4	CATEGORY II - MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL II

6	This level includes misbehavior whose frequency or seriousness tends to disrupt the learning climate of
7	the school. These misbehaviors do not represent a direct threat to the health and safety of others but
9	have educational consequences serious enough to require corrective action on the part of administrative personnel
10 11	Offenses that may result in suspension. Any student suspended will not be allowed to participate in any school function including field trips, athletic practices or contests, etc.
12	1st time Category II Offense - 3 days suspension or in-school suspension (where applicable) or corporal punishment

Social adjustment classes 1 Transfer 2 Trauma-informed practices such as awareness of behavioral patterns, mental health 3 supports, restorative practices, RTI<sup>2</sup>B, multi-tiered system of supports, and behavior 4 intervention plans 5 CATEGORY IV - MISBEHAVIORS: LEVEL IV 6 This level of misbehavior includes acts which result in violence to another's person or property or 7 which pose a threat to the safety of others in the school. These acts are so serious that they usually 8 require administrative actions which result in the immediate removal of the student from the school, the intervention of law enforcement authorities, and/or action by the Board. 10 If a student's action poses a threat to the safety of others in the school, a teacher, principal, school 11 employee, or school bus driver may use reasonable force when necessary to prevent bodily harm or 12 death to another person.<sup>5</sup> 13 These offenses are subject to suspension up to a maximum of 20 days. 14 Examples (not an exclusive listing) 15 Continuation of unmodified Level I, II, and III misbehaviors 16 Death threat 17 Extortion 18 Bomb threat 19 Possession, use, and/or transfer of dangerous weapons 20 Assault that results in bodily injury upon any teacher, principal, administrator, any other 21 employee of the school, or a school resource officer\* 22 Aggravated assault\* 23 Vandalism 24 Theft, possession, and/or sale of stolen property 25 26 Possession of unauthorized substances (e.g. any controlled substance, controlled 27 substance analogue, or legend drug) \* 28 • Use or transfer of unauthorized substances 29 • Victimization of any student (harassment (sexual, racial, ethnic, religious), bullying, 30 cyber-bullying, and/or hazing) 31 • Electronic threat to cause bodily injury or death to another student or school employee 32 Disciplinary Procedures 33 The principal confers with appropriate staff members and with the student. 34 The principal hears the accusations and allows the student the opportunity to explain 35 his/her conduct. 36 The parent(s)/guardian(s) are notified. 37 Law enforcement officials are contacted. 38 The incident is reported, and recommendations are made to the Director of Schools. 39

## PROCEDURES FOR VIOLATION OF STUDENT USE OF CELLULAR TELEPHONES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Examples of Electronic Devices but not limited to:

Cell phones, Camera phones, PDAs, iPods, MP3 players, Discman, Beepers, Pagers, Gameboys, etc.

- 1. First Offense Three days in-school suspension.
- 2. Second Offense Five days in-school suspension.
- 3. Third Offense -Ten days placement in the Smith County Alternative School.
- 4. Fourth Offense Five days Alternative School and five days out-of-school suspension with a loss of any privilege under this policy for the remainder of the school year.
- 5. Category III Offense suspension (mandatory for 20 days).
- All confiscated electronic devices must be picked up at the school by the parent.
- The Smith County School System is not responsible for lost or stolen devices
