a work of art, and hopefully, someday other games will catch up to the quality and quantity of content that ULTRAKILL provides.



Netflix Series Night Stalker: The Hunt for a Serial Killer

Twelve minutes in, an old lady named Ester Petschar was talking about a specific day that she was working. On March 17, 1985, she came across a man at a thrift shop where she spent her lunch break. That day she remembered a table full of junk that was set out. On the table sat a hat that stood out to her. She picked it up because of the lettering "AC/ DC". Petschar found it weird and put it back in the pile of junk. The man then came from her right and picked up the hat that she had previously put down. While looking at the hat, he smiled at Ester, and that's when she noticed he had a tattoo. She stated that "he had the devil on his hand. A picture. A round circle with the face of the devil. You know, with the horns?". Afterward, she saw him walk away with the hat, but little did she know that he would be driving next to her in the other lane while going back home.

The night-stalker gave her a horrible grin in which she saw his teeth were missing and compared it to a

scary clown's smile. That would be Richard Ramirez, a serial killer who would kill his victim at night just by opening windows or doors to homes. He would declare that he is just doing the job that he was requested to do. His first victim was a 9-year-old Chinese-American girl, Mei-Leung, who was raped and murdered. His next victim was Dayle Okazaki, a 36-year-old who started his killing spree.

Before Rameriez got to Dayle, Okazaki's roommate Maria Hernandez came home. Hernandez was knocked out by the bullet which slowed her down in trying to rescue her roommate who was shot in the forehead by Ramirez. Hernadez and Ramirez had an interaction once again when she arrived in front of the condo. He was about to shoot until she put her hands up and said, "Hey, you already shot me once, do you really have to shoot me again", but Ramirez just walked away. Rameriz wasn't satisfied and just 40 minutes after his first victim, the police department received a call about a murder a mile away from Ramirez's first victim. This was his second Asian victim. She was stopped while driving, got pulled out, and was shot for no apparent reason. Tsai-Lian Yu, 30 years old was declared dead for having a bullet in the chest with her last words being "Help me! Help me!". That night the investigators found that it was the same type of gun, but they couldn't assume it was related due to the fact that there were a lot of .222 out there.


Detective Gil Carrillo, the detective that was assigned to this case, knew that the cases were linked because Ramirez would only shoot the victims that showed fear, unlike the reaction of Hernandez. From there he began to do cruel things like cutting out women's eyes, stabbing, robbing, etc. One thing the detectives found disputing was that he would leave food uneaten. Rameriz had no remorse for the things he did. He continued to do it for a span of a year, but the scariest thing for the state of California was that anyone could be a victim; because he would kill anyone that was in sight. He had no preferences, he just did it at random. Detectives went days and nights with restless sleep and devastating moments because he was hard to identify.

It wasn't until he left his shoe prints behind, certain bullets, and his car, an orange Toyota that led to his arrest. His fingerprints showed his identity and his photo was sent out to the public. He was arrested on August 30, 1980, and sent to trial. He would be charged with thirteen counts of murder, five attempted murders, eleven sexual assaults, and fourteen burglaries, all resulting in him being on death row. He was born in February, 1960 and died from cancer while in jail on June 7, 2013. Victims will never be repaid for the trauma that he gave, but their story counts just as much as the others.

How Steve Pikell Transformed a Program

When Steve Pikell was hired in 2016 he told everyone "I've never let an athletic director down. I've never let a president down, and I've never let a student body down. I'm not going to do it here at Rutgers." He was absolutely right.

Coming off the 2015-2016 season Rutgers was the laughing stock of the college basketball world. They had just joined the Big

10 Conference, one of the best conferences in all of college basketball. To say they were struggling is an understatement. They were 7-25 overall and 1-17 in conference play. Needless to say, there was a lot of room for improvement. In his first recruiting cycle, Pikell was only able to pick up, at best, three-star recruits. His team finished 15-18 overall and 3-15 in conference play, an improvement but not exactly where the team needed to be. His lone star player was sophomore Corey Sanders, who had some behavior issues but was fantastic on the basketball court. Pikell had shown he had potential to better this program, but could that potential be realized?

In the 2017 recruiting cycle, Pikell recruited one three-star athlete that would forever change the trajectory of the program, Geo Baker. In 2023, when you think of Rutgers basketball, his name is one of the first that comes to mind. In his freshman year he was already averaging 10 points per game. Later on, he became a leader and a voice for the program. He was one of the best three point shooters the team has ever had, a great passer who was fantastic off the ball and could steal with ease, not to mention incredibly clutch. Next, is Myles Johnson. While he didn't have quite the impact that Geo did, there were few players in college basketball better at defending around the rim. The team finished 15-19 overall and 3-15 in conference play, absolutely no improvement.

People were starting to worry if Pikell was really helping. There was, however, a small run in the Big 10 tournament where the team was able to make it all the way to the quarterfinals. The 2018 recruiting cycle was arguably the most important of Pikell's tenure. He recruited four impact players. The first and likely most significant was Ron Harper Jr. Harper is the son of NBA player Ron Harper, who was a large contributor to the Bulls NBA Finals teams in the 90s. Second is Myles Johnson. While he didn't have quite the impact as Harper, he can be regarded as a top defender in the nation. The 2018-2019 Scarlet Knights finished with a record of 14-17 overall, and 7-13 in conference play.

Mr. Pat Dorney, current Collingswood High School and former Arcadia University basketball coach, said this on the subject, "What makes college so much different than high school is the recruiting piece. In high school you are dealt your hand. Tryouts begin and you can only pick from players that attend your school. At the collegiate level, you recruit players/families that you want. Now that it itself sounds easy, but if these players are scholarship level, other programs are recruiting them as well." Steve Pikell has to meet with these kids' families and convince them that his program was better suited for them than the likes of Duke and North Carolina. In the 2019 recruiting cycle, Pikell got his point guard. Paul Mulcahy was a great passer with court vision, he was a very streaky shooter, but you don't need elite shooting from your point guard. Eugene Omoruyi left for Oregon in the transfer portal, but Pikell picked up two very important players in the portal as well. Senior Akwasi Yeboah, a leader from Pikell's old school who was a big help for Rutgers this season and Jacob Young, the conference's leader in steals

This was a record year for Rutgers, finishing 20-11 overall, and 11-9 in conference. Pikell's plan was finally coming together, and this was a tournament level team. Some of the best moments from the season include Geo Baker single handedly coming back down 15 in the last 5 minutes against Northwestern, and Rutgers defeating #9 ranked Maryland by 9 at the RAC. This season at the RAC (Rutgers home court) they only lost one game. Nicknames such as the Trapezoid of Terror started going around due to the arena's strange shape.

During this season, four star 2023 recruit Gavin Griffithis committed to Rutgers, and most notably Airuous Bailey, ranked 6th in the 2024 class committed to Rutgers. Back in 2016, Rutgers couldn't even have dreamed of acquiring a top ten player from out of state, but Steve Pikell has changed that drastically. So, that's where we stand today, Steve Pikell has transformed Rutgers for the better and we're only going up from here.

A Review of Trea Turners Contract

Will begin with the largest contract of the offseason. The Philadelphia Phillies' 11-year 300 million dollar deal with short-

stop Trea Turner. This was a great move for the Phils as they lost second basemen Jean Segura leaving an opening in the middle infield. Turner also provides versatility as he is able to play center and second. They are also getting a career 300 batting average and 99 percentile sprint speed. This brings in a much-needed on-base guy to a lineup that heavily relies on power. There are a few concerns with this contract like Turner's longevity. Both these guys were given massive contracts but Correa will most likely have the longer career as Turner is going to take a toll on his production when he ages. Turner is not going to be able to hit the pitches he swings at and this will lead to more misses resulting in more strikeouts and fewer hits. Instead of giving Turner an 11-year deal the Phillies should have given him a 5-year 150 million dollar contract which would have also given them leeway to sign another star. Although this was a great move for Philly the contract they decided on could have been better and saved them money.

MVP Case By Ben Auerbach

The Philadelphia Eagles finished the 2022-23 regular season with the best record in the NFL (tied with Chiefs at 14-3) and the number one seed in the NFC. This Eagle's team has dominated on both sides of the ball, with a top-ten defense and top-three offense. There is no question that the talented roster constructed by GM Howie Roseman has been a major reason for this success. However, the greatest factor by far has been the superb play of quarterback Jalen Hurts. As the Birds prepare for their first playoff game, let's take a deeper look at Hurts'

Jalen Hurts

The first thing people will look at when deciding on an MVP is the raw statistics. Hurts certainly delivers in this category, compiling 35 total touchdowns while only committing 8 turnovers. His most impressive numbers were on the ground, where he rushed for 760 yards and 13 touchdowns. His 13 rushing touchdowns rank second all-time in NFL history.

Another key consideration was his overall value to the team. When Hurts was under center, the Eagles' went 14-1. During the two games he missed due to injury, his team went 0-2. The Eagles' offense averaged 28.1 p/pg for the season, which was third-best in the NFL. They also accumulated the second-most y/pg in the league. Besides his physical stats, intangibles such as his leadership qualities are another reason he is so valuable. It is also important to note that the Eagles competed in the toughest division in football this year, the NFC East. The East featured three playoff teams, and no team had a losing record. Even with this tough competition, Hurts was 4-1 in divisional games, including 3 wins by 2 or more scores. He also led the

Eagles to a blowout win over the Vikings (13-4). Finally, we need to examine Hurt's competition to win the award.
